



NOVEMBER FIREWORKS NIGHT PORT GAVERNE

Reluctantly St Endellion Parish Council has taken the decision to not have a bonfire on Port Gaverne beach in 2018 and for the foreseeable future.

The Fireworks display will continue as usual on a Saturday near to November 5th

Unfortunately the requirements of our insurers of a 75m exclusion zone around the bonfire makes it impossible to legally continue in a safe manner. Plus our requests for 'timber and hedge cuttings only', while supported by most, continues to be ignored by the few. Last years deposits included a car battery, two tyres, a tin of roofing compound and two 5 litre cans of antifreeze. We, along with the National Trust who owns the beach, also have concerns over the remnants of the fire, which may include plastic, being washed out to sea.

On a positive note, this gives a everyone a chance to think a little bit outside the box. Is there something else that can go on, on the beach that night? Permission from The National Trust is required. Happy to have a chat.

Scott Mann's update from Parliament

I greatly welcome the Prime Minister's recent speech where she outlined the Government's commitment to protecting the environment and clamping down on plastic waste.



Launching the Government's new Environment Plan, Theresa May highlighted our steps for a cleaner, greener Britain that will leave our environment in a better state than we found it for the next generation.

This includes a pledge to eliminate all avoidable plastic waste, encouraging supermarkets to introduce plastic-free aisles, extending the 5p charge for plastic bags to all retailers and issuing a consultation on taxing the most environmentally damaging plastics.

To date, we have used nine billion fewer plastic bags as a consequence of introducing the 5p charge. This has led to a reduction of 83 per cent and J95 million has been donated to environmental educational, and other good causes.

The Government has also launched a public consultation on introducing a bottle deposit return scheme which could significantly increase the amount that we recycle. A system already exists in Germany whereby customers get money or vouchers when returning plastic bottles, which means that they save money on their next shop as well as helping to protect the environment.

It is our duty to leave our planet in a better state for the next generation, with cleaner air, stronger protections for animal welfare and greener spaces.

Readers will no doubt be aware of the challenges facing the NHS this winter, which has seen longer waits at A&E and wards filling up with people suffering from winter illnesses.

In the lead up to this winter, the Government allocated an additional J100 million to A&Es across England, including \pounds 1.6m for the Royal Cornwall Hospitals Trust, \pounds 2.4m for Plymouth Hospitals Trust and over \pounds 800,000 for North Devon.

It is inevitable that during the winter the NHS faces extra pressure, however, after a recent meeting with NHS Kernow, I was told that one-third of people who turn up at A&E don't need to be there and should be going to minor injury units or GPs, and we need to get better at signposting people to the best place for their treatment.

Readers may also have seen recent reports that ten Minor Injury Units were likely to close in Cornwall, including three in North Cornwall. These reports, which were false and politicised, caused great concern amongst people in Cornwall, and NHS Kernow have assured me in person that there are no plans to close MIUs.

A much-needed review is currently underway into the county's health and social care systems, and this includes looking at how best to deliver local NHS services while integrating health and social care to make sure that people can be cared for in their communities instead of in hospital.

The review is being undertaken by NHS Kernow, Cornwall Council and other parties, and the people of North Cornwall can be confident that I will hold these organisations to account and that I want an NHS which delivers high quality local services to everyone.


C.S Lewis wrote "He gives them the seasons, each season different yet every year the same, so that spring is always felt as a novelty ..."

On March 31st last year, a family and their young spaniel, Bugsy were walking along the coastal footpath approaching Port Isaac when he wriggled through a hole in a dilapidated gate and fell into the water.

Port Isaac RNLI was tasked to the scene and Bugsy was quickly spotted by volunteer crewman George Cleave. Bugsy had managed to scramble onto rocks in a cave. He was safely recovered and returned to his extremely grateful owners who pledged to raise money for the charity as a way of expressing their thanks.

They did just that and Lee Davies, Mark Coles and Cath Davies did the RNLI H20 challenge. This involves NO tea. NO coffee. NO fizzy drinks. NO wine. NO beer. NO juice. JUST water for 10 tough days. They completed the challenge and raised a fantastic £800 which has been donated to the station's newly launched lifeboat appeal to raise £52,000 to buy a new D-Class lifeboat.

