While the *Incredible Balti show* is still fresh in everyone's minds, here's news about a new show that is coming to your Village Hall on Friday November 2nd. 'Hyde & Seek', a home grown production, is written by Ben Oldfield (Cube Theatre) and performed by Michael Jones who was in *The Incredbile Balti show*, with technical design by Michael Jones and Ciaran Clarke (Near Ta Theatre). This Cornish touring show is funded by Arts Council England, Feast Cornwall and Hall For Cornwall Creation Space.

Based on the tale of Dr Jekyll and Mr Hyde, 'Hyde & Seek' is a macabre ghost story with occasional spatterings of vaudevillian humour. The story expands on the world of the original narrative and the friendly, yet haunted, former stage door man Albert tells a grisly tale of the further misdeeds of Mr Hyde and his "acquaintance", the tormented genius Dr Jekyll. Set in a long abandoned theatre in Victorian London, the show has a theme of vaudeville running through it resulting in darkly comic song, dance, puppetry and even ventriloquism, which interweave with the story all in under an hour.

Using specially designed self contained lighting effects *Hyde & Seek* is a chilling and intimate storytelling experience. Ghostly figures are glimpsed briefly before vanishing, characters appear out of nowhere, and what you can't quite see becomes a lot more disconcerting than what you can. Following the recent article concerning speeding vehicles in Trewetha Lane, I would just like to say what the Parish Council are proposing. Earlier this year we asked Highways to arrange to monitor the speed of vehicles outside the school in Trewetha Lane. They duly made two sites.

Site one was opposite the green where they monitored 5,684 vehicles travelling in both directions over a period of eight days. 67% of the vehicles were travelling below 30mph and 31% were between 30-40mph. 0.9% were above 40mph

Site two was at the junction of Trewetha Lane and New Road. Here they monitored 5,500 vehicles, again in both directions, where 89% were travelling less than 30mph, 10% 30-40mph and 0.3% over 40mph.

The Council was advised that in these circumstances the Police would not consider sending officers to carry out enforcement.

The Parish Council are applying to the Community Network Panel for funds to pay for a 20mph speed limit for the village, extending from before Port Gaverne, through all of Port Isaac and continuing up to Trewetha, and to include Trelights village. At the same time we have requested a further speed limit of 40mph from Port Isaac to Wadebridge along the B3314. We have also looked into the costs of having a permanent speed monitor near the School that will flash when detecting speeding vehicles.

The change in speed limits will have to be put up for public consultation so residents will have ample opportunity to comment. In the meantime the Council would welcome any one to come along and give us their views.


## IFEBOAT SERVICE ON THE PL

## "The Fisherman's Friends" hits the Silver Screen

As if our beautiful village needed any more filming, the last month has seen several years of 'will they, won't they?' come to fruition as Fred Productions began to film footage for the forthcoming global blockbuster, "The Fisherman's Friends!"

The production company is the same one that last winter delivered the very successful 'Finding Your Feet', and is in a similar genre to that and those other 'feel good' British films such as 'The Full Monty' and 'Calendar Girls'. Time wise, it is set in the year 2010, just prior to our signing our deal with Universal Music (Island Records), and very definitely set in the village of Port Isaac.

It has been a delicate balancing act for the team to mix fact and fiction, and it is with some relief that the buoys have not been represented as individuals, rather as a group that are similar to the FFs, an approximation if you like, and they most certainly look the part.

They should sound the part too. We have recorded many of our popular songs for inclusion on the film soundtrack, with the plan being that the actors lip-synch (all right, mime!) over the words. We spent several sessions with them, including a visit to our recent gig at the Minack, and they have hopefully captured the spirit of the group really convincingly – they certainly made considerable inroads into our stock of Tribute if that is any indication!

The narrative of the story, without giving too much away, is an invention of the scriptwriters Nick and Meg, but it contains a great deal of anecdotal material from our past, and re-visits many of the times that we have shared together with all of you on the Platt, in the Lion and around about. They wanted to capture the essence and spirit of community, and as such many of you locals took part as extras, which the buoys were really delighted to see. It all came to a satisfyingly FF'ish conclusion in the Golden Lion following their last day of filming and our first Platt gig of the year, when actors, crew, locals, FFs and all, joined in with a rousing sing-up that raised the roof.

If they capture that essence and spirit of that night, it really could be a blockbuster!

Since the last letter was published in the *Trio* there have been many positive comments from far and wide supporting the attempts to save the Church rooms. This has prompted more people to put their names forward to show their disappointment about the process and outcome of the sale of the building and site which will now, it appears, be developed into luxury apartments. Some of these have been from older members of the community who do not have access to email, but who wanted to show their support, and have made the effort to make their voice heard.

