PORT ISAAC RNLI'S NEW LIFEBOAT OFFICIALLY NAMED

The volunteer team at Port Isaac RNLI held the formal naming ceremony and service of dedication for its new D class Inshore lifeboat ***Pride of Port Isaac (Goeth Pothusek)*** on Saturday November



9th and marked a new chapter in the station's history. The event wasn't thwarted by the gales and torrential rain with the ceremony being moved into the boathouse. Invited guests and onlookers crowded into the station making a wonderful atmosphere.

Chairman Bob Bulgin BEM summarised the fundraising for the lifeboat: "The boat arrived at the station in October 2019, and has been funded through community fundraising. Back in November 2017 an agreement was reached with RNLI HQ that an appeal should be mounted in order to raise funds for the forthcoming replacement lifeboat, the current boat, Copeland Bell D-707 having served on station for over 11 years of operational life during which time many rescues have been recorded. The target of £52,000 was agreed so it was then a question of "all hands to the task". Committee and Crew put maximum effort into fundraising both by event planning and calling on the support of many established friends of the station. Owing to this support and the generosity shown, both large and small (every penny counts), this target was reached by October 2018 thereby ensuring the replacement boat's future life at Port Isaac Station. Since this time the Appeal has been further extended so as to help fund the further development of associated facilities and now stands at £82,000."

Damien Bolton, Senior Helm opened the ceremony by thanking those who attended. "It gives me great pleasure to welcome you today for our naming ceremony of the new D-Class lifeboat. As well as celebrating the naming of the new lifeboat, this event gives us the chance to say a very warm thank you to all the donors who have so generously contributed."

The service was led by Reverend Elizabeth Wild who gave thanks for the lifeboat with the dedication, "We dedicate her to His service and seek protection for the lifeboat and the crews who operate her during their service in the RNLI."

The lifeboat was then handed over by Cornish bard and member of the community Jon Cleave, to Simon Sharrard Vice President of the RNLI. The boat was accepted onto the station by Lifeboat Operations Manager Chris Bolton.

Tim Hambly, a bard of the Cornish Gorsedh commended the addition of the Cornish language in the name of the new D-Class lifeboat, he said: "I think it's great that Port Isaac RNLI have decided to name the lifeboat in the Cornish language as well as in English. The Cornish language is a very important part of Cornwall's distinctive Celtic heritage."

Bob Bulgin BEM, Lifeboat Station Chairman, and Jon Cleave then named the lifeboat ***Pride of Port Isaac (Goeth Pothusek)*** D-843.

There were readings from crew members and in typical Port Isaac fashion there was plenty of music with the St Minver Silver Band and performances from Port Isaac Chorale, The Gulls and the Fisherman's Friends bringing the ceremony to a close. Commodore Jamie Miller CBE RN gave the Vote of Thanks to everyone who contributed to the fundraising for the boat and all who made the ceremony such an enjoyable event. Invited guests were then hosted at the Chapel Café for some wonderful food and refreshments.

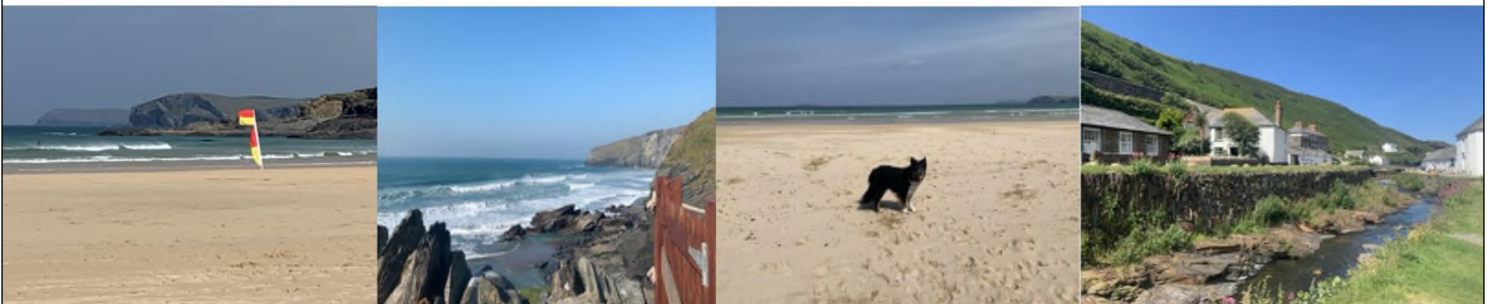

Mum so enjoyed being outdoors, enjoying the scenery and the flora and fauna. She also loved swimming in the sea down at Port Gaverne, but I can't recall Cynth ever having a dip!

