what an amazing end to our amazing year

We started 2019 with a generous donation of £5000 from the Fisherman's Friends and we were over the moon. We were on our way on what we fully expected to be a long journey, to getting our extension built. Little did we know then what a momentous year of fundraising for the Hall it was going to be, a year that ended as it started, with another generous donation from the Fisherman's Friends of £7300. What happened in the interim months was nothing short of amazing.

Our small Management Committee were on a mission. For years the planned side extension to the Hall to house multi-access toilets at hall floor level had been our aim, but just keeping the hall running and up to scratch took up all tof our time and the money weraised. We needed to move mountains to raise the money for the extension, and in 2019 move mountains we did.

A plea for help brought in not only money but found us Sharon, our "Grant Princess" to help with grant applications plus a band of "Village Hall Heroes" who helped with putting up a new stage ceiling, digging drains, building cupboards, getting rid of years worth of rubbish, extending and refurbishing bar area, and all the other jobs that had been piling up. The biggest thank you to Nigel Andrews, Lewis Bishop, Tom Brown, Jeremy Brown, Alan Davies, Sam Eaves, Andy Hallam, Bertie Herrtage, Johnny Mc, Andy O'Brien, John Salisbury, Simon @ Cliff Cottage, John Sproull, Pete Tomlinson and Martyn Thomas.

Cornish businesses got on board including B&Q in St Austell, Bodmin Flooring, Bodmin Concrete Product, Jewsons, Plumbase, Travis Perkins, Western Supply and the Port Isaac Co-op. The Co-op is a huge supporter of the Hall in many ways including their Local Community Fund. Donations

Financial donations included £2000 from Keith Schilling & Amanda Waygood, £7500 from The Doc Martin Fund, £1305 from Ian McNeice from money he collected from having selfies taken with visitors, £275 from Waitrose Community Matters, Private donations of £1320 and £1428 from the Co-op.

Grants

Grant wise the Hall was lucky enough to secure £500 from the Norman Family Trust, £8000 from the National Lottery, £1000 from The Trefoil Trust, £250 from the Edward Oldham Charity, £7500 from the Garfield Weston Trust, £600 from the Elmgrant Trust, £2000 from the 29th May 1961 Charitable Trust, £1500 from the North Cornwall Business Club and £2000 from the North Cornwall Fund.

ACRE (Action in Communities in Rural England)

And as we ended the year we got the amazing news that ACRE (Action in Communities in Rural England) were giving £13746 from its Village Hall Improvement Grant Fund.

It was certainly not a case of the Management Committee just sitting back and banking all the money! Fundraising for the Hall went into overdrive and a Crowdfunding scheme in the summer raise £9869 and the first ever Port Isaac Shanty Festival brought in over £9000.

We were able to buy 120 new chairs for the hall plus garden benches, pay for a new roof over the existing kitchen and toilets and the outside wall above it rendered and have the hall electrics completely overhauled, updated and certified.

Speaking for the Village Hall Committee, Dee said: "We can't quite believe we have raised just over £71000 in just one year ... but we have. We thank everyone for their wonderful support in what has been an amazing year of fundraising for us. We can now get on with the extension and we are all so excited for the year ahead."

Work starts on building the extension on February 17th this year and when that is completed, the Hall kitchen will be enlarged and refurbished too.








Bob Stands Down After 15 Years

After 15 years as Port Isaac RNLI Committee Chairman, Bob Bulgin has decided to stand down. To say he will be missed is an understatement.

Bob has worked tirelessly to fundraise for the RNLI and to secure sponsorship from a number of local businesses including Sharp's Brewery, Nathan Outlaw, Wavehunters and Buttermilk Confection. Bob also organises the printing of Port Isaac RNLI Christmas Cards and the annual prize draw for an original painting by a local artist, and a wide range of historic Port Isaac lifeboat images which raises thousands of pounds each year. Bob was also instrumental in organising the first Port Isaac RNLI Charity Ball which led on to other Balls raising a huge amount. Bob and his Port Isaac team have also organised fundraising sporting clay shoots in conjunction with the local Colquite Estate attracting teams throughout the county and raising further substantial funds. Plus he was joint Editor with RNLI historian, Nicholas Leach in the creation of a book charting the history of Port Isaac RNLI from its foundation in 1869, from which over £6000 has been raised

In 2013 Bob's dedication and hard work was recognised formally when he was awarded the British Empire Medal (BEM) in the New Year's Honours List. By 2013 Bob had raised £180,000 for Port Isaac RNLI, a figure which now totals over £540,000. The BEM nomination said "through his enthusiasm, determination and hard work, he and his dedicated team have arranged numerous balls, auctions, lotteries and tea parties to keep the charity at the forefront of peoples' minds," it went on to say "He also gives his time freely to encourage young people to become involved with the RNLI. He provides enduring and vitally important pastoral care for the crew. He genuinely cares about people and has an authentic and long held passion for the lifeboat and its place in the community."



