Port Isaac RNLI Shouts

On Sunday 9th July, Port Isaac ILB was tasked at 1743 to help the police and Boscastle, Bude and Polzeath Coastguard in a search for a vulnerable male last seen at Glebe cliff. Once on scene we commenced a shoreline search from Trebarwith to Tintagel Head. We were joined by HMCG Rescue 924 and later by Padstow Lifeboat. All entities carried out a thorough search of sea and coast but the casualty was not located.

On Monday 10th July, at the request of the police, Port Isaac ILB continued in the ongoing search for the vulnerable, missing person. The ILB carried out search patterns for 4.5 hours but sadly there is still no news.

Thanks to everyone involved in this multi-agency response. Our thoughts are with the family and we hope he is located fit and well soon.



At 1717 on 15th July, Falmouth Coastguard requested we launch to reports of a person at the base of the cliffs between Bossiney and the Beenie Sisters. Damien, Nicki and George responded to the page and made their way to the scene. Already in attendance were HMCG Rescue 924, Boscastle Coastguard and Padstow Lifeboat tasked and en route. 924 had to stand off due to turbulence. George was put ashore and directed by the local Coastguard teams on the cliffs. An extensive search was made of the area and the sighting was concluded as a false alarm with good intent.

A massive thank you to Padstow Lifeboat for clearing the way and allowing us to piggy back in their wake, meaning we averaged 21 knots all the way home instead of 12 which would have been all we could have achieved in those seas. A great multi agency response and awesome team work!

## **St Peter's Church Rooms**

The Church Rooms in Port Isaac have been closed for safety reasons for more than two years now. The Parochial Church Council (PCC) of St Peter's Church simply haven't had the funds or the people available to repair or renovate the building, and in



spite of valiant efforts, it has not been possible for this to be done by a community group either. As a result, the PCC have had to consider the possibility of selling the Church Rooms, with the money being used in the Parish of Port Isaac for

church projects which are of benefit to the community (e.g. enabling a toilet and servery to be installed in the church so that it can be used for a wider range of church and community activities), and investing in work with children and families (e.g. the Harvest of the Sea project). ## Refreshment from the water of life!

One of my favourite images for spiritual refreshment is that of a well. The wonderful thing about wells is that they contain fresh water coming from deep underground. There are lots of really ancient wells in our Cornwall, some lost or forgotten, and some carefully looked after, so that people can visit them.

When I think of our churches, they are a bit like wells – places where people can come for spiritual refreshment. Often our churches have stood in the same place for centuries, being places where God's love pours out to bless those who come to them, whether they are visiting for the first time or they are regular members of the church community. Our job as custodians of these beautiful and special buildings is to ensure that the water of life flows freely from them, so that all can benefit.

In our Cluster, we do this by ensuring that the buildings are left open and made available to visitors. But we also do this by being loving and welcoming communities of people, whose lives are centred on God in Christ and who practice forgiveness and reach out to strangers and those in need.

Church members are like stones in the well, we are blessed by the water of life that comes from the depths of the divine, but we know that the water is not just for us. We want the water to flow past us and out into the wider world, so that all can be refreshed and renewed by the endless love that we have experienced.

During these summer months when so many people visit Cornwall, seeking rest and relaxation, I pray that each one of us who come close to the water of life may know the extraordinary blessing of God's love as it overflows every boundary in our lives and brings renewal and regeneration.

When I was little, dad used to talk us on all sorts of walksalong streams and rivers, down narrow coastal paths and up mountain sides. It was always an adventure discovering abandoned buildings, hidden lakes and I remember almost picking up a snake thinking it was a bungee cord! We often came back loaded with fallen wood for the fire. We went out in all sort of weather and I remember one dreadful walk through a hooley of a storm - it felt like the hail was cutting exposed skin which the wicked wind rubbed salty sea air into. It was tough going and even though burdened down with winter fuel, somehow we managed to get home feeling like tough settlers on the wild frontier.