Mum loved living in Port Isaac and made many life-long friends. She involved herself in village life, just as she did when we moved to St Issey; was always a staunch supporter of the church and a great believer in the power of prayer. This sustained her in some very difficult times in her long and varied life.

The family had a wonderful time celebrating with her when she reached 100 and I know she was thrilled when some of her friends from Port Isaac came to celebrate with her.

It was, of course, very sad for the family to say our final goodbyes to our wonderful mum, but weren't we lucky to have had her in our lives for so long? And to know so many people loved her is an amazing legacy.

it's a strange story ...

Sometimes I wonder what the shepherds made of their weird, sudden angelic encounter. Another chilly night out on the hills, perched with backs against sloping rock, passing a bottle around for warmth. Wham – a blazing choir abruptly bursts into being mid-air, belting out the Hallelujah chorus. I bet they leapt out of their skins. It's a strange story. Why did the angels bother telling them? It's as if they couldn't hold it in any longer. God is becoming human, sneaking onto earth in a rundown backwater, and it's such huge news, they can't bear not telling. So they whisper it to the shepherds, thrilling.



I feel for Mary, too. Imagine days of bareback donkey riding, nine months pregnant, aching, exhausted, only to tumble off, mid-contraction, into a dark barn. No bed, no midwife, no reassuring mum, no clean towels or hot water – just a scared teenager and a wide-eyed first-time father, scrabbling in the hay for something clean to wrap the baby in. And then, into this dirty, embarrassing scene, a bunch of shepherds turn up, excitement lighting up their coarse, unshaven faces. What a bewildering story. Hints of glory glitter amidst the gritty, rough ordinariness. The Bible says, 'Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart.'

For all the shining window displays and telly ads, real-life Christmas is jam-packed with ordinary, every-day, overwhelming busyness. Making lists, buying gifts, keeping the kids entertained, finding time to wrap presents, struggling to stay out of debt, getting time off work, organising family and dodging rows. But in the midst of all this work and stress, there are also hints of glory; whispers of angels. For me, this often comes at midnight mass. The days leading up to Christmas are overflowing with things to do; but by late night on Christmas Eve, everything is ready: food bought, gifts wrapped under the tree. We come to church in darkness and quiet and sit hushed, waiting. Finally, I'm quiet enough to hear the angel whispers.

This Christmas, in between the busyness and chaos, keep your eyes open for those hints of glory. Christmas means God is with us, in ordinary life: pay attention and you'll look up to find him sitting beside you on the bus. You won't always understand these moments: it is, after all, a strange and bewildering story. But like Mary, treasure them, and ponder them in your heart. You never know – God may be up to something.

The Doc Martin Fund

The Fund's AGM was held in the Village Hall on Thursday 21st November. The trustees were delighted to see so many members of the Port Isaac community present, and most especially so as they had all been involved in giving up their precious time and effort in order to achieve what they wanted within their own endeavours.

We are so lucky to have so many people in this village who quietly and uncomplainingly go about doing their bit for us all, and they deserve our utmost support and respect. It is so gratifying that the fund has been able to support these doers in our community with financial back-up, which in turn gives us all, and particularly the 'young and old', the opportunity to benefit from their projects.

Since the fund was set up seven years ago, it has received £144,000, of which £123,000 has now been allocated.

Port Isaac Primary School has quite rightly been a major beneficiary over the years to the tune thus far of almost £52,000. This has led to support of the nursery, the breakfast club and the after-school facility, all of which add to the appeal and attractiveness of the school; this, in turn keeps the numbers of pupils on the roll up at a critical time. As Jan Everitt, the school business manager says, 'I would like to sincerely thank you for the support you have given us each year during our times of reduced budget and spiralling need.'

The fund is about to continue its support of the school's nursery provision by helping finance places for 2 year olds, and to help accommodate a further day of after-school provision so that it will now cover the 5 day week. Also a budget shortfall to cover transport costs for swimming lessons will be met.

At the other end of our commitments is that which covers the older end of the community, and the fund has donated £6,000 to the Golden Circle, and regards support of this as an ongoing commitment. This works well in tandem with the support given to the Village Hall (which is well-used by many of the older community), and has totalled just short of £26,000 during the fund's existence. As this is now the community's sole large public building, its needs are clearly of great importance and focus.