Lee Davies says: "The money is to say a massive thanks for rescuing Bugsy. As you can imagine we are forever grateful."

All parties will be visiting the outstanding training facility at RNLI HQ Poole imminently to take advantage of the facilities they have there.

Training commitment has never been better at the station and the support and facilities made available to us through your generous donations mean we can ensure we stay as safe as possible when out on active service, I am very proud of the crew and their hard work which allows me to boast as having one of the best and most capable crews in the RNLI's fleet!

I would also like to extend a further thank you for all of the support and donations given for the crew's participation in DECEMBEARD. We all became furry for December to raise money and awareness for bowel cancer and managed to raise over £500.

Finally we would like to welcome James Uglow onto the shore crew; he has already made a big impact and will be a great asset.

We had a storming start to our announcement on November 1st 2017 of an appeal to cover the funding of a new lifeboat for Port Isaac Station. As our current D Class *Copeland Bell* entered its thirteenth year of active service, so the Nathan Outlaw Fish Kitchen made a generous donation of £14,000 to launch the new boat appeal.

The target is to reach \pounds 52.000 by 2019. Response has been stunning with letters of support and donations including 6,600 dollars from a dedicated supporter in America. Equally important and just as valued are the smaller donations - every penny counts towards this most important project.

Currently the appeal fund stands at over £28,000!! The result will be in the knowledge that our dedicated volunteer crew, who are on call 24/7. are backed by the very latest and up-to date seagoing equipment of the very highest standard, essential to operations often in hostile sea going conditions along the North Coast Cornwall.

Planning Applications

The following applications were received and Members made the following responses to Cornwall Council:

- 1. PA17/09950, 36 New Road, Port Isaac replace existing dormer bungalow with a detached four-bed dwelling. **SUPPORT** in principle, but Members had reservations about the balcony which overlooks neighbouring property. Cllr. Phelps said he was in favour of the application as it is.
- PA17/10456, 30 Dolphin Street, Port Isaac proposed replacement window, chimney flue removal, re-roof in natural slate and new roof light.
 SUPPORT, providing second-hand Delabole rag slate is used.
- 3. PA17/10681, 23 New Road, Port Isaac proposed replacement dwelling amendments to approved design under decision PA17/00693. **SUPPORT**.
- 4. PA17/10691, Maritime and Coastguard Agency, New Road, Port Isaac proposed two new dwellings to replace existing decommissioned Coastguard building. **OBJECT** the building is an over development of the site and causes overlooking issues. The building extends the building line forward towards the SW coastal path and creates a precedent for development in gardens in this character area which to date has been refused.
- 5. PA17/11068, Little Tremiro, Lower Trefreock, Port Isaac construction of extensions, subterranean garage and garden studio. **SUPPORT**.
- 6. PA17/10144, 3 The Platt Store, Fore Street, Port Isaac listed building consent for re-roofing 3 of the stores with the same Delabole Rag slate that is on there now with treatment of the timbers and felt underneath. **SUPPORT**.
- 7. PA17/09309, 89 Fore Street Port Isaac front and rear extensions, re roof, new dormer, windows and internal alterations. **OBJECT** because this is in a conservation area and the flow of the terrace would be spoiled by the installation of double doors. Members refer to previous historic refusal for alterations to the street elevation of the terrace.
- 8. Site adjacent to Under Town in Trelights – a draft plan for a possible housing development was previously circulated via email. Cllr. Bell said there were no amenities in Trelights and he felt this application was inappropriate. Social housing is needed in Port Isaac. There is a high turnover of tenants in the existing development. Messrs. Evans and Slatter (NP Consultants) did not believe planning permission would be granted. Cllr. Phelps said he was in favour of affordable housing, but felt this development was too large. Cllr. Penny said he would only be in favour if it were a self-build project. Cllr. Williams pointed out that as a Parish located in an AONB we have a zero housing allocation. The density of the proposal would introduce a large amount of traffic into a location that has a challenging local road network with no pavements or street lighting. Resident children would have to be driven to school in Port Isaac as the local road network is perilous. Access via Undertown is unsuitable. Parking in Undertown is on the opposite side of the street from the housing, there are high volumes of pedestrians crossing and children playing in the cul-de-sac. With few visitors around at the moment, we cannot blame the problem on them (or their dogs!)! There are plenty of dog bins about and remember, you are breaking the law if you don't pick up after your dog.



