



The Trevan Book

Thanks to a generous donation from the Doc Martin Fund we have been able to reprint the Trevan book. It is now on sale again in *The Pottery* and Secrets and other local outlets as well as via our website www.portisaacheritage.co.uk priced £10.

For those who don't know, this book was hand-written by John Watts Trevan in 1834. It describes in great detail the parish of Endellion and its people in the years immediately prior to the Victorian era.

John Watts Trevan was born in 1800, the second child (of ten) to John Archer Trevan and Ann Trevan (nee Watts), and he died in 1857. Not a lot is known about him. His father was the local Customs collector. The Port Isaac family home was White House Cottage on Roscarrock Hill; having an uninterrupted view of the comings and goings in the harbour, it would be just the place for the local Customs official. Trevan House in Dolphin Street, was subsequently the home of John's brother Frederick, the village doctor. At the time the book was written, Frederick was living in the adjacent property, now called Vesta Cottage, which has an old plaque 'A Trevan 1812' above the door.

The original manuscript consists of 328 small pages each 105mm by 170mm with delightful watercolour illustrations. The Port Isaac


Local History Group purchased the book in 1999, and it was deposited on permanent loan at the County Records Office, Truro the following year, so this unique original document will be available for future generations (CRO reference X1126). And the rest, as they say, is history ...

The official launch of the reprinted book will take place in the springtime and our plan is to involve the local school children, members of the Golden Circle and the whole village in our events.

One of the things we would like to do is compile our own record of the Parish in 2018 and you will have the chance to include your family in this document.

Look out in next month's Trio for all the details.

Our next meeting is in St Peter's Church at 4pm on Tuesday March 13th - you would be made very welcome if you want to come and join us. There is usually cake involved!





FUNDRAISING APPEAL IS **BOOSTED BY SUPPORT FROM** MID HERTS DIVERS

Mid Herts Divers (MHD) hosted a fish and chip night in January, raising £100 for the RNLI. The money was presented to the RNLI's Welwyn Garden City branch who generously directed it to Port Isaac RNLI to support its fundraising for a new lifeboat.

The RNLI Welwyn Garden City Branch is a small group of fundraising volunteers who raise between £7,000 to £10,000 every year, with every penny going to the RNLI and to Port Isaac to support their activities for equipment or crew training.

Port Isaac launched its appeal for £52,000 to fund a new D Class Lifeboat in November 2017. A D class inshore lifeboat has served Port Isaac since 1967 but the present one, the Copeland Bell, has reached the end of its operational life and needs to be replaced. The new lifeboat will be of the very latest design and will be faster, fitted out with hightech navigation equipment and an updated first aid kit. The appeal aims to raise the total amount needed to provide the lifeboat, its engine and all relevant equipment to help save lives at sea.

Bob Bulgin, Port Isaac RNLI Chairman says: "Thank you so much to the Mid Herts Divers for their donation, we're so pleased they got to enjoy a fish supper at the same time as contributing to our appeal for a new D Class lifeboat."

Sunday 18 February 2018: Port Isaac RNLI were paged at 12.43am to reports of a fisherman in the water to the eastern side of Castle Beach at Tintagel.

The casualty had been reported by members of the group he was fishing with. The inshore lifeboat launched at 12.55am and, with sea and weather conditions being fair, arrived on scene at 1.11am along with Maritime & Coastguard Agency Rescue Helicopter 924. By this time the casualty had been in the water for approximately 40 minutes. The lifeboat and helicopter both began a search of the area with the helicopter using its searchlight. On the first sweep of the search pattern, volunteer lifeboat crew member Mark Grills spotted the casualty in the water about 80 feet from the base of the cliff. The casualty was brought on board the boat and the volunteer crew administered first aid. The decision was quickly taken to transfer to Rescue 924 which airlifted the casualty to hospital. Owing to poor weather conditions at Newguay, they made their way to Derriford hospital. Sadly the casualty was pronounced dead on arrival. Our thoughts are with their family and friends at this time.

