

#### **Planning Applications**

Members considered these planning applications and made the following responses to Cornwall Council:

www.stendellionpc.com

- PA18/05653, 36 New Road, Port Isaac demolition of existing bungalow and provision of new dwelling. Members felt the building was too large and there was too much glazing, plus there were concerns the flat roof could become a balcony in the future and objected on these grounds. They requested that if the application is granted, there should be a condition not to permit a balcony.
- PA18/05872, Land S of Haven Park, Trewetha Lane, Port Isaac outline planning application with all matters reserved for a single dwelling. It was feared this could set a precedent for future development on adjacent land. Members objected on the grounds the 'green lung' should be maintained as undeveloped land.
- 3. PA18/04084, Land S of Harbour Heights, Rose Hill, Port Isaac residential development for the construction of three dwellings (including affordable housing). Further to the advice given at pre-app, where the harm to the Conservation Area was considered to outweigh the benefit, members voted to support the proposal on the understanding the applicant accepts a S.106 full-time residency restriction for the single open market property, in line with the emerging policies in our Neighbourhood Development Plan currently subject to SEA screening.


# The Port Isaac Poppy Trail

# Websites of the month

The summer is in full swing and the blackberries are ripe. Apples seem to be a good crop too, so apple and blackberry crumble on the way. The young swallows (see picture) are getting ready to fly – this picture is of the second hatching – and some time soon they will start their epic journey to Africa. Seeing them growing up made me think about this flight ahead of them and wondered how the do it. Do they sleep while they are flying? The Internet, and professor Google, of course, have a lot of answers to these sorts of questions.

To answer the question about swallows and migration, I turned to the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds website which describes in detail the migration of the swallows. The story of understanding it all, began in 1899 when a Danish teacher, Hans Christian Cornelius Mortensen, the first bird ringer, successfully tracked some species' travels. However it was a solicitor from Staffordshire, John Masefield, who put a tiny ring on a swallow chick in 1911 who had the biggest surprise. This letter was sent to the organiser of the bird-ringing scheme he was participating in: - dated 27 December 1912, it was sent by Mr C H Ruddock, proprietor of the Grand Hotel, Utrecht, Natal, South Africa. He wrote: "Dear Sir, On December 23, a swallow was caught in the farmhouse of the farm Roodeyand, 18 miles from this town, with a metal label round its leg, with the words Witherby, High Holborn, London, and on the other side B830. The farmer, Mr J Mayer, took the label off and has it in his possession. As I am interested in birds of any sort and the migration of same, I shall be glad to know if you received this letter safely." - and you can read about it in the Independent newspaper report on the 100th anniversary here https://tinyurl.com/Masefield-swallow

So how do they do it? The route from England to South Africa not only took them over the sea, but also over the Sahara desert. It turns out that it is just as hazardous as it sounds and many birds sadly perish on the way. They fly about 200 miles a day and feed on the wing. The evidence about swallows sleeping is not clear as far as I can tell, but the swift, a similar bird, that also makes this great journey, does sleep on the wing – the RSPB site has details <u>https://tinyurl.com/swallow-migration</u>

For us locally the Camel Estuary is a great place to see lots of wildlife and birdlife in particular. The website of the Cornwall Bird Watching and Preservation Society <u>http://www.cbwps.org.uk/cbwpsword/sightings</u> is a good source of information on what migratory birds you might see. Also the Camel Estuary has a good website that includes details of the bird, butterflies and other creatures <u>https://camelbirder.wordpress.com/checklist/</u> and while the website is still under development it has lots of useful information.

Of course birds are not the only migratory animals. Fish, for example, have impressive migrations as well. One of our local fish, the salmon, has a remarkable life cycle and the river Camel is home to this extraordinary creature and you can read about it in the West Country Rivers Trust website <a href="http://wrt.org.uk/project/river-camel/">http://wrt.org.uk/project/river-camel/</a>. The salmon breeds in the freshwater river and the young then set out for the oceans, spending most of their life there before finding their way back to their home river. How they do that appears to be still under investigation <a href="https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Salmon\_run">https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Salmon\_run</a> but it is more thank likely that they use the earth's magnetic field. Amazing.

# Martin's Chutney

September sees the arrival of the Harvest Moon, so named as it rises 10 to 20 minutes after the sun sets, traditionally giving farmers more time to reap the harvests by extending the hours that harvesting could be done. Today, it marks a time when all the fruits of your hard work in the garden, should be coming to a peak, so here are a few ideas as to what to do with a glut of vegetables.

Preserving is a lost art but well worth a go and will keep you going through the winter months. Clean sterilised jars are essential to success so make sure your glass jars are scrupulously clean so that the contents won't perish.