The Doc Martin Fund has also been able to support worthy projects within the community appreciated by young and old alike, and those of us in the middle! The Pisces exhibitions have been supported to the tune of £1500, and £15,500 has been invaluable to keep our Christmas Lights shining bright in Port Isaac. For the Summer Carnival, the fund has given £4,500, and the bird feeder project, so popular amongst the future David Attenboroughs up at the school and also with the elderly, has been supported to the tune of £2,250.

In addition, the fund has supported three young people from the community to further develop their sporting activities and widen their horizons, and enable them to travel abroad to participate in international surfing and football. The fund would be happy to extend this to any other young people thus engaged.

Finally, the area is very well equipped with defibrillators now, which offer first aid to anyone suffering from a heart attack on our very steep terrain! We all know that it can sometimes be a long wait for an ambulance, so their presence is very reassuring, and the fund is happy to carry on its support in Port Isaac.

So, of the just over £21,000 currently in the Doc Martin account, £12,000 has been earmarked for the school, leaving £9,000 for any project or organisation in Port Isaac to apply for; this amount will doubtless increase and top-up as time goes by.

It has been a strength of the DMF that it has been able to support those areas of our village life that are not necessarily within the remit of other organisations. It is just one part of a raft of fund-raising bodies that are able to contribute to all the facets of village life that we all so appreciate.

Our children enjoy sitting and watching the birds flit to and fro. Our Nursery children were particularly excited when a robin nested in a box in their tree last year. We are hoping that the boxes we have put up this year will entice some more birds to nest next spring.

We would like to thank the Doc Martin Trustees for the funds and Liam for his enthusiasm and drive to see this project come into fruition and flourish. His enthusiasm is infectious; we now have six pairs of really good quality binoculars, which were donated to us as a result of this project, which can be used on site and will also be used on bird watching trips out of school with the children.

THANK YOU FROM THE VILLAGE HALL

Port Isaac Village Hall Management Committee is very grateful to the Doc Martin Fund for its longstanding support for the Hall and recognising its contribution and value to the local community.

The Fund has donated £12000 to the Hall towards the installation of our outdoor access lift. It also gave £4000 matched funding to a joint application from the Hall and The Drekky Theatre Company (pantomime group) for a new lighting and sound system in the Hall.

This year the Fund gave £7500 to the Hall towards the new side extension to the Hall (building starts in the New Year) and also provided the start up finances for PICC – the Port Isaac Community Cinema that is now enjoyed by all members of our community.

THANK YOU FROM THE CHRISTMAS LIGHTS

The Doc Martin Fund has enabled Port Isaac Christmas Lights to grow into the magnificent display they now are.

After getting a donation to get Port Isaac's Christmas Illuminations up and running again some four years ago, the illuminations have grown each year and, with community involvement in raising extra money at our bi-annual Grand Auction, we all benefit from seeing our village lit up over the Christmas period. The fund has also helped in topping up when asked.

Planning Applications

Members considered these planning applications and made the following responses to Cornwall Council:

1. PA19/02853/PREAPP, The Chalet, Rear of 31 Fore Street, Port Isaac – pre-application advice for demolition of existing buildings and construction of replacement dwelling. Members objected due to the height and scale of the proposal, an inappropriate design within the Conservation Area. This would have severe impact on the settings of Listed Buildings namely, Cliff Cottage, Canadian Terrace and The Old School. In addition the harm caused by the large volume of glazing in this highly sensitive setting is unacceptable in terms of reflection and light pollution, causing considerable harm to the long distance views from Roscarrock Hill and Lobber contrary to Policy 5Ef of the emerging NDP: *where within the conservation area respects and reflects the predominant material palette and general window/wall proportions and avoids the inappropriate use of extensive glazing, panoramic windows, balconies, dormer windows, roof lights, solar panels and aerials.*
2. PA19/07664, Glendale, Trewetha, Port Isaac – remodelling and first floor extension to include construction of double garage. Revised plans had been received. Members noted the adjustments made to modify overlooking but remain of the opinion the proposal has an overbearing impact on the neighbours' ability to enjoy their privacy and amenity, due to mass, scale, and volume of glazing and associated balcony areas. The repositioned site for the double garage would still have a severe impact on the neighbours dwelling and is too close to the hedge contrary to Biodiversity SPB S.11.7.3, which advised a 2 m gap to preserve the integrity of hedging. The large site has capacity for a garage with minimal neighbour impact. *Members are not fooled by this claim to be a householder application and do not believe this is a "remodelling" application but is a new build.* In any future scheme members would wish to see mature trees on site preserved by condition, for the amenity of neighbours and i.r.o. biodiversity of this rural site.
3. PA19/08770, 2 Castle Rock, Port Isaac – balcony replacement. Members made no comment.
4. PA19/08886, 49 Fore Street, Port Isaac – studio room (crafts/study) over existing garage. Members objected on the grounds this would set a precedent for garage developments for studios and accommodation. The proposal fails to comply with the Policy 5 of the emerging NDP where development: *makes provision for off-road parking commensurate to the use of the building.* The internal staircase renders the use of the ground floor a garage unusable. The proposed usage is not commensurate with the lack of services as the studio is too distant from the house.
5. PA19/09377, Land N of Port Gaverne Hotel, Port Gaverne – detached dwelling. The site is outside the NDP development boundary. Members made no comment.
6. PA19/09384, The Old Post Office, Trelights – proposed replacement entrance porch. Members supported the application.
7. PA19/09804, 3 Cliffside, Port Isaac – non-material amendment in respect of decision notice PA19/07858 (Alterations to dwelling to include conversion of garage and outbuilding/workshop to living accommodation) - Change size of four front windows to 1500mm in width. Members made no comment.