We would like to thank all involved in this multi-agency effort: Boscastle Coastguard, Polzeath Coastguard, Rescue 924 and Padstow Lifeboat who began making their way to support, but were stood down as they arrived just off Port Isaac.

LEW TRAINING

Training Officer Damien Bolton reports that two members of the crew have been to RNLI HQ Poole carrying out a command course for the helmsman sign off. Kevin Dingle, who used to be our station senior helm, has re-joined the crew after a break and has been completing the RNLI requirements to be bought back up to helm classification. He was at Poole with Ian Johnson who has been on the crew for some time and is now nearing the end of his training to become a helmsman on station.

"We can't wait to have them both actively promoted to station helms, a position they are both very capable and experienced to do" said Damien Bolton.

Scott Mann's update from Parliament

Readers will no doubt be aware of the growing efforts to clamp down on plastic and tackle the awful waste that washes up on our beeaches. Many campaigns are now running



across the country to reduce plastic consumption, and I'm very proud that Cornwall is playing such an important part in doing this. In particular, the people of Bude are working very hard to reduce plastic usage, and I was delighted to attend the recent launch of the Greener Bude campaign.

The campaign is made of up local people and organisations, including the *Bude Cleaner Seas Project* and the *Refill Bude* initiative, to highlight the damage being done to our environment by plastic waste and other pollutants and to encourage local people to use more environmentally friendly products. Just recently we saw the Prime Minister recognising the hard work of the *Bude Cleaner Seas Project* in tackling plastic waste and we also saw government cabinet ministers walking along Downing Street with their *Refill Bude* 'ecoffee cups'.

It was also in Parliament last week that I signed up to the *Sky Ocean Rescue* campaign which is raising awareness of the global impact of plastic in our oceans, and the *Surfers Against Sewage* group have also asked Parliament to become plastic-free to help illustrate how institutions can embrace environmentally friendly alternatives.

Much of the plastic that washes up on our shores is not necessarily caused by us, but as a country which is partially responsible for the huge demand in plastic consumption and one which is able to develop better alternatives, we should lead by example and show the world how to reduce plastic and embrace other materials.

An example is the 5p charge on plastic bags which has seen a huge decline in use, and last year the Government also launched its *National Litter Strategy* to determine what the challenges are and how we can implement policies to tackle them. This includes the possibility of introducing bottle deposit return schemes, where customers are rewarded with shopping vouchers when they return plastic bottles to their local store. This system has been running in Norway for over 30 years and achieves a 98% recycle rate. Not only does the system ensure higher recycling rates and lower waste, but is also provides an economic boost to local shops because customers are incentivised to collect bottles.

Earlier this year I was asked to chair the All Party Parliamentary Group for Dairy. We have two campaigns for the coming year: First, to get supermarkets to include milk in their meal deal offers, and second, to re-brand milk with better packaging design. We will be working with colleges and universities and running a competition which will be judged in the Autumn. The dairy sector is a vital part of our rural economy and I will do all I can to promote it.

I was also very pleased to see that the South West is the second-fastest growing regional economy in the UK, with 4% growth in the last year. Tourism has seen a boost over the last twelve months, but new jobs growth in the tech sector have added to our strong performance in areas like North Cornwall.

Merlin MS Centre's Day Respite Service

The Merlin MS Centre, located on the A390 between St Austell and Truro, has provided a Day Respite Service since 2014. However, a recent and very generous donation by local property developer, Mr Denis Angilley, has allowed the service to be extended to three days a week.

The service, which aims to prevent isolation and loneliness for people in Cornwall living with long-term neurological conditions, will now be run every Monday, Wednesday and Friday and will provide activities, workshops, social interaction and access to health and wellbeing as well as exercise therapy.

The Day Respite Service is run by a team of experienced staff. Assessments are carried out prior to new service users starting to ensure all personal needs are met.

Ali Lochrie, Respite Manager, said: "We are delighted to be able to offer this service on an additional day. Carers, who are often a family member or a spouse, will have the chance to get a break from their caring duties knowing their loved one is in a stimulating and safe environment."

