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

There have been RNLI lifeboats at Port Isaac, saving lives off the north Cornwall coast, for over 150 years. Generations of volunteers have braved the unforgiving coastline here to save more than 340 lives at sea.

Since 1967, the station has been home to the D class inshore lifeboat, the workhorse of the RNLI's fleet.

Today, we're asking you to support the next chapter in Port Isaac's history - help our lifesavers to bring a new D class lifeboat home.

SAVING LIVES OFF THE NORTH CORNWALL COAST

Every June since the 1800s, people have gathered on the Platt at Port Isaac harbour to bless the lifeboat and crew. It's a chance to give thanks to a team who regularly face rough seas, sharp rocks and narrow caves to save lives - all in a 5m inflatable lifeboat.

'It's very moving, you feel the timeless dedication to rescue at sea,' says Port Isaac RNLI Chairman Bob Bulgin. 'If we ask people to go out in hostile conditions, they deserve the best kit we can back them with. And here, without doubt that's the D class.



Port Isaac Fishermen to Peature in charity Pundraising book

The Fishermen's Mission is a charity that helps all Pishermen, active or retired, and their Pamilies, providing a lifeline of welfare and support to fishermen and their families.

Julian Waring, regional fundraising manager Cornwall for *The Fishermen's Mission* is at the forefront of a major new project that will involve Port Isaac to raise funds for the charity. Julian tells *Trio*, "Back in 2014 we produced a fundraising book based on the fishing characters in and around Newlyn and it raised an incredible £38,000 for the Fishermen's Mission. It also helped raise greater awareness and understanding of what we, as a practical welfare charity, can do for fishermen, active and retired as well as their families.

"We now plan to build on the success of that project and produce another book, this time based on the fishermen from the North Cornwall villages of Port Isaac, Padstow and Newquay."



Work has already started on the book. Already there's lots of local support and photographer Chris Hewitt and his team have already been to the village. They met up with the Golden Circle members at their March meeting, and took photographs and recorded their fishing stories and memories. A few days later, on probably the wettest day of the month, they were back in Port Isaac again to photograph local people connected to fishing and the sea. Some amazing and very atmospheric photographs were taken around the village on a very wet day.

Don't worry iP you missed that session. They will be back again on April 19th and iP you want to be part oP the project meet outside the Fish Cellars at 11am or in the Golden Lion at 1pm.

Scott Mann's update from Parliament

I was delighted to meet with Cornwall's Girl Guides in March during their annual celebration event at the Royal Cornwall Showground. The event highlighted the great

achievements of the Girl Guides over the past 12 months and to commend those who help such a wonderful organisation.

The Girl Guides do terrific work in bringing young people together to learn new skills and to socialise with others. Skills that are learnt through the Girl Guides as well as the Scouts, Cubs and Beavers can last with you forever, and it was great to meet with the Girl Guides and talk about what they've been learning and how they've helped their local communities.

The Showground also held a Farm and Country Day event during the same week where schools came to learn about agriculture and country life. This is a fantastic initiative which teaches children about where their food comes from and the benefits of good animal husbandry. Unfortunately there are a lot of scare stories in parts of the media which try to paint our agricultural sector in a bad light, and these events help to bust those myths by championing the high animal welfare standards that we have in the UK and how farmers look after their livestock.

The Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (DEFRA) just recently published its proposals for a post-Brexit agricultural policy, and I have spoken with the Environment Secretary to give my feedback. This includes encouraging farmers to engage with schools by holding educational visits and to have more of an input in managing public rights of way. We have many paths around the countryside which need managing, and I think part of the future farming subsidy should include the upkeep of public rights of way to enable people to enjoy the countryside, as well as farmers having the ability to move paths which don't work for their farming. The Government's proposals are open for public consultation and can be found on the DEFRA website.

Unfortunately we also learnt recently that the UK will remain in the EU's Common Fisheries Policy (CFP) during the 18 month implementation

Everyone gave their time and talent free of charge for the Hospice which is so close to everyone's heart.



The cold snaps ...

As somebody said to me recently either we have too much water or not enough. Last month here in Cornwall, the weather was so wet the fields were really squishy and this month the cold has been very cold indeed. So what's going on? Is this just the ordinary tooing and froing of our weather or are there some underlying changes - perhaps connected with global warming - that explain it?

A good place to start is in Exeter where the Meteorological Office is located. This remarkable institution was founded in 1854 and made its first weather forecast for mariners in 1861 and began issuing the gale warnings that you can hear as part of the Shipping Forecast https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Met Office . Nowadays, as well as forecasting the weather using its powerful supercomputers, it is in the forefront of scientific research on climate change and provides authoritative reports. So looking here you can find out what the weather has been like over the UK this winter https://blog.metoffice.gov.uk/2018/03/05/ winter-and-february-statistics-for-2018/ and would you believe it, it has been really sunny! In fact it has been the second sunniest winter since records began in 1929 beaten only by 2015, and February was also very sunny, in the top 10 Februarys. And overall, apart from the sunny weather, the past few months have been fairly average.


But what about the cold spell; what are we to make of this? One theory that has been gaining quite a bit of evidence and support from research is called "Warm Arctic Cold Continent" (also called wacky weather!). This idea that the warming of the Arctic is leading to some very cold conditions, particularly in North America, dates back a few years when there was a suspicion that the polar vortex, a more northerly version of our own jet stream (see April 2016 Trio for an account of our jet stream http://www.portisaacheritage.couk/publications/ trio/) was weakening.

