

January date set for the opening of Post Office in the Perceval Institute at St Minver

There has been much rumour concerning the opening date. We had hoped it was to be November 21st. Everything has progressed well. By some miracle and good planning, the program for delivery of important items has occurred right on time. However, one major component seemingly beyond anybody's control, has proven to be BT Openreach. In spite of ours being one of the first applications, completed as long ago as August 2017, it is only in the last week that we have a date for commencement of road works to enable the supply to be brought to the building. Unfortunately that date has passed without any work starting.

It is now apparent that the earliest date for opening will be January 15th 2018. We wanted to ensure good Post office service during the build up for Christmas but this has not proved possible.

Unfortunately the post office systems require closure of the old office to occur some ten days prior to the opening date in the new premises. Such things as training and engineering issues can only occur during that period.

We are nearly there and we must be very grateful for the tremendous support that has occurred since our appeal was launched in July this year. This has enabled rapid progress of the project and we are grateful to our local builders and tradesmen for their support. The funds raised from within our community have, as usual, been quite staggering and will enable us to provide for the community a first class resource well into the future and that was always our prime motive.



Sadly the fundraising Entertainers show had to be postponed due to a serious road accident involving Rob Badlan, one of the stars. We are delighted that he's making a great recovery and a new date in the Spring has been promised.

We also hope to open a Memory Cafe in next summer with the help of the Memory team in Wadebridge.

Once again our committee wishes to express their sincere thanks for the financial and practical support they have received from the local community and beyond.

A HUGE and ENORMOUS

On Saturday November 25th the Co-op presented the money raised by customers using their membership card. In Port Isaac £2980 was given to three charities - Port Isaac Village Hall (£1053), Port Isaac Stay & Play Group (£967) and the Endelienta Story Box project (£960). Representatives from all three charities are pictured above.

The Stay & Playgroup told *Trio*, "We are very grateful for all the money that has been raised. We are going to buy a mini sound system and some musical instruments so that we can have a greater variety of music and more of the children can get involved in our music sessions. Plus some new bouncy hoppers are on our shopping list - the ones we have really need replacing due to lots and lots of bouncing! We will also be buying some small tables and chairs for our creative play and group snack time. The generosity of the Co-op and its customers enables the children in our group to get more involved, to try new things and to prepare themselves for going to school."

The Village Hall are putting their money towards the extension to house a new kitchen and multi-acess toilet and baby changing facilites. Said Chairman, Andy Penny, "All of the Village Hall Committee thank the Co-op and its customers. The money we have been given will make a big difference to our improvements to the hall. This is something that will benefit everyone who uses the hall and we are slowly but surely making progress. We really do appreciate everyone's support. Thank you." Treasurer, Dee Littlechild continued, "We would also like to thank Darren, the manager at the Co-op who is always happy for us to fundraise in store. As well as all the proceeds from the second-hand book shelves going to the Hall and the Stay & Playgroup, he made space for our homemade cake stall (and also baked for us) on the Community Day from which we raised a further £189."

The North Cornwall Story Box is a project about story telling, story making and story collecting with individuals and groups in the communities of North Cornwall. It has already seen a series of workshops in five schools in the area, led by storytelling artists, who helped children delve into local histories and anecdotes. Talking of the project, Ian Sandbrook explained, "More workshops with schools are continuing into January 2018. We would also like to hear from elderly residents in the area, who have personal memories or stories of the past that deserve to be shared by others and younger folk. If you have a story to tell, something relating to



a special place or person or memory, please get in touch with Katy Luxton at katy@endelienta.org.uk
The project will run until end of March and finish with an exhibition and community event. It is organised by Endelienta, the local charity working to bring about more cultural events in this part of Cornwall. We are enormously grateful for the people and the Co-op in Port Isaac for supporting this initiative. The Story Box has also received support from Heritage Lottery Funding.

The next round of Co-op fundraising has already begun and once again the Stay & Playgroup and the Village Hall have been chosen as recipients. However, you do need to reselect your chosen charity on your Co-op

And a final "don't forget" - the used book shelf in the Co-op supports the Hall and the Playgroup. If you have any books to donate just take them up to the Co-op and put them on the book shelves - they are near the cash point.


Make your own Christmas Snow Globe





Scott Mann's update from Parliament

2017 has been another memorable year in politics, and like the previous two years during my time in Parliament, it has been dominated by elections and Brexit with never a dull moment.

