



Memory and hope

In November, we enter a season of remembering. At All Saints, we remember those who have gone before us and shown us how to live fully – people we call saints. At All Souls, we remember all those who have died, and especially our loved ones. And on Remembrance Sunday, we remember all who have died in wars and conflict, especially those serving in the armed forces.



Memory is an important way of keeping alive what is important from the past, and in our churches we do it quite a lot. Just before he died, Jesus asked his friends to remember him is a particular way. They were asked to remember him whenever they shared a meal together, breaking bread and drinking wine. We do this in a formal and symbolic way when we meet to celebrate holy communion in our churches, but perhaps we should be remembering Jesus every time we eat with members of God's family – not just meals out and special occasions, but lunches and afternoon teas as well!

Every time we share food with one another, we have a chance to remember the way that Jesus shared his love and his life with all sorts of different people, often the sorts of people who were excluded by society. And if we really do this, today, then we will also be remembering all those people in our local communities and around the world who are struggling for food and going hungry.

For me, this kind of remembering is also a call to take action to make a difference in our world today. Remembering God's generosity in the past, makes me want to reach out with that same generosity to those who are struggling today. And in this way, for me, memory leads to hope. For when we remember the way that God's limitless love poured out to the most unlikely people in Jesus' lifetime, perhaps we can also imagine our churches and communities filled with the same generous love which wants the best for all those around us, and encourages us to do whatever we can to help.

If remembering the good enables us to do whatever good we can, then I think we can be filled with hope for the future.

The Golden Circle had a lovely 'meet & eat' at Trevathan Farm on a stormy autumn afternoon in October.As usual there was lots of catching up, laughter and tales from the past.

The event was all paid for by the *Doc Martin Fund* whose aim is to enable and pay for both the young and old in our community to enjoy special times together.

The wind was blowing up the valley from the south, so it had the effect of smoothing the waters immediately adjacent to the land. Websites of the Month



Some months back I spent a few days in Amsterdam and was amazed at the number of bikes. They were everywhere, with massive bike parks (one houses over 3000 bikes!) that here are only seen for cars. In the morning, you had to be a bit careful not to be knocked down by the number of cyclists. I saw a whole family cycling with what looked like a four-year old, a six-year old with a mum and dad, all happily chatting together.

While its different over here generally, Cornwall offers some really wonderful cycling routes, where you can get off the roads. In Bodmin, while the road works have seemed to go on for ever, they look like they may be in their final stages and this road works project was at least partly to establish some new cycle trails. So, for this month I thought we could see what the web has on offer for cycling. For an overall site of cycling trails across the southwest a good place to start is Sustrans (www.sustrans.org.uk/ncn/map) which has a lot of information about campaigns for cycling and the details of where you can cycle, taking bikes on trains and so on.

The trails associated with the Bodmin road works (Build a better Bodmin) are a bit hard to find online, but there is a useful map https://tinyurl.com/yckbmpsp from the construction company showing where they will be. The plan is to connect Bodmin with Lanhydrock, the Camel Trail and Cardinham Woods, and some of this has been completed – for example the Scarlett's Well project was completed last year https://tinyurl.com/Scarletts-well-project

The cycle trail I have been exploring recently is the Camel Trail (for history see https:// en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Camel Trail) from Wadebridge – one way goes to Bodmin and the other to Padstow and you can view and download maps from www.cameltrailmap.co.uk . This website has a useful interactive map, showing where you can get refreshments on the various bits of the trail and the code you should follow. This includes giving way to pedestrians, dogs being kept under control and so on. The mixture of people cycling and walking these trails ranges from small children with families and lots of older people (like myself). Some of them seem to be very fit indeed. As the trail follows the route of the River Camel (a lovely website about west country rivers has details http:// wrt.org.uk/protect/river-camel) where there are many interesting marine and freshwater birds, you will also find birdwatchers taking photographs and peering through their binoculars. There are also bird hides so you can watch the wildlife without disturbance.

There are many other cycling and waking trails across Cornwall and the Council website https://tinyurl.com/Cornwall-cycle-trails has some details and links. Additionally, for those that go through Forestory Commission land their website has good information - for instance this link is for the Bodmin Beast blue cycling trail www.forestry.gov.uk/forestry/infd-9a3kbx . This gives a rating for difficulty, and in addition to the risks of bumping into the Beast of Bodmin, it says: *"You will encounter a number of technical climbs and descents, snaking single track trail and features such as tight bermed corners, small step downs, rollers and table tops. All features can be rolled over at a moderate speed. The trail is exposed to steep unfenced side slopes in places."*

There are also many apps that are useful to consider and here are two I thought were useful. The first is from the Forestry Commission and is called Forest Xplorer. In this app you can search for forests near you, and if they have a cycling track (for example Cardinham Woods) there is map with details of cafes, picnic areas, play areas and so on. Another app that tracks where you have cycled (or run) is Runkeeper. This is free and gives you a map at the end of where you have been.