**Sterilising jars -** Heat oven to 140C/120C fan/gas 1. Wash the jars in hot, soapy water, then rinse well. Place the jars on a baking sheet and put them in the oven to dry completely. If using Kilner jars, boil the rubber seals, as dry heat damages them.

If you're made jam or chutney it's important that the mix and the jars are still hot when filling, then pack down well to remove any air bubbles.Place a waxed disc directly over the surface to create a seal, then add a lid or secure on a cling film lid with an elastic band.

#### Tomato, Ginger & Sultana Chutney

150ml white wine vinegar 1/2 tsp whole coriander seeds
150g caster sugar 1 large onion, diced
50g golden sultanas 1tbs shredded ginger
500g ripe tomatoes, washed 1 tsp chopped thyme
and roughly chopped 3tbs tomato purée
1 clove of garlic, crushed Salt and freshly cracked black
2 cardamom pods pepper
1 bay leaf 1tsp black onion seeds

Prepare the tomatoes, wash and roughly chop them. Crush the garlic and dice the peeled onion.

Place the vinegar, sugar, cardamom pods, onion, ginger, seasoning, crushed garlic and coriander seeds in a large saucepan over low heat to dissolve the sugar.

Once the sugar has dissolved bring the mixture to a rapid boil and boil until it becomes a syrup. You will notice that the bubbles becomes laboured and heavier.

Add the chopped tomatoes, bay leaf and sultanas and reduce the heat to a gentle simmer.

Cook until the chutney is the right consistency which will take about 2 hours, I like my chutney thick and quite dry but it's your choice, if you would like to test your chutneys setting point, place a small plate in the freezer, pour a teaspoon of chutney on the ice cold plate, let it cool for 5 minutes and then you will have an indication of what it would look like once cooled. Once your happy with your consistency add the chopped thyme and onion seeds, adjust the seasoning if needed. Let the chutney cool for 10 minutes before you fill your sterilized jars. Makes approximately 600g of chutney

I love this recipe as it's a fantastic basic recipe that could be adapted easily. For a pear or mango chutney I use the basic recipe and replace the tomatoes with peeled and roughly diced pears or mangoes and 1 tsb finely sliced and de-seeded red chillies. I also add a tiny pinch of saffron to the chutney to give it that golden rich colour.



### Hot mustard vegetable pickle

Transform a glut of vegetables into a delicious home-made pickle, you can use any vegetables in this recipe so courgettes could be changed to marrows ... you get the jist!

250g green beans 500g small cauliflower	1 heaped tbsp English mustard powder
florets	1 heaped tbsp ground turmeric
250g courgettes	1 tsp ground ginger
100g fine sea salt	1 tsp dried chilli flakes
3 onions, chopped	25 cornflour
300ml malt vinegar	250g granulated sugar

Dice all the vegetables to roughly the same size (keep the onions separate) and put in a non-metallic mixing bowl, sprinkling with the salt and mix until well combined. Cover with a plate and leave to stand for 30/45 minutes. Rinse the vegetables in several changes of cold water. This is important or the pickle will be over salty!

Put the onions in a large saucepan and stir in the malt vinegar. Bring to a gentle simmer and cook for 15 minutes.

Mix five tablespoons of the white wine vinegar with the mustard powder, turmeric, ginger, chilli flakes and cornflour.

Stir the remaining white wine vinegar and the sugar into the malt vinegar and onions until dissolved. Tip the drained vegetables into the same pan, return to a simmer and cook for 10 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Stir the cornflour mixture into the pan with the vegetables until well combined. Cook for a further 8-10 minutes, stirring regularly until the vegetables are tender but crisp and the sauce has thickened.

Put the pickle into the jam jars, ensuring that all the vegetables are evenly distributed, and leave to cool. Cover with glass or plastic coated metal lids and seal. Label and store in a cool, dark place for at least a month before eating.

So hope you are all still sane and looking forward to a wind down from silly season. **Mx** 

# The story behind Port Isaac's first three Lifeboats named Richard and Sarah, 1869 to 1927

Jeremy Lawford of Vine Cottage on Rose Hill has been researching the fascinating background of Richard Thornton West and family and their connection with the early Port Isaac Lifeboats. Other than knowledge that Mr and Mrs Thornton West had homes in Streatham and Exeter and were obviously extremely supportive of the RNLI, little was known about the family that showed such generosity. The research will be lodged in the PISCES archives

#### RICHARD AND SARAH

Richard Thornton West was probably born in 1813. By 1851 he was an East India merchant, living at Streatham in Surrey. He was in partnership with his mother's brother, Richard Thornton, in the firm of Thornton and West of Old Swan Wharf and Lloyds.

When the uncle, reputedly "the greatest man at Lloyds" died in 1865, aged 89, he left about £3,000,000, most of it to be divided amongst his three nephews. The younger Richard's share was believed to be in the region of  $\pounds$ 1,000,000.