That was many moons ago. Recently Dad came down to visit and we went to Rough Tor. His legs now being much weaker, we could only look longingly from the car park gate

They happen between friends, work colleagues and between strangers. Coming across the something of God in the other person is a daily occurrence but perhaps recognising and appreciating the sacredness in our relationships is more difficult. I believe that when Jesus taught his followers to pray "Our Father", he is inviting us to see God in our relationships and to know that we can be in relationship with God.

## Scott Mann, our local MP, writes ...

After many months of work and years of campaigning, we can finally wave goodbye to the endless queues of traffic on Bodmin Moor after the new A30 dual carriageway was officially opened in July. There is still some work left to complete, the bridges and other minor details, but the fact that we now have an uninterrupted dual carriageway running across the moor and around Bodmin will be a huge boost for Cornwall's economy and the constituency.

We have already seen businesses looking at Bodmin as a place to relocate, and with this huge infrastructure investment, it will make it much easier to transport goods through the county. The dualling at Temple is proof of the huge investment being made in Cornwall by the Government, and plans are already underway to dual the next section between Carland Cross and Chiverton Cross.

I'd like to pay particular tribute to the A30 action group who spearheaded the campaign to get the A30 dualled. The bottleneck at Temple had caused huge disruption to local people for many years, and it's fantastic to see the perseverance of local communities paying off. I would also like to thank the people of Cornwall for their patience over the past few years. It hasn't been easy for businesses and residents. However, we can all now enjoy the benefits.

Sticking to roads, the Government has just published its Transport Investment Strategy which outlines key objectives and how we should invest in new projects. This includes proposals for a new Major Road Network (MRN) which would see huge investment in our main A-roads to tackle congestion. This could include bypasses for towns which suffer from a lot of traffic jams and poor air quality.

I will be working with the people of Camelford to get a bypass proposal worked up to attract government funding. Traffic congestion is the biggest issue that I hear about from local residents and during the election I found huge support for a bypass.

Meanwhile, another big issue that has come across my desk since the election is Post Offices and the continuation of services in rural communities. For a number of different reasons, many Post Office branches are being transferred in their communities from one business to another or into a community building. While some moves have been successful, others are dragging on or are yet to begin because of contract negotiations which can be very concerning for local people.

I therefore took this issue straight to the top and raised it at Prime Minister's Questions to ask for Theresa May's support. The Prime Minister recognises the importance of Post Offices in rural communities and she has urged the Post Office to do all it can to make sure services can continue in North Cornwall. I have also met with Post Office HQ to discuss specific branches and to get assurances that transfers can take place. A number of Post Offices are on my radar and my team and I are working with communities to make their concerns known to the Post Office regional team.

Contact at: 10 Market House Arcade, Fore Street, Bodmin PL31 2JA Tel: 01208 74337 Some time ago. some parish councillors were asked about the proliferation of 'outside advertisements' in Port Isaac. There was a feeling that, in some cases, outside advertising was getting a bit over the top and spoiling the character of the village and in others impeding the highway or causing a distraction. Following this. I requested that



an enforcement officer attend one of our quarterly 'Community network meetings' in Wadebridge to explain what is allowed and what is not. What we got was not just an in depth powerpoint presentation but Chris, the enforcement officer, took the time to visit Port isaac, using photos of current advertising in the village to emphasise the points, which helped tremendously. The areas of concern are around 'amenity' - what the advert actually looks like and how it sits in its' surroundings, and 'public safety' - is it dangerous or impedes public access or the highway?

Now, I should say before anyone gets too hot under the collar, out of the 2250 enforcement cases Cornwall Council deal with each year, only 97 were about advertising and its not the parish council's intention to act as some kind of advert police. It is appreciated that all business need to advertise and our parish is not the easiest place to do so. If anyone has a particular complaint regarding advertising, then Cornwall Council is the place to go - www.cornwall/gov.uk

The examples Chris used to explain possible unauthorised advertising covered practically all businesses and village organisations, ranging from 'A' frames on the road, proliferation of wall adverts on buildings,mto fly posters and signs on telegraph poles.