Hope you get on your bike soon!

Despite the continued bad weather the hall was filled with both pies and people all eating and enjoying themselves for a good cause. It was also lovely to see Julian Waring, fundraising manager and representative from the *Fishermens Mission*, enjoying and supporting the fish themed event.

"Live" Theatre at the Regal

Did your know that The Regal Cinema in Wadebridge regularly shows live screenings of performances by the Royal Ballet, the Royal Opera House. the National Theatre and the Royal Shakespeare Company.

Ticket prices are fixed by the production company but are usually $\pounds 15$ ($\pounds 12.50$ for over 60s and under 15s). The screenings are usually on a Thursday evening and more often than not, sold out.

The performances start at 7pm and there is the opportunity to watch prerecorded material about the screening and the rehearsal process, including interviews with key people including performers and production staff.

The recorded performance takes place in front of a live audience but the cameras are strictly on the stage. The actors have special rehearsals before a "live screening" as the cameras can pick up on every facial expression, expressions that could be missed in a large theatre. The sound is clear and true and the picture is sharp so there is no reduction in quality in these cinema screenings. So if you fancy giving it a try keep your on the Regal website for what's "COMING SOON".

The annual Poppy Appeal takes place every October and the need to raise even more funds this year has increased as demands continue, not just to honour those who have lost their lives but for those who survived and are left with physical and mental injuries and to support their families.

Scott Mann, our local MP, writes ..

Like many in Cornwall, I was very concerned to hear that the Royal Cornwall Hospitals Trust was being placed into 'special measures' after the Care Quality Commission (CQC) found it to be Inadequate for safety, responsiveness and being well led. The CQC found that surgery, maternity and gynaecology, end-of-life and outpatient services at Treliske Hospital were Inadequate, with the Penrice Birthing Centre also being rated as Requires Improvement.

However, the CQC has rated critical care and children and young people's services as Good, with services provided at St Michaels Hospital and West Cornwall Hospital as Good. Inspectors also found that RCHT has made improvements in many areas which were flagged for concern previously, particularly the reporting of incidents and staffing levels during busy periods.

Most importantly, however, the CQC said staff are consistently compassionate and that they treat patients with kindness and respect, particularly those in mental health crisis. No one doubts that the doctors, nurses and staff at RCHT are hard-working and dedicated to caring for the people of Cornwall, and everyone in the county values their work. However, there are clearly failings at a management level and how various services and resources are allocated, and my sole focus will be to demand improvements for my constituents, regardless of who delivers it.

Over the coming weeks, NHS England and RCHT will be working to address the issues highlighted by the CQC so that the people of

Cornwall have the best level of care possible, and I want to reiterate that this is my sole focus. I have been assured by the Department of Health that a range of support is being provided to RCHT, including an Improvement Director and arrangements with NHS trusts in Devon to provide executive support. There is national dedicated funding available to any trust that is placed in Special Measures, and I have been assured that RCHT will have full access to this to support improvement.

Although the reason for the problems at RCHT are not solely down to an increase in demand, it is clear that more services are needed in other communities rather than the majority of people being funnelled into Truro, and earlier this year I wrote to NHS Kernow to express my support for the creation of an urgent care hub in Launceston. Not only would this allow the people of North Cornwall to be better cared for in the constituency, but it would take pressure off of Treliske Hospital which would help the whole of Cornwall.

We should explore ways of offering more NHS services in other parts of Cornwall which typically would only be found in Treliske. Of course, there will always be some services and procedures which will have to be based out of Treliske or Derriford, but as part of the Sustainability and Transformation Plan process currently being undertaken by Cornwall Council and NHS Kernow, we should look at replicating more

services in other hospitals and medical centres, as well as integrating health and social care.

Patients should be cared for as close as possible to their home, with more joined-up working between hospitals, GPs and social care providers so that the people of Cornwall are cared for much better in their home rather than having to visit hospital.

Hello

After a busy summer we are now moving into the autumn with two big consultations being conducted by Cornwall Council which will have an impact on all of us.

The summer season has seen a mixed bag of weather but visitor numbers hopefully have not been affected.