In 1863 Richard had married Sarah, eldest daughter of Richard Bowerman of Uffculme in Devon, who was about 24 years younger than her husband.

In 1866 he bought a house, Duryard Lodge, in Exeter, and had it demolished and replaced with a substantial Italianate mansion which he named, in honour of his former home, Streatham Hall. He is believed to have spent some £80,000 on the house and a further £70,000 on the gardens and grounds, which were planted and landscaped by the noted horticulturist Robert Veitch, whose family ran plant nurseries in Exeter and Chelsea.

Richard died in 1878. He and Sarah had one son, Richard Bowerman West, who was born in 1865 and died in 1900. Although he died young, he made a considerable impact on the life of Exeter, using a portion of the legacy from his father to benefit a number of organisations in the city. Amongst his benefactions was St David's Church, which was rebuilt in the last years of the19th century at a cost of around £20,000. Richard and his mother

contributed more than half of the funds. Sarah died two years after her son. They are both commemorated with stained glass windows in the church and buried with Richard Thornton West in the churchyard.

Streatham Hall served as a military hospital during the First World War. In 1922 the estate was bought by Alderman William Henry Reed and presented to the University. The house was renamed Reed Hall in his honour and the grounds became the nucleus of the University's Streatham campus. Nearby streets are named Thornton Hill, West Avenue, Streatham Drive and Streatham Rise.

I can find no evidence that the Thornton Wests had any special connection to Port Isaac. I think their interest was in supporting the RNLI, which simply used donations to provide lifeboats and stations where they were needed most. The Royal Cornwall Gazette reported that the money for the first lifeboat in 1869 was given through the Devon Central branch of the Institution.



"Port Isaac Lifeboat Station was established in 1869, mainly to provide better protection to the fishing boats of the village and local area – in bad weather these boats were at great risk as they ran into the harbour."

It was not their first such donation: in 1866 they reportedly gave £620 to defray the entire cost of a lifeboat station at West Wittering in Sussex.

The second "Richard and Sarah" was endowed in 1887 by "the late Mr Richard Thornton West and Mrs West of Streatham Hall, Exeter". Sarah's obituary in the Royal Cornwall Gazette stated that she "evinced a great interest in the services of the boat". Presumably the third boat, which was merely transferred from another station, was renamed "Richard and Sarah" in honour of the former benefactors, both of whom had passed away.

I am left wondering if there was any particular reason for the Thornton Wests' support of the RNLI. Richard had spent his working life in overseas trade, including a period spent in the East Indies, so maybe his experience of the perils of the sea is reason enough. But there is a fascinating little footnote to the story:

On 14 December 1863 the Western Daily Mercury reported the loss at midnight on 10 December of the sloop "Richard and Sarah", bound from Plymouth for Exeter a part cargo of herrings. She was some six or seven miles off Start Point when she supposedly struck a wreck and foundered. The crew of four took to their boat and were picked up by the "Isabel" of Plymouth and taken to Dartmouth.

There is absolutely no evidence, so far as I know, that this "Richard and Sarah" was owned by Thornton West, and it is perhaps unlikely that a successful East India merchant would have a side-line in commercial fishing, but the name, and the fact that Richard and Sarah Thornton West had married just a couple of months earlier, makes at least for an intriguing coincidence!

The first lifeboat to serve at Port Isaac arrived in 1869 by steam railway from London to Bodmin. This fine 32 foot vessel came from the boatyard of Forrest of Limehouse. Funded by the family of Richard Thornton West the lifeboat was named *Richard and Sarah* and served on station up to 1887, saving 57 lives from six recorded launches.

In 1887 a replacement 34 foot boat, funded by the same family, carrying the name *Richard and Sarah II c*ame on station serving through to 1905. During this period 28 lives were saved from six operational launches.


"The life expectancy of the wood built pulling lifeboats could be short. Often damage would be incurred by courageous crews in carrying out daring close rescue work from storm bound vessels in distress in their bid to save lives at sea. The dedication of the RNLI volunteer crews continues to this day."

In 1905 a third 34 foot pulling lifeboat was brought onto station and named *Richard and Sarah*. There is no evidence that this pulling lifeboat was funded by by the Thornton West family as both Richard, Sarah and their son had passed on by then. This lifeboat came from the Drogheda station in Ireland and had previously been named *Charles Whitton*. It served at Port Isaac from 1905 to 1927 during which time she was launched on four occasions saving five lives. Her renaming to *Richard and Sarah* was probably as a tribute to the generosity of the earlier benefactors.

The final traditional Pulling Lifeboat to have served at Port Isaac, came from funding from a Legacy of Ernest Dresden of London. The *Ernest Dresden* was on station from 1927 through to 1933, the lifeboat carrying the name of its benefactor. Although frequently out on training exercise and 'ever ready', no operational rescues were recorded for this boat.