There have also been messages of support and help from individuals who have knowledge about how the building can be saved from demolition by identifying it as one of significant architectural interest. Therefore in an attempt to avoid this happening an Application for the Church rooms to be listed was submitted 23rd April ref 145 6402 but sadly turned down. However the final statement in the reply to the application pointed out that the building "is a positive contribution to the conservation area; it stands at a focal point on the approach to the village and has local interest for its history within Port Isaac's community and for its distinctive use of local materials". Hopefully this will be taken into consideration by the Parish Council when the planning application is submitted by the purchasers.

As a result of publishing the feelings of anger and disappointment about the decision to sell the church rooms, a process which was made by people who live outside the village, a much stronger feeling has been provoked and is now being expressed. It is about how this setback will not affect all the goodwill, support, effort and hard work that goes into making our small community so strong. Witnessing this strength of numbers, we would hope that the buyers would give great care and consideration to the small community they are moving into.

# Scott Mann's update from Parliament

I was very pleased to recently attend the opening of the new Buttercup

Field development in Poundstock which is exclusively for local people. The eight new homes have been built by the Cornwall Rural Housing Association (CRHA), who will be letting them to local people on the housing waiting list.

The homes were partly funded with £400,000 of central government money, and I was delighted to meet the new tenants who told me their moving personal stories about trying to find a home in their local community, their happiness at getting their new home and their thanks to both local and national government for helping make that happen.

The CRHA do fantastic work in providing housing to small rural communities, and I look forward to seeing more schemes being developed in the future to help deserving local families, especially those which are funded through the three per cent stamp duty levy on second homes, which I am a big supporter of.

In Westminster, I was very pleased to be sitting on a parliamentary committee which approved a piece of legislation to get more empty homes back into use. The *Council Tax (Empty Dwellings) Bill* will give local authorities the power to charge double council tax on properties which have been left empty and unused for two years.

Unfortunately, there are many homes in Cornwall and the country which are left empty by their owners, and this new council tax levy will incentivise owners to get them back into use – either through letting or selling them. The Bill still has a few more hurdles to pass, but the new power should be in place by the next financial year.

During the committee's sitting, I again raised with the Local Government Minister the issue of holiday lets avoiding council tax and business rates. If a second home is available for let for at least 140 days a year, then it can be classed as a holiday let and a business. This exempts the property from council tax and makes it liable for business rates. However, many holiday lets have a rateable value low enough to qualify for 100 per cent Small Business Rate Relief, which means the owners pays neither council tax nor business rates. Although holiday lets are a very important part of the Cornish economy, I absolutely think they should be paying some sort of taxation because of the fact the occupants will be using local services, and the minister assured me that he is investigating this issue.

I was also very pleased to show my support for the Parental Bereavement Bill which, when enacted, will give people the legal right to leave and pay when they lose a child under 18. Currently, an employee who loses their child relies on the discretion of their employer to give them compassionate leave. Alternatively, they have to take holiday or un-paid leave. This is clearly inappropriate and I was very pleased to see the Bill passed by the Commons and progress to the House of Lords.

# Vikki O'Hara, General Dogsbody (and owner) of dozy dog with some tips on

When it's a hot British summers day out there, it's hard to keep our dozy dogs cool whilst carrying on with day-to-day living. So, to help keep dogs happy we've put together a series of Top Tips on how to keep our furry family cool.

## Top Tip #1 Get them Wet!

Not all dogs want to swim. Not only that, it's not always safe! But, wherever you are & by whatever means possible, get your dogs wet. The key areas to soak are the core of their bodies, around the key organs. A 'Stay Cool' vest can help to keep a dog cooler for longer by retaining the water.

**Top Tip #2** Try to exercise your dozy dogs early in the morning or later in the day when the sun is lower and the shadows longer ...This will also help to prevent you from becoming sunburnt too! When walking on pavements, try a quick temperature test - place the palm of your hand on the pavement and press down for at least 5 seconds. If it's too hot to hold your hand on, it's too hot for your dog to walk on.

**Top Tip #3** Invest in a non-fleecey dog bed for the summer season, place it anywhere away from direct sunlight and place a 'Cooling Mat' inside the bed on particularly hot days. There is no need to wet or place a cooling mat in the fridge before use as it contains an innovative gel that takes body heat and emits cold. Very clever bit of technology. Please note: There are no products that will keep a dog sufficiently cool in a parked car on a hot day. Not even with the window open.

