RNLI NEWS



On July 26th, Port Isaac Inshore Lifeboat was tasked to an injured coasteerer at Port Gaverne. For 17-year old Harry Hambly it was his first shout. The crew recovered the casualty from the water using the spinal board and kept her stable until paramedics arrived. She was given a full assessment by paramedics on the Cornwall Air Ambulance. Harry's Dad, Richard (paramedic pictured) has a long service history with Port Isaac lifeboat and is a current serving DLA. Well done to Harry Hambly, Mark Grills, Nicki Bradbury, George Cleave and all who responded.

At 20:02hrs on Sunday 4th September Port Isaac Inshore Lifeboat (ILB) was tasked to reports of two, possibly three persons washed off the rocks at Port Gaverne between the main and Castle Rock. The ILB arrived on scene ten minutes after first report was made. Two fisherman matching the description were seen and spoken with. Both were safe. A search was carried out of the entire area with nothing found. The lifeboat liaised with Polzeath Coastguard and with details from the first informant carried out a further search. Two semi submerged pot buoys were found in the location with nothing else to report. On evaluation with Falmouth Coast Guard and Polzeath Coast Guard it was detailed as a false alarm with good intent. The boat and crew returned to station refuelled and were ready again for service.



Eight years ago, David Connolly and his son Finley went out kayaking from Port Quin. The weather was fine and they were looking forward to a nice outing. Suddenly the weather turned and David was unable to return to the harbour. He held the kayak against a marker buoy and waved for help. Someone spotted them and called the coastguard. Port Isaac ILB responded and took them safely back to shore. Recently they were in Port Isaac and had the opportunity to say thank you (again!) to the three crew who saved them. The crew who responded were (a much younger) Nigel Sherratt, Andy Cameron and Mark Grills.


ROCK INSTITUTE SUMMER EXHIBITION

To All About The Bounce for braving the weather with what they could- next year we WILL have sun and bouncy castles!


To Damien for bringing the lifeboat up - I think two boys in particular enjoyed themselves trying on the dry suits and you may have some new recruits in about 5 years!


So once again, a huge thank you to everybody who came and supported us and helped create such an amazing atmosphere! Same time next year?

Miracles do happen

Had a bad day? They happen, sometimes very, very bad days. Life does that, sadly. But look at the picture, which I have borrowed from my newspaper. You may have seen it already. Doesn't it make you feel happier? Twins Rosie and Ruby Formosa, conjoined at their abdomen and sharing part of the intestine, facing a likely death, were separated, and are now about to begin school. Don't tell me that



miracles no longer happen – they do, hour by hour in our hospitals and elsewhere. Here is one of the more remarkable. It lifts the heart.

One might argue that the quite astonishing feats of the medical professionals are not the same as those recalled in the Gospels. True, Jesus was the difference. But if it were not for the revelations discovered over the centuries by researching scientists, who then translated discovery into action and healing, there would be far fewer miracles, if any at all.

The important thing that the twins show us is that miracles of skill and care do happen still, and there is no reason to suppose that each of us might be a recipient. One might argue that it doesn't prove the existence of God and all that is claimed in scripture. Equally it shows that prayer to a loving God is answered. There is always hope, however black the future seems.

If we could prove beyond doubt that there is indeed a loving God, then what value is faith?

Our MP, Scott Mann talks to Trio .

Earlier this month I ventured out on to Bodmin Moor with the Redwings Horse Sanctuary to process over 160 wild ponies for passporting and microchipping. The Bodmin Moor Commons Council, RSPCA, Animal & Plant Health Agency, and trustees from the Elise Pilkington Charitable Trust - who funded the operation were also present to make sure ponies can be chipped and tracked to ensure their welfare.

There have been many unfortunate incidents of ponies being neglected on the Moor and it's great to see so much joined-up work between agencies, organisations and local representatives to make sure these animals are looked after and that owners can be held to account.

After the end of the summer recess, two important Bills came before MPs to make changes to taxation and broadband. The Finance Bill was passed to clamp down on tax evasion, while the Digital Economy Bill had its second reading to enhance broadband delivery.

The Conservative Government has vowed to clamp down on tax avoidance and illegal tax evasion, with more than 25 measures being introduced to raise an extra £16 billion by 2021. The tackling of loopholes and illegal tax evasion in the last Parliament alone is expected to raise £12 billion by this year. Within the Bill I also voted to make sanitary products exempt from VAT. This issue received a lot of attention last year in Parliament, however at the time, there was no legal scope to zero-rate sanitary products because of EU law.