The Centre also offers a transport service which means those who live in rurally isolated areas and can't access public transport can still use the facilities available at the Centre.



websites of the month

A few columns back (September 2017) I wrote about what the web can tell us about Cornwall's industrial past and one of the places with a very nice site is Luxulyan Valley, that has a great industrial story and is also a lovely place to walk. Some good news has come through that their bid for funding from the Heritage Lottery fund has been successful, and providing their plans are approved could see over £3millon being made available for repairs and restoration.

That column was mainly about archaeology and mentioned its mining heritage, and this month I thought we look further at the geology of Cornwall as mining has seen something of a renaissance.

A really good start for looking at mining and minerals in Cornwall is the World Heritage website www.cornish-mining.org.uk . This gives an excellent overview of the history and what is available locally to visit. It includes a detailed and comprehensive downloadable map of the mining trails that.

Historically tin and copper have been the key metals that put Cornwall mining on the map but in addition to these there are many other metals and minerals. Here in St Endellion there was one particular metal that was mined in the 19th Century - Antimony - also called a 'metaloid' being a bit like both a metal and non-metal – with the symbol Sb in the Periodic Table www.ptable.com . The Periodic Table is a story all of its own and describes all the elements and how they are all related – one of natures remarkable patterns.

One of our local antimony mines was at Port Quin and you can read about the mine in a download from a very impressive database of mines called Aditnow www.aditnow.co.uk . This is from The Journal of the Mineralogical Society in a paper by Sir Arthur Russell in 1944 (https://tinyurl.com/port-quin-mine) which says:

"This small and long-forgotten antimony mine is situated in a field 750 yards south of Port Quin village about midway between the road and the stream (six-inch Ordnance map, Cornwall 19 NW., on which, however, it is not marked)."

"The only information which I have been able to glean respecting this mine was obtained during my first visit to the spot in 1907. An old resident of Port Quin named John Hawke, then eighty years of age, informed me that it was worked by one Francis Kate about the year 1857 and that the lode had a north-east direction and was about 2 feet wide traversing slate."

Antimony today is a very important mineral (used in microelectronics and fire retardants) and for some time China has been by far the biggest producer and so security of supply has become a concern. The Camborne School of Mines http://emps.exeter.ac.uk/csm published an article on the Wadebridge-Port Isaac antimony deposits and their potential importance as recently as 2016 (Knight and others, Applied Earth Science). In the past Antimony was used as a medicine (not advised now!) and also for hardening alloys – there is more information on Antimony's history and other geological information at the various mining museums and exhibitions – one of the best is for the Geevor Mine in Penzance, www.geevor.com which includes a lot of educational material that is well laid out.

Some of the other websites that you might find useful to get started in this hobby include the British Geological Survey Cornwall page www.bgs.ac.uk/discoveringGeology/geologyOfBritain/holidayguides/cornwall.htm and a Mineral Database www.mindat.org/newslist.php that you can use to identify your finds (that's how I identified the piece of Mica Schist in the photograph to the right – hope I got it right!)

While not exactly a mineral, we have an abundance of slate around us, also a major



industry and we have the huge Delabole quarry nearby where you can go on organised tours. Incidentally the Geological Society 'Rock Cycle' site https://tinyurl.com/GS-Rock-Cycle includes the Delabole Quarry and also some details of beautifully preserved fossils that you might find in slate.

If you are interested in geology in Cornwall, the place to go is the Royal Geological Society of Cornwall http://geologycornwall788.bravesites.com that was founded over 200 years ago on 11th February 1814. This hosts field visits, lectures and membership is £15 per year according to their website.