**Top Tip #4** Make flavoured ice cubes! Use the juices from cooking your dinner or the liquid from steaming your veg. Maybe even boil up chicken bones after the BBQ, carefully drain the water and freeze it. This will be a guaranteed way of encouraging your dozy dogs to stay hydrated and keep cool whilst they chase them around your kitchen floor!

**Top Tip #5** Once you've made the broth ice cubes, you could pop them in a bowl of water for a little ice bobbing fun!

**Top Tip #6** Get a cheap paddling pool from your local discount store or supermarket. Maybe even have a bottle

of shampoo ready and give them a make-over at the same time.

Top Tip #7 Squeeze something scrumptious in a Kong Duet, pop it in the freezer and let him be entertained, distracted, fed and kept cool for AGES!!!!! Actually..... regardless of what the weather is doing, this is a great way of keeping our furry family entertained whilst we're out at work too!

Back in 1834 John Watts Trevan wrote a journal looking at life as it was in Port Isaac. He wrote about the people, the village gossip, the shipwrecks, who lived where and what they all did for a living. He illustrated this delightful candid report with his own watercolours, In 1999 the Port Isaac Local History Group purchased Trevan's original manuscript which is now on permanent loan to the Cornwall Records Office. However, before they passed it over, in 2010 they had the journal printed as a book. Copies quickly sold out. With help from the Doc Martin Fund, PISCES has, this year, reprinted the book.

PISCES feels it's such an important journal and is devoting its summer exhibition to the Trevan Book. Port Isaac School children are getting involved in a joint project and PISCES is sure that further ideas will be generated as a result.



#### **Planning Applications**

Members considered the planning applications and made the following responses to Cornwall Council:

- PA18/02860, Gwel Mor, Trelights proposed extension to provide additional bedroom and construction of a swimming pool. Due to an administrative error by Cornwall Council (CC) Members were unable to formally comment on this application.
- PA18/02910, Stargazy Inn, Port Isaac proposed works to external front terrace area to include front balustrade and flagstone flooring. Members supported the application provided the exterior lighting is limited to meet the AONB criteria to preserve dark skies, floor level and downlighting is preferred.
- 3. PA18/03020, The Chalet, Rear of 31 Fore Street, Port Isaac construction of a replacement dwelling. **OBJECT.** Members support the principle of building but cannot support the current design.
- 4. PA18/03029, 49 Fore Street, Port Isaac rear single storey extension, room in the roof with dormers, internal alterations. Members supported this application.
- 5. PA18/03209, Maritime and Coastguard Agency, New Road, Port Isaac proposed 2 new dwellings to replace existing decommissioned Coastguard building. Members objected because they think the site can sustain a single dwelling only. Permitted development at 91 Fore Street, would be affected by loss of light due to the close proximity of the development to the boundary.
- 6. PA18/03670, Long Cross Hotel, Trelights existing hotel function room to become four guest suites. Existing dining room to be replaced by smaller one, and two additional guest suites. Members supported this application.

- 8. PA18/04253, Former Football Field at Homer Park, Port Isaac non-material amendment for the increase in roof height by 1m and the inclusion of roof lights and 2 gable end windows. Members objected on the grounds the increased glazing would cause harm to the AONB in with reference to tranquillity and dark skies, the increase in roof height is considered to change the nature of the proposal to one that is unacceptable on this sensitive site in the open countryside.

## "No sugar, I'm Cornish!

## Taizé Services at St Endellion Church

## ST PETER'S CHURCH

St Peter's, our simple seaside church, is open to everyone, every day until about 4pm. We have a service every Sunday morning at 9.30am to which you will be warmly welcomed. You will also find our Church is a lovely quiet place to just sit and reflect and be peaceful.

The Church is also home to PISCES (Port Isaac Shared Community **Exhibition Space**)



A good place to start is the Cornwall Bird Watching and Preservation Society website www.cbwps.org.uk . The Society was founded in 1931 and has been recording the bird life of Cornwall in great detail. From their records they explain they know that nearly 450 species have been recorded in the County, and that is 80% of the UK wide total. They say that while there are some bird numbers have gone down, indeed we have lost some that no longer breed in the County for example the Dunlin, Corncrake, Woodlark and Red-backed Shrike, we have gained some. These include, among others, the Great Crested Grebe, Black-headed Gull, Little Egret, Hobby, Crossbill, Siskin, Lesser Redpoll and Collared Dove. Notably the Chough, emblematic of Cornwall, has started breeding in the West of the County. The Society manages some nature reserves www.cbwps.org.uk/cbwpsword/resources/reserves where they have erected hides so as not to cause disturbance, and the nearest one to us is called the Walmsley Sanctuary and is close to the Amble River. This reserve is member only access so you will need to join up but it is an ideal site for birds being marshy and well protected.