The Polar Vortex is a wind that blows round the globe close to the Arctic. It is powered by the difference in temperature between the Artic and more temperate regions, together with the rotation of the Earth. As the Arctic warms up - as it has been over the past few years - the difference in temperature drops - and the Vortex becomes slower and more wiggly. This can lead it to becoming stuck - so-called blocking - and the result can be prolonged periods of easterly winds as we had with the Beast from the East. The temperature in the Artic when the cold snap hit us was off the scale unusual - see the red line in the picture – being at least 25 degrees higher than normal. You can read an account of what we know and what we still are uncertain about here https:// www.sciencenews.org/blog/science-public/what-we-can-and-cant-say-aboutarctic-warming-and-us-winters together with a link to the latest scientific evidence.

What does this mean for our own weather in the future? Well it's likely to mean we will experience more 'extreme' weather events. That is periods when we have a lot of rain, or a lot of cold weather, or a lot of dry weather. Margaret Thatcher first warned about the impact of climate change some 30 years ago in her speech to the Royal Society https://www.margaretthatcher.org/document/ 107346 and the impacts that she predicted then are now playing out in our weather systems. The Government has a good advisory committee that has lots of information about what Britain is doing to help deal with this and you can read

about it here https:// www.theccc.org.uk

I for one am glad spring is on the way at last and roll on Summer (and lets hope the talk of the Beast from the East coming back at Easter https:// tinyurl.com/ybzydcr5 is just talk, at the time of writing the Met Office says its too early to say). world and has its roots in Christianity. Easter

coincides with spring lamb, which is when the meat is at its most tender. Roast lamb studded with rosemary and anchovy is a classic combination and a simple way to enhance the flavour of spring lamb. For many, the ultimate roast is a leg of lamb with mint sauce or redcurrant jelly.

Always buy lamb from a decent butcher and opt for Cornish and organic if you can. Keep in mind that the meat of grassfed animals contains more omega-3 fatty acids than grain-fed ones. If choosing a rare breed of lamb it may be darker and taste more gamey. When choosing lamb, look for a deep pink colour with dry, white fat.

Leg of lamb is traditionally roasted in a hot oven (190°C–220°C) though it can also be slow cooked at lower temperatures for much longer. When cooking a leg of lamb whole, don't remove any excess fat – it adds flavour and helps keep the meat tender. The fat will render down during cooking; drain it from the roasting tray and whisk it into your gravy for an extra boost of lamb flavour.

It is important to let the meat come to room temperature before cooking to ensure it will cook through evenly. It is also imperative to let the meat rest after cooking, 20 minutes is sufficient. Wrap the leg in tin foil to prevent it from getting cold.

Use a meat thermometer to test whether your meat is cooked or not; it's not essential but will help determine to what stage the lamb is cooked, from rare $(48-54^{\circ}C)$ to medium-rare $(55-59^{\circ}C)$ to medium $(60-66^{\circ}C)$ to well done $(67-74^{\circ}C)$ and give a more consistent result. Roast lamb should be served pink in the middle. If overcooked, it is dry, chewy and unpleasant.



3 sprigs of rosemary 3 sprigs of thyme 4 garlic cloves, roughly sliced 2kg leg of lamb salt and pepper

450g of Jersey Royal potatoes 5 sprigs of mint 500g of frozen garden peas 85g of butter 50ml of dry white wine 1 bay leaf 200ml of brown chicken stock 20g of butter salt and pepper

- Snip the rosemary and thyme into small sprigs. Using a small knife, pierce six or seven holes in the lamb and stud with the rosemary, thyme and garlic.
- Preheat the oven to 220°C. Season the lamb with salt and pepper and roast in the oven until cooked to your liking. When cooked cover with foil and make the gravy.
- Towards the end of the cooking time, cook the Jersey Royals in boiling salted water with three of the mint stalks, for 10 – 15 minutes or until tender.
- Place the frozen peas in boiling water and bring the water quickly back to the boil. Cook for approximately 2 5 minutes or until just tender
- Chop the remaining mint and mix together with the warm Jersey Royals and butter.
- To make the sauce, remove the fat from the lamb roasting tray and heat on a ring, then deglaze the tray with the wine. (pour the wine into the roasting tray and scrap all the sticky goodness off the bottom of tray until desolved)
- Pour into a saucepan. Add the bay leaf and simmer until the wine reduces and the pan is almost dry. Then add chicken stock and reduce by 2/3(Boil down) finally whisk in the butter and checking the seasoning to finish.



Easter foolishness

Easter Day this year falls on April 1st, April Fools' Day. Our God is a God of surprises so this is an opportunity to exploit not an embarrassment to hide! If you get caught out by someone's trick at Easter, don't repine but seize the moment to reflect upon the surprise. Jesus Christ is not always, if ever, what we expect.



Even if we think we know what to expect – and Church people are particularly prone to thinking this – he has a habit of catching us unawares, choosing to come at unexpected moments, in the guise of unexpected people. So it as well to be prepared to find Christ in everyone and anyone, on any occasion. And to expect the unexpected, a call to follow Him.


St Paul thought that the message about Jesus which he preached was foolishness – certainly that it appears foolish to those who cannot or will not understand it. The foolishness of God does not really consist of tricks and surprises. Rather it is God's overwhelming generosity which appears foolish in human eyes. God's giving and giving, over and over again without stint, even to giving up his Son to die on a cross, seems foolish to us because we are always minded to consider the bottom line. 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


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