Planning Applications

The following applications were received and Members made the following responses to Cornwall Council:

- 1. **PA17/09950**, 36 New Road, Port Isaac replace existing dormer bungalow with a detached four-bed dwelling. The balcony had been reduced in size on the new plans. Photographs show how close the balcony is to neighbouring properties. For these reasons, Members objected on the grounds of over development of the site; and the overlooking and privacy issues for both neighbouring properties.
- PA17/10231, 30 New Road, Port Isaac hip to gable loft conversion with front and rear dormers, reconstruction of side lean-to and installation of ground floor terrace. Members objected on the grounds of overlooking and privacy issues for neighbouring properties; together with the scale and style, which are out of keeping with the area. Members wished to remind the case officer of the previous committee decision regarding Doctor's Meadow, which members of the planning committee agreed with us could be valued as a character area, typified by hip-roofed, villa 1920s/30s buildings. The current proposal doesn't conserve or enhance the conservation area.
- 3. **PA17/11992**, Merrywood, Road from Chapel Villa to Rose Cottage, Trelights reserved matters application for the construction of two dwellings. (Details following application no **PA17/03682** dated 14/06/17.) Members objected on the grounds the design has no local reference to, and the scale and size is inappropriate for, the AONB the street setting being predominantly bungalows. There are two accesses to the site, but none to Merrywood, which Members queried. Members felt this is over development of the site and there are issues with access and parking provision. The proposal does not address local demand, and as such does not comply with our emerging NDP guidance for infill in Trelights.
- 4. **PA17/12099**, Creighton Cottage, 64 Fore Street, Port Isaac Listed Building Consent for works and repairs to roof and repaint external walls. Members supported the application provided second hand Delabole rag slate is used.
- 5. **PA18/0009/PREAP**P, 32 New Road, Port Isaac LBC pre-application advice for refurbishment of existing extension, incorporating rendered external wall insulation and roof repairs. Existing fenestration to remain, but new slate cills to be formed. Existing profile of parapet walls to be retained with new insulation and white render over (SPS Envirowall solution). Lead flashing details at roof junctions and new airbricks planned to exterior walls. Members supported the application.
- 6. **PA18/00054**, The White House, 3 Roscarrock Hill, Port Isaac the proposal is to renovate the existing dwelling, including new roof over main house and kitchen. Internal alterations. Cllr. Penny left the meeting during this item. Members objected on the grounds they do not wish to see the gable end removed. Members would like to see any replacement roof being made with Delabole rag slate to conform with the conservation area. Any refurbishment should be as per the existing building.
- 7. **PA18/00172**, Rest Haven, Trelights proposed loft conversion to create a bedroom and en-suite. (Revised design following PA16/11580.) Members supported the application.
- 8. **PA18/00399**, Former Football Field at Homer Park, Port Isaac variation on condition 2 (in accordance with approved plans) to change orientation of dwelling to improve circulation and light. Material Amendment to application no. PA16/03282 date 08/06/16. Members supported the application.
- 9. **PA18/00539**, 4 Furze Park Trelights the proposal is for a dwelling in the land owned by 4 Furze Park. The proposal gives the proposed dwelling over 300m squared amenity space and leaves the existing property with the same. With the existing dwelling and the proposal both single story it excludes any possibility over overlooking issues. Members supported the application.

- PA18/00656, 20 Mayfield Road, Port Isaac – proposed rear ground floor extension. Members supported the application.
- 11. PA18/00691, Pilchards, Port Gaverne - retrospective consent for amendments to cafe, (approved under PA17/00391), namely altered access to DDA toilet with a new timber door, siting of external cold room and timber clad fencing. Cllr. Williams said what had been built did not comply with the planning permission that had been granted. During the season there are constant queues of people waiting to use the WCs. Waste is being stored on the site. All these factors are impacting on a long established neighbouring holiday letting business. Members, therefore, objected on these grounds. They felt strongly that it should be built in line with the existing planning permission.