With the EU set to loosen its grip on VAT law early next year, the Government has legislated to exempt sanitary products once it is legal to do so. In the meantime, the Treasury has been donating all VAT proceeds to women's charities, which this year stood at £15 million.

I spoke in the Commons to welcome the Digital Economy Bill which will bring in a Universal Service Obligation (USO) for broadband and a new Electronics Communication Code to enhance the provision of both landline and mobile broadband.

The USO is expected to be 10Mbps which would be a minimum statutory requirement for broadband customers. I highlighted the current situation in North Cornwall where customers are paying for 10Mbps but only getting something along the lines of 0.5Mbps, which is simply unacceptable.

The new Code will also change the way service providers can enhance their delivery of broadband, with mobile companies being given more freedom to modify their masts so they can boost their range or upgrade them to 3G and 4G internet.

This will not only benefit local people but also visitors who expect mobile phone signal and broadband when on holiday. It will also mean more rural areas can become contactable which will make people safer if they need to contact the emergency services.

I have been asked to sit on the Public Bill Committee which will meticulously scrutinise it, and I'm looking forward to being a part of this Bill and contributing to its development.

DOC MARTIN FUND

The Trustees held the AGM in early September and reported that £81,159.22 has been received from Buffalo Pictures since the fund began. Of this £39,326.78 has been granted to the following causes:

The Port Isaac Christmas CD - a CD recorded by local musicians with ALL the profits of sales going to Port Isaac School to assist with music and the arts - \pounds 5,000 Port Isaac School - funding to assist the Breakfast Club - \pounds 2,550 Port Isaac Playing Field - purchase of equipment - \pounds 8251.78

Port Isaac Village Hall - purchase and installation of multi-access chair lift - £12,000 Port Isaac Golden Circle - funds to supplement hall hire, day trips, outside speakers etc - £3,000

Port Isaac Christmas Lights - funding to renew old and purchase new lights - \pounds 10,000 (\pounds 3,000 still to be drawn)

Liam Murray - support for sporting excellence, funding local boy Liam to take part in the World Junior Surfing Championships - £1,000

Port Isaac School - funding to assist/support swimming (transport to and from) and the breakfast club and after school club - £14,000 (still to be drawn)

Harry Hambly - funding to assist/ support sporting excellence, funding local boy Harry to travel to the US for football coaching (as part of this, Harry was involved with raising money to purchase two defibrillators for the village (see page 5) - £1,000

The fund currently stands at $\pounds 24,222.67$ and applications for funding - matched funding is the preferred method of support - should be made via Jon Cleave at The Boathouse Stores of Jan Townsend, The Sibbys, Rose Hill, by letter. Applications will be considered at the trustees quarterly meetings - dates to be published in the next issue of *Trio*.

Schoolchat news & views from Port Isaac School Bikelights




The Bloodhound

The children got the chance to build their own models and record the speed. It was a very informative morning and we are hoping to be able to go and see the car when it comes to Newquay Airport for some testing.

Parish Council report supplied to Trio by the Parish Clerk

Planning Applications

The following applications were received and Members made the following responses to Cornwall Council:

- 1. PA16/02367 Pre-App, 39 New Road, Port Isaac pre-application advice for new 2-storey, 4-bedroom house to replace existing 2storey, 4-bedroom house. Whilst wholly agreeing that the present building had come to the end of its current life, Members unanimously commented on the inappropriateness of the rear balcony as it would compromise the privacy of the neighbouring property, looking straight into the garden. Generally the balance of opinion disapproved of the scale of the proposal which was criticised as overwhelming given its position in the street. Two members had no misgivings.
- 2. PA16/05736, 5 Tintagel Terrace, Port Isaac erection of a single storey one bedroom self-contained annex to replace the existing lockup garage. Members had no objection.
- 3. PA16/06509, Land adj. Port Gaverne Hotel, Port Isaac demolition of existing café, construct new café hut from matching materials, proposed new landscape to help improve site finish. Members voted unanimously to object to the proposal on the basis of insufficient information due to the complete lack of detail reference comparative ridge heights. Given the sensitive location Members felt this is essential and should be provided as a matter of course.
- 4. PA16/07128, 17 Silvershell Road, Port Isaac extensions to the rear and side of the existing dwelling including Balcony addition, alterations to internal layout, replacement roof structure and finish, new windows and doors through out and new rear terrace and extended/modified front car parking. Members voted unanimously in support of this proposal with the sole recommendation the balcony should be framed in non-reflective material i.e. powder coated metal or timber.
- 5. PA16/07413, Land S of 8 The Terrace, Port Isaac demolition of single storey garage and erection of new two-storey two-bedroom house. Members voted to object to this proposal 5 to 2 against. This third design we had considered is still felt largely to be overwhelming and out of scale given the proximity of other dwellings. Members were also concerned by the unbroken slate herringbone covering on all elevations as contributing to the overbearing nature of the design. When wet the building would be very dark in appearance.
- 6. PA 16/07447, Tregudda Road from Tremore to Port Gaverne nonmaterial amendment (various as per schedule) to planning application PA15/07216 for owners' accommodation to include a laundry/store room, a boiler room and living accommodation. Members voted in favour of all the amendments 4 to 3 in support.