Two tasty veggie recipes from Martin

Welcome back rear reader, and to start the year off a couple of tasty veggie dishes for you to try

Purple-sprouting broccoli with rice noodles

2cm piece ginger, peeled and chopped 1 medium green chilli, deseeded and roughly chopped 11/2 lemongrass stalks, outer layer and tough ends removed, chopped 1 garlic clove, crushed 1/2 shallot, peeled and chopped 1/2 tbsp coriander seeds, ground

1/2 tsp cumin seeds, finely ground Grated zest and juice of 1/2 a lime 2 tbsp vegetable oil, plus extra to sauté the onion 1 bunch fresh coriander, stalks, roots and all, washed

600g purple-sprouting broccoli 450g wide rice noodles 1 red onion, finely chopped 4 tbsp sesame oil

- 1½ tsp palm sugar 3 tbsp lime juice, plus more to finish
- 7 kaffir lime leaves 2 tbsp sweet basil, shredded

400ml coconut milk 75g toasted pistachio nuts, chopped salt

Start by making a curry paste. Put the first 10 ingredients in the small bowl of a food processor and blend to a paste. You can also do this with a large pestle and mortar.

Trim any leaves from the broccoli and divide into large florets. Heat a tablespoon of oil in a saucepan and sauté the onion for two to three minutes until translucent. Add the curry paste and cook, stirring, for two minutes. Add half a teaspoon of salt, the palm sugar, lime leaves and coconut milk, bring to a boil, then turn down the heat and simmer for five minutes.

Have ready two saucepans with boiling salted water. In one cook the noodles as instructed on the packet, and in the other cook the broccoli for a minute or two. Drain both. Rinse the noodles briefly under hot water, drain, toss in three tablespoons of sesame oil and the lime juice, and season well with salt. Drizzle the remaining sesame oil over the broccoli and sprinkle with a pinch of salt.

Divide the noodles between wide bowls and top with the broccoli. For each serving, spoon three to four tablespoons of sauce over and around the broccoli, and finish with basil, pistachio and a squirt of lime.

I hope you give these recipes a go, enjoy Mx

Fried rice cakes with creamed leeks and egg

1 tsp saffron strands 400g cooked rice of any variety 100g diced gruyère Salt and freshly ground black pepper 2 tbsp olive oil, plus extra for frying the cakes 3 leeks, trimmed and cut into 1cm-thick slices 250ml vegetable stock 100ml double cream Freshly crushed black peppercorns 2 tbsp chopped tarragon 5 free-range eggs

In a small bowl, stir the saffron with about a tablespoon of boiling water, leave to infuse for a couple of minutes, then stir into the rice. Add the gruyère to the rice mix, and season well.


Next, heat the olive oil in a large frying pan and, on high heat, fry the leeks for three minutes to give them a little colour. Add the stock, cream and plenty of crushed black peppercorns, and carry on cooking on a slow simmer for about 10 minutes, until the leeks are soft and the sauce is thick. Add salt to taste and keep warm. Stir in the tarragon just before serving.

Add one egg to the rice mix, and stir well. Pour a tiny amount of olive oil into a large, nonstick frying pan and place over a medium heat. With a spoon, take some of the rice mix and press it down into the hot oil to create four flat cakes about 1cm thick and 7cm in diameter. Fry them on both sides until crispy and brown, about four minutes a side. Transfer to absorbent paper and keep warm while you make another four cakes.

Once all the rice cakes are made, crack the four remaining eggs into the same pan and fry, seasoning just before they're done. Serve two cakes per person and spoon over some of the creamed leeks. Top each portion with a fried egg and serve.