St Endellion PC continue to work hard on your behalf and I have attended as many meetings as possible. I have been very pleased to see the progress made with the Neighbourhood Plan, although not popular with everyone, in areas such as ours they are in my opinion, a must have, without some form of protection in place there is no stopping unfettered development. I would urge you all to get involved and give your support to the hard work being done to create a plan for your area.

The first consultation is concerning waste, as an area that has had a pilot scheme tried and tested, you will all be well placed to give your views when the consultation is rolled out in the new year. It remains to be seen if fortnightly collections and food waste are to be included in the consultation.

The other consultation that will affect us all is the ward boundary changes. The boundary commission have decided the number of Cornwall Councillors to be elected in 2021 is to drop from 123 to 87. This of course will mean every elected councillor will have to represent a much larger electorate. It is estimated each newly elected councillor will represent 5000 residents. At present the number for St Minver and St Endellion is in the region of 2300. The first draft shows St Endellion Parish being split from St Minver Highlands and Lowlands and merging with St Tudy and St Mabyn. St Minver Highlands and Lowlands will merge with half of Wadebridge and St Breock. It must be stressed however, that this is the first draft and anyone can view the mapping and comment to the boundary commission. There will be open events in the new year that will set out more clearly what the options are. You can view the process on the boundary commission website www.igbce.org.uk and you can leave your individual comments on the consultation portal, Consultation.lgcbe.org.uk

Martin's Cheddar and Martin's Cheddar and Cider soup

I suggest a mature, full-flavoured cheddar such as Keens. The stock should, if possible, be homemade, chicken or vegetable. Bread is pretty much non-negotiable here, toasted and dipped into the soup's creamy depths.



Serves 6 onions 2, medium butter 30g carrots 2, medium celery 1 stick milk 400ml

plain flour 45g chicken or vegetable stock 400ml cider 350ml mustard 1 tsp cheddar 400g chopped parsley a small handful

Peel and roughly chop the onions. Melt the butter in a deep saucepan over a moderate heat then cook the onions till soft. Scrub and finely dice the carrot, finely dice the celery, then add to the softening onion and continue cooking for 10 minutes or so till tender.

Warm the milk in a small saucepan and set aside. Stir the flour into the vegetables and continue cooking for two or three minutes, then add the milk and stir to a thick sauce. Pour in the chicken stock and cider, bringing it to the boil then lowering the heat and letting the mixture simmer for a few minutes. Stir in the mustard, check the seasoning. (It may want pepper, but probably very little salt.)

Grate the cheese and stir into the soup, leaving it to simmer (**it is crucial it doesn't boil**) for five minutes, until the soup has thickened. Add a handful of parsley as you bring it to the table and serve with bread.

Baked squash with celery and herb cream

1 squash creme fraiche (you need enough to ¾ fill the squash) lemon juice 3 sprigs celery leaves 1 sprig rosemary 2 sprigs thyme or sage 1 knob butter 1 clove garlic finely chopped grated nutmeg 150g good melting cheese, such as comte, gruyere or cheddar, grated sea salt and black pepper

To garnish (optional) olive oil 3 tbsp sage 4-5 leaves Heat the oven to 200C/gas mark 6. Cut the top off the squash to make a lid and set aside. Scoop out the seeds and a little of the flesh so that you are left with a clean squash bowl. To stop the squash toppling over, it is a good idea to make a base for it to sit on: take a roughly 30cm square piece of foil, squeeze it together and shape it into a "bracelet". Put it in a roasting tin and place the squash on top.

Fill the squash three-quarters full with creme fraiche and then add the lemon juice, herb sprigs, butter, garlic and grated nutmeg or the cinnamon stick. Season with salt and pepper.

Place the lid back on the squash. Cover with foil and bake for at least an hour. The cooking time will vary, depending on the size of your squash. It is done when a sharp knife slides through the flesh with no resistance.

Remove the herb sprigs and sprinkle in the grated cheese. Place the squash back in the oven, without the foil, for about 10 minutes, until it has browned and the cheese is nice and gooey.

The fried sage garnish is optional, but it looks and tastes great. Heat the olive oil in a small frying pan and add the sage leaves, making sure they are completely dry if you have washed them. Fry for about 30 seconds, until crisp, then remove and place on kitchen paper to drain. Sprinkle the leaves on top of the squash filling.

The easiest way to serve this is to spoon out the creamy contents on to each person's plate and then cut chunks off the squash horizontally, working your way down. Serve with toasted sourdough bread. You could do small squashes and serve one per person.