Enforcement Cases

- 1. EN16/00308, Harbour Heights, Rose Hill, Port Isaac alleged breach of condition No.3 of PA10/08418, namely annexed accommodation being used as a self-contained dwelling. Contact addresses for the owner had been provided to the Case officer: Ms Serena Wearne.
- 2. EN16/00667, Land NE of Port Gaverne Hotel refusal of retrospective application under PA16/01770 for the provision of new hard-core. Also unauthorised stationing of a shipping container on the land. Case officer, David Tapsell reported he had not had the opportunity to visit this case. NOTE – an appeal can be lodged up until mid-October.
- 3. EN16/01087, Tregudda, Port Gaverne alleged not built in

accordance with approved plans PA15/07216; namely orientation of building and installation to two chimneys (not one). Case officer: Louise Whitby had closed this case, as a non-material amendment application had been submitted under reference PA16/07447.

EN16/01510, 17 Trewetha Lane, Port Isaac – change of use of building from a lock up store to a trading shop. Case officer: Claire Hawke advised she had carried out a site visit but she was unable to provide Members with any further information at this stage.

The Main Car Park – one of the ticket machines had been stolen and a replacement has been ordered. An insurance claim has been submitted. It was understood that the National Trust and others had suffered similar incidents.

Coach Parking – Members are very keen to provide parking for coaches and would welcome hearing from anyone with suitable land.

New Road WCs and Retail Unit – there had been a number of teething problems with the building work and it is hoped these are now all rectified. It has been identified that a disabled ramp to the shop is required and plans are being drawn up for this.

Port Isaac Pilot Waste Project – a number of complaints had been received and these have been taken up with Cornwall Council / Cory as appropriate.

Now we've reached October, root vegetables are out in force, destined for soups and casseroles as the nights draw in, and the colour palette has moved from summery greens and reds to deep purple, orange and brown.

Heritage carrots have been a favourite on restaurant menus for the last few years and are now making appearances in supermarkets in an array of colours. As well as brightening up the dinner table, they also bring a lovely, sweet taste to any dish they're used in. Remember, purple, yellow and white carrots have been around for 200 years longer than the humble orange carrot and we think they deserve equal place on your plate. I have heard, but do not know if it is true, that we have the Dutch to thank for orange carrots think William the Orange and all that. Who knows? All I know is they taste great at this time of year.

Carrot, Puy Lentil and Thyme Salad

FOR THE HONEY NUTS

I tablespoon olive oil 20g pecan halves 15g sunflower seeds 15g pumpkin seeds 2 tablespoons clear honey

For the honey nuts, line a baking tray with non-stick baking paper and set aside. Heat the olive oil in a nonstick frying pan until hot, then add the pecan halves and sunflower and pumpkin seeds. Toast the nuts and seeds over a medium heat for 2-3 minutes or until they start to turn golden, stirring continuously to prevent the nuts from burning.

Add the honey and keep heating and stirring for a further 1–2 minutes or until the nuts are a deep golden colour.

Transfer the honey nuts to the prepared baking tray, then set aside and leave to cool completely.

FOR THE CARROT AND PUY LENTIL SALAD

100g Puy lentils

- 400g small baby organic carrots or Chantenay carrots, with tops and roots intact
- I tablespoon extra virgin olive oil
- I orange pepper, deseeded and cut into long strips
- I clove garlic, crushed
- I tablespoon clear honey
- finely grated zest and juice of 1/2 orange
- I tablespoon soy sauce
- I teaspoon grated (peeled) fresh root ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon nigella seeds (also known as black onion seeds or kalonji seeds)
- I tablespoon chopped fresh Thyme
- sea salt and freshly cracked black pepper

Place the Puy lentils in a small saucepan, cover with plenty of cold water and bring to a gentle simmer, then cook, uncovered, for 15–20 minutes or until the lentils are cooked and tender. Season with salt, then drain well, place in a bowl, set aside and keep warm.

