Jon Cleave becomes a Bard of the Gorseddh Kernow

On Saturday September 2nd, in the grounds of Launceston Castle, and after several months of secrecy befitting the Oscars, Jon Cleave became one of nine new Cornish Bards. Jon was approached back in the winter to see if he was interested in taking up the position, and after gleaning sufficient understanding of the role, decided that he would go ahead and accept a position regarded by many as a great honour for a Cornish person.



Nominees for Bardships are judged to have made notable contributions to Cornish life and culture, and Jon's include his award-winning novel and his writing on subjects of a Cornish nature (ten books to date), his children's book illustrations, collaborations in song writing, some stage and a little screen acting, voice-over and media work, and of course his performances with the *Fisherman's Friends* over many years. Jon has also done much work in Cornish schools, including workshops in writing, storytelling and singing.

The event itself was a very dignified and special occasion, and Jon was delighted to enter the circle of Bards alongside John Buckingham of Padstow, who was initiated at the same ceremony. 'Nice for a 'town crow' and 'yarny goat' to get done together,' said Jon, referring to the friendly (mostly!) rivalry between Port Isaac and Padstow.

Jon continued, 'To have been made a Cornish Bard is a very special feeling. It was a fantastic day, beautiful weather, and my family were all there to support me and were genuinely moved by the content and narrative of the ceremony. In particular my mum Yvonne (89) was very proud to see her boy in his robes! I am, of course, very aware that many of the contributions I have been able to make to Cornish culture have been done alongside my friends The Fisherman's Friends; it's been some journey we've been on together and long may it continue. Also, I doubt whether I would actually have got involved in music at all unless it was for Janet Townsend back in the early 1990's – I had been unceremoniously chucked out of my primary school choir for being a 'growler' and had not uttered a note between the ages of eight and thirty – so thank you Jan for bearing with me.'

Jon's Bardic name is Lev Enev an Tir – if you want to know what that means, you'll have to ask him!

The concept of Harbour Sessions was dreamt up by Kris Lannen from *The Grenaways* with a vision to regularly showcase high quality original live music in the breathtaking venue of St James Church with its stunning natural acoustics. These events were given the name *Harbour Sessions* as they are sponsored by the local craft brewing company, Harbour Brewing Co, who provide a selection of their wide range of ales and lager, alongside cider from Haywood Cider Farm... yes, there's a bar in the church!



Jam Experiment are a British 5-piece band that are based in London. They won the 2014 Jazz North Introduces Scheme, shortly after their debut gig supporting Liane Carroll. They have played at leading jazz festivals and venues across the UK, leaving audiences in awe. The lineup includes the winner of the inaugural BBC Young Musician Jazz Award, saxophonist Alexander Bone, trombonist Rory Ingham, Toby Comeau on piano/keyoboard, Joe Lee on bass, and Jonny Mansfield on drums. Alexander Bone and trombonist Rory Ingham were both voted as runners-up in the best instrumentalist (respectively) of the year in the British Jazz Awards 2016, and both were nominated for "Rising Star" in the 2016 British Jazz Awards, with Bone crowned Rising Star.

Jam Experiment display a fresh, energetic and honest approach of original compositions and arrangements. All band members write music for the band and contribute musical ideas equally, creating a beautifully varied set of music, and a very individual, cool and funky sound. Over the summer we have recorded over 6000 visitors into St Peter's and the visitor's book recorded lots of lovely comments about our Trio Exhibition.

"The Harvest of the Sea, Port Isaac

Thanksgiving services for the harvest of the sea were held on Sunday in Port Isaac Church, which was effectively decorated for the occasion. The walls of the nave were draped all round with fishing nets, to which here and there were hung offerings from the men's latest draught. Arranged in the windows and other parts were various fishing apparatus, relieved by boats' flags and flowers. The altar was beautifully adorned with choice chrysanthemums, as also were the font and lecturn."