In March the Prime

Minister triggered Article 50 to start the two year withdrawal process from the EU,

honoring the referendum result in Cornwall and the UK.

Shortly afterwards a General Election was called, and just like in 2015, I was knocking on doors and meeting thousands of people up and down North Cornwall. I am back in North Cornwall every weekend, but it was great to spend six weeks in the constituency and travel to its biggest towns and smallest villages, meeting as many people as possible to get their feedback on me as their MP, the government and what issues matter to them. Although the result nationally was not what many expected, I was absolutely honoured that the people of North Cornwall once again put their faith in me and re-elected me as their MP.

Amongst all the national political ups and downs of the past 12 months, we have seen some real progress for North Cornwall in terms of education, infrastructure and health services, and some personal achievements as well.

In April I ran the London Marathon in aid of charities which support North Cornwall's main hospitals in Bodmin, Stratton and Launceston. This was my first marathon and I was delighted to cross the finish line in under five hours and raise over £3,000 for such good causes.

In the Spring we also saw the Government commit an extra £24 million for social care in Cornwall so that we can better look after the elderly and vulnerable in our communities, an extra £1 million for the Royal Cornwall Hospitals Trust to improve A&E waiting times, and new mental health services including the green light for a special centre in Bodmin to help teenagers with mental health conditions.

During the summer we saw the official opening of the new dual carriageway on Bodmin Moor which will end decades of traffic jam misery. The £60 million scheme will be a huge boost for the Cornish economy, and we are already seeing businesses move closer to the A30 and Bodmin.

Post-election I was also appointed as a Parliamentary Private Secretary to the Rail, Road and Maritime Ministers in the Department for Transport. In this role I assist the ministers with their daily work, from meeting other MPs to discuss local issues to helping them get legislation through the House of Commons. It's a fun and challenging role and I was delighted to be asked to do it. We have a number of transport priorities in North Cornwall and I will be making these known to the Department.

In the Autumn we then heard that all schools in North Cornwall were due to get a funding increase through the new National Funding Formula which I have campaigned heavily for since 2015. There has long been a disparity between funding in rural and urban schools, and this new formula, plus an extra £1.3 billion, will see all schools getting an increase in funding to help them employ more staff and increase resources.

It has been a privilege to serve as North Cornwall's MP for another year, and I very much look forward to taking our priorities forward in the next. I wish you all a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.



PORT ISAAC RNLI RESCUE MAN AND DOG FROM ROCKY VALLEY

At 11.06am on Wednesday November 1st, Port Isaac RNLI were tasked to a man and his dog trapped at Rocky Valley.

Bude and Boscastle Coastguards were initially paged and tasked to Rocky Valley, just north of Tintagel, following the report of a dog trapped in the water with the adult male owner stuck having descended the cliff in an attempt to rescue. They made their way down the valley with water rescue equipment, should it be required. It was quickly determined that access to the casualty and his dog was treacherous and that the safest way to recover would be from the sea. With conditions being calm. Port Isaac volunteer lifeboat crew were tasked by Falmouth Coastguard Operations Centre with the Coastguard staying on to monitor and reassure the casualty.

WEBSITES OF THE MONTH

How quickly it has come around — Christmas 2017. And to say it has become commercialised is a bit of an understatement. The sales used to start after Christmas, then gradually got earlier, and now with all the Black Friday and related days, it seems like there are permanent sales in progress. So, to ward off too much Bah Humbug, here are some festive

websites that offer a bit

of fun.

To start us off I thought the history of Christmas in Cornwall would be a good place. Down in Penzance they have revived one of the old festivals called Montol and this year you can



find details on Facebook https://tinyurl.com/Montol2017. This festival's name probably means either 'balance' or 'winter soltice' (details here https://cornishculture.co.uk/festivals/montol) and is traditionally celebrated on December 21st, the date of the Winter Solstice when the sun is at its lowest point and the days are at their shortest. Some of the activities that happen in the Montol festival go back a long way, some to medieval times; for example, The Guise dance, also known as Goosy dancing comes from disguising yourself, dancing and making mischief. William Bottrell in his book Traditions and Hearthside Stories of West Cornwall says:

"During the early part of the last century the costume of the guise dancers often consisted of such antique finery as would now raise envy in the heart of a collector. The chief glory of the men lay in their cocked hats which were surmounted with plumes and decked with streamers and ribbons. The girls were no less magnificently attired with steeple crowned hats, stiff bodied gowns, bag skirts or trains and ruffles hanging from their elbows."