Easter Eggs are traditionally connected with rebirth, rejuvenation and immortality. This is why they are often associated with Easter. On a more practical level, in the early Christian calendar, eggs were forbidden during Lent. This made them bountiful and exciting forty days later. However, eggs were coloured, blessed, exchanged and eaten as part of the rites of spring long before Christian times. As Christianity spread, the egg was adopted as a symbol of Christ's Resurrection from the tomb. For centuries, eggs were among the foods forbidden by the church during Lent, so it was a special treat to have them again at Easter. The shell became the symbol of the tomb from which Christ had risen and the meat of the egg the representation of resurrection, of the new Iife of the new Christian, and of the hope of eternal life.

Easter breads, cakes, and biscuits are a major part of Easter food, perhaps especially noticeable in the predominantly Roman Catholic countries of south and central Europe. In England, Simnel cake has come to be regarded as an Easter speciality. This cake dates back to Tudor times, or possibly earlier. Supposedly, Lambert Simnel, the ten-year-old pretender to Henry VII's throne was spared death and sent to work in the royal kitchens where he came up with the recipe. The truth is probably less colourful, especially as references to the cake appear before Henry VII's reign. Simnel probably refers to the Latin word simila, meaning fine, wheaten flour, which was used to bake cakes for Mothering Sunday, which takes place during Lent. By the eighteenth century, however, it had become an Easter treat to celebrate the end of the 40 days of Lent. The cake has a layer of marzipan or almond paste baked into the middle while on the top it is usually decorated with eleven marzipan balls, representing the apostles, placed around the edge. In accordance with tradition, the 11 marzipan balls represent the 12 apostles minus Judas. Some people use 12 balls to include one for Jesus, but 11 is the classic number.

This Simnel Cake recipe is made using ground almonds and cooked on a low heat over a long period of time making the texture lighter than traditional versions.

Ingredients:

170g sultanas

170g raisins

170g currants

85g mixed candied peel

85g glacé cherries

Finely grated zest 1 large orange

3 tbsp brandy (or orange juice)

170g unsalted butter at room temperature

170g light brown sugar

4 medium free-range eggs, lightly beaten

170g plain flour

85g ground almonds

1 tsp ground cinnamon

1 tsp ground mixed spice

For decorating lcing sugar to dust 450g golden marzipan 2 tbsp apricot jam, warmed

You will need a deep 20cm cake tin.



Method:

A couple of hours before baking the cake, put the dried fruit, peel and cherries into a large bowl with the orange zest and brandy (you can use orange juice instead if you prefer) and stir together to combine. Set aside to allow the fruit to soak. Heat the oven to 150°C/fan130°C/gas 2 and grease a deep 20cm cake tin generously with butter. Line the base and sides of the pan with a double layer of baking paper and set aside until needed.

Put the butter and sugar into a large mixing bowl and beat together with an electric mixer for around 5 minutes or until light and fluffy. Add the beaten eggs a little at a time, beating until fully combined before adding more.

In a separate bowl mix together the flour, ground almonds, a pinch of salt, cinnamon and mixed spice, then add to the butter mixture and beat together to combine. Add the fruit mixture to the cake batter and mix together with a wooden or metal spoon until evenly combined. Scrape half the cake mixture into the prepared tin and set aside.

Dust the work surface with a little icing sugar and roll out about a third of the marzipan into an 18cm diameter circle. Put this in the tin on top of the cake mixture. Scrape in the remaining cake mixture and level the top, making a slight depression in the middle (which will help the baked cake have a flat top). Bake in the oven for about $2\frac{1}{2}-2\frac{3}{4}$ hours until a skewer inserted into the middle of the cake comes out clean. Allow to cool in the tin for 20 minutes, then invert onto a wire rack to cool completely.

To decorate, dust the work surface with a little icing sugar and roll out about two thirds of the remaining marzipan into a 20cm wide circle. Brush the top of the cake with most of the warmed apricot jam and carefully place the marzipan disc onto the cake. Crimp the edges using your fingers, then roll the remaining marzipan into 11 small balls. Use the remaining apricot jam to stick the balls to the outer edge of the marzipan top.

To give the classic burnished finish, either place the cake under a hot grill for a few minutes until the marzipan starts to brown, or use a kitchen blowtorch to gently heat and brown the marzipan.