Harvest

Harvest time was always very hectic. The hay harvest was not so bad but food still had to be cooked and taken to whichever field was being harvested. Olive Cann, who lived with her mother in what is now Twelve Acres', used to give my mother a hand with household chores during the summer. She and my Aunt Amy were very persistent with their cooking tuition. Looking back, they must have realised my mother's lack of interest in being a 'proper' farmer's wife was going to put the May family name for good harvest food in jeopardy, so I was their target. Also, they said it was likely I would marry a farmer so I needed to know about cooking proper food; splits, yeast buns, saffron cake, pasties and pastry were high on their agenda. Some of my first attempts would have killed a cat if aimed precisely, but their persistence was constant and by the age of thirteen or fourteen I could hold my own with them. They were also my tutors for butter making and plucking, drawing and dressing poultry.

Today we still have four Harvest Celebrations in our small parish. Trelights Chapel usually start off in early September followed by the Port Isaac School, St Peter's Church and Port Isaac RNLI Harvest Festivals.

Autumn, the time of new beginnings ...

Autumn colours are very beautiful to my eyes, leaves of deciduous trees that turn from green to hues of orange or red and bronze, eventually falling to the ground and giving their goodness back to the earth. It signifies, like so many things in autumn the end of the season. Just recently, though, I have become more aware about the new things of autumn, noticing that it is also a time of fresh beginnings. We wait with baited breath for new series and dramas to begin on TV. Babies are born to parents bringing a fresh dynamic to existing families and lots of 'firsts' for new mums and dads. On another spiritual level courses such as 'Alpha' have begun to help men and women of all ages dig deeper into the BIG questions about life and death and faith, about the love of God, the sacrifice of Jesus and the work of the Holy Spirit in the life of believers. Whatever those new beginnings are for each of us, one thing is for sure they certainly bring challenge. Jobs, schools, courses and babies may well make us question how we live and what is important to us, how and what we prioritise and how we make room for the new while ending other things well.

Rosh Hashanah is a Jewish festival that takes place in the autumn. It is the time of the Jewish New Year and before the celebrations of the new begin they have what is called the



ten days of 'awe'. It is a time for people to deal with the unfinished business of the past year. A time for quiet reflection on lessons which could have been learned, an opportunity to re-set priorities, to sort out broken relationships, give to charity and generally tying up loose ends. Whether we are actually starting something new or not, we can all have a time of 'awe' allowing God to do a new thing within us. The quieting of autumn after a busy summer and before Christmas preparations start is a good time to do it. I pray that each of us will take the opportunity to have a time of 'awe' that will bring us much peace and order in our lives.

Scott Mann, our local MP, writes ...

'm appalled to hear that two rejected developments in North Cornwall are being appealed in the High Court. Proposals by Good Energy to build a wind farm in Week St Mary and by Redrow Homes to build 190 houses in Wadebridge were both rejected by local councils and Cornwall Council, and again by the Planning Inspectorate on appeal. Both developments received widespread objection from local communities, but despite this, they are now being appealed in the High Court.

Understandably, local people in Week St Mary and Wadebridge are angry at this news, and I too am very disappointed that both developers are failing to listen to the will of local people or accept the decisions taken by Cornwall Council and the Planning Inspectorate. Both planning applications received a lot of scrutiny from local planning officers and national planning inspectors, with the wind farm even being rejected by the Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government.

I have written in the strongest terms to both companies to tell them exactly what local communities think of their legal action and to ask them to reconsider. Local people, local representatives and planning experts have made judgements on these two proposals and they need to be respected.

In Parliament I am co-chair of the Local Democracy Group, which champions towns and villages to have a louder voice and more influence in the planning process, and that's why I am very disappointed that these two companies are failing to listen to local communities.

Meanwhile, I'm very pleased to see that North Cornwall's schools will be receiving hundreds of thousands of pounds in extra funding after the Government published its new National Funding Formula last week, which includes an extra £1.3 billion for schools. I've spent the past two years campaigning for fairer school funding so that our small rural schools get the same amount of money per pupil as a school in an urban area. The new formula, coupled with the extra funding, will see every primary and secondary school in North Cornwall getting an increase in funding. I'm delighted by this outcome as it is a funding increase for every child in education in North Cornwall.