2. PA19/06230, Land Adj. to Signal Field, New Road, Port Isaac – construction of a detached dwelling (renewal of planning permission no. PA16/07952 dated 21.10.2016).
3. PA19/06286, Land S of 8 Rose Hill, Port Isaac – proposed dwelling - alterations to design of permitted dwelling (PA16/06555) with variation of condition 2 of PA17/05094.

4. PA19/07288, The Beach House, Port Gaverne Hill, Port Isaac – Listed Building Consent to Raise the rear lean-to roof to bear off a pre-existing wallplate, change of rear lean-to internal layout and change of colour to plinth, fascia and guttering.
5. PA19/07858, 3 Cliffside, Port Isaac – alterations to dwelling to include conversion of garage and outbuilding/workshop to living accommodation.
6. PA19/08497, Archer Farm, Trewetha – Non-material amendment in respect of decision notice PA17/08693 (Proposed 3-bedroom dwelling) – Change western glazed doors to window, enclose porch with side door, remove window.

Footpath No1, Port Isaac – 9th to 15th December 2019, 07:30 to 18:00 hours, weekdays only.

Miscellaneous Items

1. High Street Heroes Fund – a grant has been made to this Fund to landscape the area around the War Memorial. Members have ordered three public benches to be placed in the vicinity of the War Memorial.
2. Water Station, Little Hill – a new water station is to be provided on Little Hill. We are waiting for the first Cornish water station to be made.

Websites of the month

As this is the last column for this year it put me in mind of how I started writing for the *Trio*. It was nearly twenty years ago, and I was part of the climate campaign with Cornwall Friends of the Earth and in this column, I come back from time to time to the issue of climate change. So here it is again with some up to date links for more information. The campaign, back in the day, had the idea of the Climate Friendly Parish and here is how one of its first publications started:

"The Climate Friendly Village initiative is an exciting new project aimed at reducing the threat of climate change. A Climate Friendly Village (or parish, city or zone) is a community which has made a commitment to reducing its 'ecological footprint' and living more sustainably. The Climate Friendly Village initiative is for everyone, and hopefully, in time, every community will be a Climate Friendly Village." The full document can be downloaded from this link <https://tinyurl.com/StECCP-doc>

In 2007 the St Endellion Parish Council agreed to the establishment of our own climate friendly parish and you can still see it on the website <https://tinyurl.com/StECCP> although it closed down some years ago (see picture of one of our first events). The idea I think was ahead of its time. What is now commonly referred to as the climate crisis and the environmental emergency has caught the public imagination. There are groups up and down the country getting together to do what they can. Groups ranging from the Council www.cornwall.gov.uk/environment-and-planning/climate-emergency/ to Surfers Against Sewage www.sas.org.uk/our-work/climate-change are actively engaged with the challenge, and not before time. You can also work out what you can contribute yourself by working out your own carbon footprint <https://footprint.wwf.org.uk>

So how are we doing globally? The answer still is not very well so far. Greenhouse gas emissions have continued rising and show no signs of slowing down [HTTPS://TINYURL.COM/WMO-GHG](https://tinyurl.com/WMO-GHG). The head of the World Meteorological Organisation that published the report said: "It is worth recalling that the last time the Earth experienced a comparable concentration of CO₂ was 3-5 million years ago. Back then, the temperature was 2-3°C warmer, sea level was 10-20 meters higher than now". What this means is that while CO₂ levels have been higher in the past, during the time human beings have lived on the Earth they have never been as high. In the last 150 years following the Industrial Revolution <https://tinyurl.com/Cornwall-IR> they have increased from levels that gave us the climate that allows us to flourish, and are now at levels that will make many places on Earth uninhabitable; for example, many coastal areas will be affected by this sea level rise.