Meanwhile, wash the carrots, then remove the top green leaves but leave the long roots on as they look pretty. If the carrots are very fresh, there is no need to peel them, otherwise, you can peel them, if you prefer. Cook the carrots in a pan of boiling salted water for 8-10 minutes or until cooked and tender (cooking time will depend on their size). Drain well, then mix with the cooked Puy lentils, set aside and keep warm.

Heat the olive oil in a large, non-stick frying pan until hot, then add the strips of pepper and the garlic and saute over a medium heat for 3-4 minutes or until softened and starting to turn golden brown. Season with salt and pepper, then add the combined cooked Puy lentils and carrots and cook for a further 2 minutes or until heated through. Add the honey, orange zest and juice, soy sauce and ginger and cook for 2 minutes or so, until the liquid thickens and starts to coat the carrots.

Transfer the cooked carrot mixture to a serving dish, then fold in the nigella seeds, toasted honey nuts and the thyme and serve immediately. Serve as a side dish with roast chicken, pan-roasted duck or confit duck leg, grilled pork chops, or just add some bacon or chorizo to make a hearty warming easy one pot meal.

This recipe was created by Madalene Bonvini-Hamel from The British Larder: A Cookbook For All Seasons and if you like me, love to cook seasonal food then buy her book - it has recipe that will make your mouth water.





Websites of the Month

We are already into autumn and on the way to winter. Each year it seems to take me by surprise that the days get shorter and shorter so quickly. Although I can think of warm fires and being cosy on cold winter nights, I'm afraid I would go for long evenings every time. As I write this, today is the autumn equinox (meaning equal night) when we have equal hours of daylight and darkness all over the world and this morning I heard one of the BBC weather people explaining what the equinox is and how it differs from the start of autumn. On the BBC website he explains it all in a short video http://www.bbc.co.uk/ weather/features/37423436. The reason is that the Earth is tilted on its axis as it spins around and as it tilts it makes us closer or further away from the Sun depending on the time of year. When we are tilted closest to the Sun, it is the summer; furthest away it is the winter. Spring and autumn are in between. When the Earth is not tilted at all compared to its spin the north and southern hemispheres are equally close to the Sun and that's the equinox. At the equator the tilt doesn't affect the angle to the Sun and so they have equinox all the year round.

This is one aspect of a broader topic that I think is fascinating. These are the consequences that arise from the fact that the length of the day changes. It affects plants and animals, including ourselves in all sorts of ways and goes under the name of Chronobiology and Wikipedia is a good place to look https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Chronobiology . This site explains some of the research activities to try and understand how our biological clocks work and how they keep time. A good article about human clocks is in Scientific American http://www.scientificamerican.com/article/your-brain-has-two-clocks/ that suggests we have one clock for day night and so on and another to keep track of time passing.

People's rhythms are attuned to the day night cycle of course – we sleep at night and wake during the day. This is such a commonplace thing that we take it for granted. But if the system that keeps us in synchrony goes wrong it can be very disruptive. I found this amusingly named website very clear; it is devoted to problems associated with sleep and our daily rhythms (www.


Istopsnoring.co.uk/sleep-conditions/circadian-rhythm-disorders/) and has lots of information about how all this works. It shows how our body clocks if not synchronised by the day night cycle, would run at 25 hours a day, nor 24. It is an active brain process that keeps it in line with the day. It also talks about the research that has been done on seasonal affective disorder where people feel quite low as the autumn comes on, is beginning to uncover some of the underlying mechanisms of all this, and people are getting some useful help for their conditions at last.

Chronobiology also covers the way plants organise their rhythms – when to flower, when to drop their leaves in autumn and so on. Some of this is controlled by daylength (although temperature and other factors do come in to play for many species). Also many plants and animals hibernate and for some of them this is triggered by daylength; also birds migrations.

Finally, a link with the climate change theme of these columns can be seen by looking at the amount of CO2 in the atmosphere measured over the past few decades at Mauna Loa near Hawaii http://www.esrl.noaa.gov/gmd/ccgg/ trends/. If you look at the picture you can see the graph goes up and down with the seasons. Usually the point is that the trend line is going up – and indeed

it has set new records this year – but this time look at how much it varies (the black line is the trend, the read line the actual readings). A big part of the reason for this is because when the spring arrives the leaves come out and start absorbing co2 as part of photosynthesis. In the autumn and winter the leaves fall down and decompose, giving off lots of CO2.