MPs have also been debating the EU Withdrawal Bill which enables us to leave the European Union after the Brexit negotiations have concluded. In order to have a smooth exit, all EU laws and regulations that govern us must be transferred into UK law at the moment that we have officially left. This means businesses and government agencies can continue to function properly. After that, Parliament is free to repeal, change or keep these laws as it sees fit. In particular, it will mean the UK is independent to improve environmental protections we have in place which were originally implemented by the EU.

Recently in Parliament we also celebrated National Farming Day to recognise the exceptional work of farmers as food suppliers and protectors of the environment. We have real opportunities to better protect our environment reach after we leave the EU, and I will be supporting more protection going forward.

So with the Harvest from the sea theme, I started to look at seafood pie recipes, and as you can properly guess there are lots and lots of them, so what makes a good fish pie?

First up the topping - Do you go pastry and if you do, do you line the base of the pie, I like a short crust base and a puff pastry top, this would work for a fish pie as the short crust pastry will hold the filling whilst the puff pastry with all it's buttery goodness gives you the wow factor.

Or do you go for what in my mind is the classic, a potato topping, but again how do you do the potato. Do you slice them and par boil and then arrange like fish scales, mash them and spoon on and mark with a fork, or pipe them! And just to throw a curve ball at you Delia has a recipe with potato rosti on top?

Next up the filling - For me you need a smoked fish in the filling, and smoked haddock is easily available but hot smoked salmon could be used instead, Ok, next some white fish and some prawns and mussels. I know that stargazy pie used sardines but we all know the story why. I find that too much oily fish will over power the pie.

For the filling you need a sauce - A white sauce is the classic version, but the French came up with a sauce that is a commination of stock and milk/cream, if you want to go the French way, cook off the mussels in white wine, onion and garlic, and when cooked pick out the mussels and keep the cooking liqueur, use the juice to make a white sauce and add cream/milk to it. Some might like to poach the smoked haddock in milk and then use the milk infused with the smoked haddock to make the sauce. Whilst I get this I like my fish cooked just once and by cooking the smoked haddock twice it will be over cooked.

Optional extras - I am just going to list of ingredients I think work, cheese, eggs,gherkins,capers,leeks,curry powder and herbs.





INGREDIENTS

1.5kg mussels, cleaned
200g natural dyed smoked haddock
250g sustainable prawns (raw or cooked)
150g sustainable salmon
3 shallots, diced small
2 garlic cloves, finely chopped
half a fennel bulb, very finely chopped
1 leek, finely chopped
1-2tbsp Pernod
250ml white wine

The béchamel

50g butter 50g flour 500ml milk or double cream 1 lemon's zest 1tsp Madras curry powder

The mash

1 kilo large Désirée potatoes 125ml double cream or milk 50g butter In a large pot on medium heat, gently sweat the shallots in a little butter until soft. Cook for a couple of minutes. Add wine and reduce by two thirds. Splash in Pernod and reduce for 30sec. Add mussels and cover and steam for 4-5min, shaking pan occasionally. Strain and save the cooking liquid. Discard any mussels that haven't opened after cooking and pick out meat from the rest.

Simmer potatoes for 20min. Drain, beat in butter, season and add a little milk or double cream. Season.

Melt 50g of butter in a pan, sauté the garlic, leeks and fennel. Add flour and stir for 1 min. Take pan off the heat and stir in the 500g of milk, bit by bit, stirring constantly until you have a creamy sauce. Pop on the heat after a few minutes and continue stirring. Add the mussels' cooking liquid and garam masala. Season to taste. In a pie dish, place the fish and all the seafood over the bottom, grating over the lemon zest. Pour over the béchamel sauce. Top with the mash. Fork the top to make a rough finish. Bake at 180C for 35-40min until golden.