And you can read more about these traditions on wikipedia - Montol Festival.

For our own village history, you can get a very nice CD of Port Isaac carols and music performed by local musicians available from the PISCES shop www.portisaacheritage.co.uk/publications/shop plus the website has lots about the local history with people's memories of traditions gone by.

More recent ways to enjoy Christmas online include some websites that follow Santa during the days leading up to Christmas. For example, Google have a Santa Tracker website (https://santatracker.google.com/village.html) that says you can explore, play and learn with Santa's elves, all December long. It is very interactive and has a sort of advent calendar feel about it. As when I was writing this it was still November, I wasn't able to sample any of the games, but when December 24th arrives you will be able to track Santa all night! Associated with this site is one for teachers, https://santatracker.google.com/educators.html which has a selection of lessons and educational games for kids. Both sites are well designed and easy to use.

There are also many activities going on in Cornwall during the festive season and the National Trust has a list of events taking place in their various settings, https://tinyurl.com/NT-Cornwall-Xmas

Another way is to think about what you will be cooking and there are many, many websites devoted to this. My choice is the BBC good food site, as it is well laid out and has some excellent advice (https://www.bbcgoodfood.com/recipes/category/christmas-dinner).

It's game time again and one of the easiest birds to cook is a pheasant, they are cheap and easy to find. I like to make a wet brine of 50g course sea salt and 30g of brown sugar to a litre of water. Just bring to a boil and simmer until all the ingredients are dissolved - you can flavour it with anything you have to hand. Once cooled immerse the pheasant in the brine and leave for at least 2/3 hours - I do it for 24 hours. This will draw out all the blood and grime from the bird and also help keep the bird moist.

Brining is also is my top tip for Christmas make as much of the brine as needed to cover your Christmas Turkey and brine it for 24 hours, trust me once you have tried this you will never eat a another dry Turkey again (unless you over cook it!).

Poached pheasant
2 pheasant crowns
2 ltr chicken stock

Parsnips

5 parsnip 50 ml of double cream 1 lemon 1 knob of butter salt and pepper

Savoy cabbage

1 savoy cabbage 1 shallot, finely sliced 1 pinch of fresh thyme 1 garlic clove, chopped 50ml double cream 1 knob of butter

For the parsnip purée: Peel the parsnips and cook them in gently boiling chicken stock until tender, around 15-20 minutes Remove them from the stock and blend 3 of the parsnips in a food processor. Add half of the cream and a little of the stock (reserving the rest for poaching) and blend until silky smooth. Season with salt, pepper and lemon and pass through a sieve. Place in a small pot, cover and set aside

For the cabbage: Take the 4 outer leaves from the cabbage and blanch them in boiling salted water until tender. Then finely slice the rest of the cabbage to its core. Blanch the sliced cabbage until tender, around 4-5 minutes, strain and remove all the water by gently squeezing the cabbage

Cook the shallot in a pan on a medium heat with a little butter and add the remaining cream with the thyme and garlic. Reduce slightly and add the sliced cabbage stirring to combine. Season to taste with salt and pepper and cool in the fridge

Once cool, shape the sliced cabbage into 4 equal balls and wrap each one in the cabbage leaves, then wrap tightly in cling film to hold the shape

For the pheasant: Preheat the oven to 180°C/gas mark 4. Bring the chicken stock to the boil in a pan. Once

boiling, remove the pan from the heat and place the pheasant crowns into the stock, cover and leave for 10 minutes

Remove the pheasant from the pan and patdry. Heat a sauté pan and add a little oil. Season the pheasant with salt and pepper and place the crowns down in the sauté pan, colour the skin side until golden brown and place in the oven for a further 6-8 minutes

Warm the cabbage balls in some boiling water for 4 minutes, then remove and cut off the cling film. Cut and then pan-fry the remaining parsnips in a little butter until golden brown. Remove the pheasant from the oven and leave to rest for 5 minutes on a tray cover with foil to retain the heat.

In the pan that the pheasant was roasted add a splash of sherry and on a high heat reduce by half add some of the chicken stock used for the poaching and reduce down by half to make a gravy, add a knob of butter and whisk in to add body, the quality of the stock will have a big influence on the quality of the gravy.

Re-heat the parsnip purée, cut the pheasant from the crown and place onto the plate, first the parsnip purée, a stuffed cabbage ball, half a parsnip and a breast of pheasant, dress the plate with the gravy. Serve with a nice bowl of creamy mashed potato.