The gap between what countries have pledged as part of the Paris agreement and what is needed to keep us below the critical threshold of 1.5 degrees of warming is also alarmingly large <https://tinyurl.com/tcdexjvm> and across the globe no country is contributing enough.

A recent report, commissioned by the UK Climate Change Committee by a fellow psychologist, Richard Carmichael <https://www.imperial.ac.uk/people/r.carmichael> sets out what we need to do in the UK (download it from his website) and many of his ideas were in our thinking in our climate friendly parish plans all those years ago. The title of his report, Behaviour change, public engagement and Net Zero, explains well his thinking. We are only going to get anywhere if we all feel involved and all feel whatever we have to do is fair. He shows that the largest contributions to household consumption in terms of the impact on greenhouse gas emissions come from car and plane travel, animal-based foods, and heating and he explains how we might change the way we relate to of these both as individuals and at a policy level.

David Attenborough's wonderful programmes, Seven Worlds, One Planet have been showing the stunningly beautiful world we inhabit and the serious crisis we face and he has been campaigning on this for years. Even Jeremy Clarkson has come round to the idea that we are in deep trouble <https://tinyurl.com/JC-CC-convert> and with David Attenborough and Jeremy Clarkson both working on this problem, maybe it is solvable after all.

I wish you all a very happy Christmas and let's hope the New Year goes well too.

Making New Christmas Traditions with Chef Lanyon . . .



Well it's that time of year where old family traditions take charge and we all fall into the comfortable feelings of years gone by and memories of Christmas.

The sights and smells of Christmas are embedded into our minds and hopefully that's where they stay. Now I'm not one to change from tradition but I've got a few ideas which may enhance it a little bit.

Roast parsnips: roast them in garlic and honey and olive oil and when cooked toss them in chopped mint and sage!

Roast potatoes: now I know "you can't beat muthers roasties" but try these.

Boil pots for 8-10 mins, drain and mix in 1oz of flour, 2tsp dried oregano and 1tsp turmeric, salt and pepper and vigorously toss to coat. Put in roasting tray and cook till crispy.

Roasted garlic cauliflower: put 1tsp minced garlic, olive oil and cauliflower florets in a resealable bag and toss together. Empty into a casserole dish and roast for 25ish minutes stirring after about 15 mins. After 25 mins top with about 8oz grated Parmesan and chopped parsley and bake till crispy.

Creamy sprouts: here's my take on "muthers" cabbage. Top sprouts a fry them in a knob of butter till browning spots appear, about 5 minutes. Season with salt and pepper. Add 8froz of double cream and bring to a simmer. Reduce heat to low and cover and simmer till sprouts are easily pierced with a fork (30 35 mins). Add a squeeze of fresh lemon juice. These don't take the customerry five hours of boiling which "muther" seemed to think was how long it took to cook sprouts but they taste good.

Have an extremely great Crimbo and a woderful and peaceful new year.

Mrs L's Bread Pudding

A bit of humble simplicity before the
Christmas blow out

225g stale bread, soaked in water or milk for at least half an hour	75g melted butter
2tbs of caster sugar	1 egg beaten
1 level teaspoon mixed spice	2tbs milk
175g mixed fruit	Extra sugar for topping

Preheat the oven to 180°

Squeeze the bread, that has been soaking in enough milk to cover for at least 30 mins, to remove the excess liquid. Place in a mixing bowl, add sugar, mixed spice and fruit and mix well, Pour in the melted butter, beaten egg and milk and mix it all well together.

Pour into a greased 20cm square cake tin that **doesn't** have a removable bottom and flatten out the top with a fork. Bake in the preheated oven for 1 hour. You can sprinkle the extra caster sugar on half an hour into the cook or at the end as you like it. Cut into squares and serve.

This can be eaten with custard as a pudding or cold in your lunch box next day. A very good way to use up stale bread and odds and ends in your cupboard. My mum used to make this for us and it is a real sweet treat for us kids with deceptively little sugar. And again, if you can scrub their hands kids love to do the bread squeezing.