After discussing the issue at our last Parish Council meeting it was agreed that the best way forward would be to **ask all businesses and village organisations to take a look at** their own advertising and to see if they reflect the character of the area of the village they are set in and, in the case of 'A' frames, are they causing a problem for vehicles or pedestrians? Are you removing your event posters after your event?

Of course there is also that nagging doubt that this plea for common sense and regard for our Conservation and AONB area status will be completely ignored but as its probable that most people don't realise the creeping cumulative impact, it seemed like a pragmatic approach was best. All we are trying to do is keep Port Isaac as Port Isaac, not Polzeath.

## Websites of the Month

On a recent visit to Tintagel, I got to thinking about how Cornwall has so many very ancient sites of historical and archaeological interest and how there is a thriving archaeology community with many interesting websites to explore. Tintagel Church, for example, was originally built in the 6th century and the whole area around Tintagel is archeologically very rich. A really good blog about the excavations there last year is a good read (http://blog.english-heritage.or.uk/discoveries-excavations-tintagel-castle/). The many finds from this dig have been processed and analysed and you can read about them on the English Heritage sitehttps://tinyurl.com/tin-tag-history. The castle itself is well worth a visit, as the settlement there includes some very striking features, like a walled garden, and there is evidence for medieval trade in pottery. You may also have seen there is a controvertial plan to build a new bridge to make access to the castle easier https://tinyurl.com/tin-tag-bridge and while you can understand the worry people have about this idea, anyone who has visited the castle will know it is quite a hard climb.

So as a starting point for web based information for archaeology sites around Port Isaac, (if you can spare the £34.95 a year), is the archaeological database www.ArchiUK.com . As I was writing this column I shelled out for it and it has some really useful information. I put in my Port Isaac's postcode and my password and the database lists 241 sites within 10 kilometres of Port Isaac.

The Aerial photograph appears to be a Google Earth/Maps image so you can locate the site. This one appears to be in a field. I expected it to be in St Endellion churchyard, but as far as the location given is concerned it is in the field (confirmed by looking here https://www.gridreferencefinder.com where you can put in the grid reference). The link to the old maps is really useful too and you get to see and can print out high-resolution images. This link has two maps, one from 1888 and one from 1905. The map with overlays has one from 1919. So while none of these are really ancient maps, they are over 100 years ago. This site has lots of potential to explore different sites of historical and archaeological interest, and is apparently being updated regularly. It was set up in 1999 as part of an archeology project at Birkbeck College in London.

There are many local groups that cover Cornish archeology as well and I would start with the Cornish Archeology Society (cornisharchaeology.org.uk). This has a free section (most of it) and a members section costing £25.00 a year. Your membership buys the newsletter (three per year) access to maps and so on. If you are overseas you get a cheap rate as do students. This site has lots of useful information, including dates of digs, ideas for how you can get involved and places where preservation and conservation work is in progress. It also has a nice Facebook page www.facebook.com/ cornisharchaelogysociety/ that is well worth a visit, and if you are yourself on Facebook you can, of course, follow them and get regular updates. There are also some websites for specific areas of interest like mining www.cornish-mining.org.uk highlight the industrial history of the County.

Finally, Port Isaac has its own history society with an excellent website www.portisaacheritage.co.uk . Here you can see videos of people talking about growing up and working in the village and surrounding area in past years (oral history), read and order publications about the history of the village and much, much more. One particularly clever section is the theme tab. This gives you a 23 choices of themes that range from filming (films which featured the village and the area around like 'Saving Grace' and 'Amy Foster') to Schooldays, with extracts from old school logbooks – the one for 1894 for example is all about typhoid fever.

These are just a selection of what's available online, and while looking at websites is a good start, getting out and looking at the real thing is even better!