However there are lots of birds to see on the Camel Trail alongside the River Camel and there are also hides here as well where you can get a good view of the abundant Little Egrets. Cornwall Council has a website with lots of information about the Trail but a nice simple source of information is the Cornwall Guide site www.cornwalls.co.uk/wildlife/birdwatching/camel estuary that shows the birds you are likely to encounter (Peregrines, kinfishers and even an Osprey; as well as ducks of different types, waders and sea birds).

Oh, and about the history of the fulmar – you can read all about it here http://birdscu.mzzhost.com/fulmar.html and their expansion over the past two centuries from a very isolated group to being the most widespread member of the oceangoing petrel and shearwater family.

A good site that has lots of pictures of our common species is Cornwall Birding www.cornwall-birding.co.uk that started up in 2007. Here you can find all the common birds you are likely to come across.

A final idea you might want to try is to try some of the apps available for identifying birds. There are quite a few and the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds is a good (and free) one that has lots and lots of activities on it and updates them weekly https://itunes.apple.com/gb/app/giving-nature-a-home/id1271690371?mt=8 although it is more of a conservation app than specifically about birds. One that is just about identifying birds from their song is called Bird Song ID https://itunes.apple/com/gb/app/bird-song-id-automatic-recognition-reference-birds/id601362210?mt=8 and costs 3.99. It is really good fun to used and if you can get a clear recording on your phone, it tells you who is singing!

# Gooseberries and Elderflower yoghurt ice cream

400g gooseberry 200g golden caster sugar 3 tbsp elderflower cordial 500ml pot Greek yogurt 150ml whole milk

Tip the gooseberries and sugar into a pan with 2 tbsp water. Heat gently to dissolve the sugar. Increase the heat and simmer for a few mins to soften the berries.

Remove from the heat, carefully tip into a food processor and whizz to a purée. Add the elderflower cordial and whizz again. Taste to check that the purée is sweet enough and has enough elderflower flavour – remember that the flavour will be diluted by the yogurt, so it needs to be quite sweet. If not, add a sprinkle more sugar or a splash more cordial and whizz again. Mix the yogurt and milk until smooth, then add the purée and mix again.

Pour the frozen yogurt into a container and freeze stir with a whisk a couple of times whilst freezing it will keep in the freezer for up to 2 months.

300g gooseberry, tops pinched off 50g golden caster sugar, plus 2 tbsp 2 tbsp elderflower cordial 600ml pot whipping cream 100g meringue (4-5 large nests) crumbled

Put the gooseberries, 2 tbsp water and 25g of the sugar in a small saucepan. Gently cook until the gooseberries are just softening and breaking down. Taste, adding more of the remaining 25g sugar as you need, then set aside to cool.

Put the 2 tbsp sugar, the cordial and cream in a big bowl and whisk until soft peaks form, then cover and chill until ready to serve.

Just before serving, swirl the gooseberry compote, cream and meringues together and spoon into serving glasses or bowls and top with a scoop of the yoghurt ice cream.

## Elderflower Cordial

2½ kg white sugar 2 unwaxed lemons 20 fresh elderflower heads, stalks trimmed 85g citric acid

Put the sugar and 1.5 litres/2¾ pints water into the largest saucepan you have. Gently heat, without boiling, until the sugar has dissolved. Give it a stir every now and again. Pare the zest from the lemons using a potato peeler, then slice the lemons into rounds.

Once the sugar has dissolved, bring the pan of syrup to the boil, then turn off the heat. Fill a washing up bowl with cold water. Give the flowers a gentle swish around to loosen any dirt or bugs. Lift flowers out, gently shake and transfer to the syrup along with the lemons, zest and citric acid, then stir well. Cover the pan and leave to infuse for 24 hrs.

Line a colander with a clean tea towel, then sit it over a large bowl or pan. Ladle in the syrup – let it drip slowly through. Discard the bits left in the towel. Use a funnel and a ladle to fill sterilised bottles (run glass bottles through the dishwasher, or wash well with soapy water. Rinse, then leave to dry in a low oven). The cordial is ready to drink straight away and will keep in the fridge for up to 6 weeks. Or freeze it in plastic containers or ice cube trays and defrost as needed