# Classic Salads

This month I bring you a couple of classic salad recipes for the summer holidays. First the Mediterranean classic, the Niçoise. You can add any other vegetables that you like and often you will find both fine beans and new potatoes in this salad.

## Salade Niçoise

#### Dressing

90ml of extra virgin olive oil 40g of cherry tomatoes 30ml of balsamic vinegar 1 garlic clove salt & black pepper

For the dressing, crush the cherry tomatoes and garlic cloves with a pestle and mortar, then add the oil and balsamic vinegar slowly, using the pestle and mortar to mix and emulsify. Season with salt and pepper and set aside. 450g of tuna tinned in olive oil, ethically sourced 8 salted anchovies, excess salt rinsed off 20g of black olives 4 free-range eggs, soft-boiled 8 radishes, cut into quarters 400g of cherry tomatoes 200g of salad leaves 1 bunch of spring onions, finely sliced 2 heads of baby gem lettuce 1 celery stick, sliced 1/2 cucumber, sliced 1/4 bunch of chives

In a large salad bowl, mix together the anchovies, tuna, eggs, olives, tomatoes, spring onion, cucumber, celery, radishes, lettuce and salad leaves. Drizzle a little of the salad dressing over the top, adding more if you feel the need. Serve with crusty bread and butter.

## Caesar Salad

I know that you can buy ready to go Caesar salad at any supermarket, but if you want something a bit more special give this one a go!

*To prepare the chicken*, butterfly the chicken so you have 2 pieces. Place between 2 pieces of cling film and pound the chicken breast to about 4-5mm thick.

Lightly whisk all of the marinade ingredients in a bowl until combined, mix in the chicken until well coated. Leave overnight (or for 12 hours) in the fridge.

## Caesar dressing

2 anchovy fillets 1/3 tsp English mustard 1 1/4 tsp white wine vinegar 1/2 tsp garlic, finely chopped 1 egg yolk 1 1/4 tsp lemon juice 10g of Parmesan, grated 1 tsp Worcestershire sauce 1 dash of Tabasco 1 pinch of salt 1 pinch of black pepper 120ml of vegetable oil

#### Chicken marinade

2 chicken breasts 80ml of olive oil 2 tsp rosemary, chopped 2 tsp thyme, chopped 1/2 tsp garlic, finely chopped 1/4 lemon, zested and juiced 2 pinches of salt 1 pinch of pepper

#### To serve

1 French stick 2 gem lettuces 15g of Parmesan shavings 5 anchovy fillets

*For the Caesar dressing*, blend the mustard, salt, pepper, vinegar, garlic, anchovies and egg yolk, then slowly pour in the oil, with the blade still running, until the sauce starts to thicken and emulsify. Next, add the lemon juice, Parmesan, Worcestershire sauce and Tabasco. If the mixture is too thick, add a little water. If your dressing splits you can add lemon juice to help bring it back together again.

When ready to start the salad, cut the French stick diagonally across into slices and toss in olive oil. Season with salt and pepper and toast in a hot oven at 180°C/gas mark 3 until golden in colour.

Place the washed and trimmed baby gem leaves into a bowl and add a little dressing to bind them together, along with half of the Parmesan and croutons.

Heat a charcoal grill or barbecue until roasting hot and grill the chicken on each side for 2-3 minutes. Slice the breast up into strips allowing approximately 5-6 pieces per portion.

Divide the salad into bowls. Top with the chicken and cover with the remaining Parmesan and toasted bread, along with the anchovy fillets.

The site of the existing community Post Office is due to be sold by the landlord, and local charity, The Perceval Institute, has stepped forward to open a new branch and has launched the *'Save our Community Post Office'* appeal. The Institute is based in the village hall and has agreed to release space so a Post Office can be opened in the building. The move is likely to cost around £20,000 because of required building work.

Scott Mann visited the charity on Saturday July 8th to speak with representatives and to view the plans for a new Post Office. The charity also kickstarted its appeal raising £2297.



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