These outstanding fundraising efforts were again highlighted during the station's new lifeboat appeal. Over £80,000 has been raised to secure the station a new D-Class Lifeboat, which came on service in October 2019. The campaign ran for 18 months with the target of £52,000 being raised within the first six months of the appeal. All remaining monies will help fund the further development of associated facilities.

In recognition of Bob's huge contribution and dedication, the RNLI have appointed him President of Port Isaac Lifeboat Station. In a letter to Bob, Mark Dowie Chief Executive of the RNLI says "I would like to thank you for continuing to give your



skills, your time and your commitment to the RNLI and to the vital work of saving lives at sea." In reply Bob stated that he was "indeed honoured to be considered for such a position following on from the Stations past highly respected President, David Castle, and pledged to continue his efforts in representing the best interests of both Crew and Committee of Port Isaac RNLI."

Bob has made a formal proposal to hand over the responsibility of Chair for Port Isaac to Megan Rees who has unanimous support of the Committee, Crew, Executive officers and those associated with Port Isaac RNLI. On making this proposal Bob stated that he was very confident that Megan will prove to be an excellent choice in order to ensure the consolidation and future continuity of support and communication with Committee and Crew and looks forward to a close, ongoing, working relationship leading up to Megan's formal appointment at the forthcoming Port Isaac RNLI AGM on April 2nd.

AN ADVENT GIFT OF £12,000 PRESENTED TO PORT ISAAC RNLI BY OUTLAW'S FISH KITCHEN

Kicking off advent with a charitable gift, the team at Outlaw's Fish Kitchen presented a cheque for £12,000 to Port Isaac RNLI lifeboat station.

The money was raised from adding a £2.50 donation to every bill and £800 from a special fundraising evening with rugby legend and MasterChef winner, Phil Vickery, plus a silent auction of a signed 2003 replica world cup shirt and biography which raised a further £400 in funds.

One of my favourites consists of beef, onions bacon and red wine ,who could want for anything else and all topped with cheddar and Parmesan scones. Yum yum. Everybody has got their take on a beouf bourguignon and here's mine.

1 Cornish onion, finely diced 4 rashers streaky smoked bacon

4 cloves of garlic

2lb diced beef 8oz chestnut mushrooms a good sprig of fresh thyme

Cheese scones

1lb self raising flour
4oz soft marg
3oz vintage cheddar
2oz Cornish blue cheese
1/2 teaspoon of baking powder

8 small pickled onions (soaked in water then washed) Tomato purée Copious amounts of red wine. Spoonful of sugar Salt and pepper Worcester sauce

1/4 teaspoon smoked paprika and some chopped parsley Salt and pepper Milk to mix

Method

- Toss diced beef in a tad of oil, season and put in a roasting tin and put in oven @ 200° for 45 mins.
- Meanwhile dice onions, cut bacon into lardons and chop garlic and fry in oil with a bunch of thyme (tied with string for easy removal).
- Slice but don't cook mushrooms, soak-the pickled onions for 20 minutes and rinse off and add to bacon and onions.
- After 45 mins take beef from oven and drain off fat. Add mushrooms, onion and bacon mix into beef tray.
- Meanwhile put frying pan back on stove, turn up the heat and pour in red wine and tomato purée and reduce and de-glaze the pan. I like to add a couple of dashes of Worcester sauce. Once reduced by half pour over beef, season with salt and pepper. Cover with tin foil and either put in slow cooker or oven @170° for 2 maybe 3 hours.
- Then make up the scene dough by rubbing all ingredients together. Then add milk to make a dough, roll out to 1cm thick, cut out scones, put on baking tray, wash with milk and bake in oven for 13 mins @200°.
- 10 minutes before serving put baked scones on top of bourguignon, grate Parmesan cheese over them and return to oven till melted and golden. Serve with steamed tender stem broccoli.

Kim's Easy Tomato Sauce

This sauce is quick and easy and can mostly be made with things you may well have in your cupboard. It's great with pasta and I think its vegan. Or you can add it to meatballs, or to fried mince to make bolognaise. It's a great base to add extras to, to make dinners for the family.

Basic Sauce

I tbsp olive oil

I large onion finely chopped

1 tbsp chopped garlic or garlic paste

1 tin chopped tomatoes

I carton passata

2 tbs dried basil (or to taste)

1 tsp sugar

Extras

Chopped chorizo to taste

Add at frying stage to bolster the sauce

Any chopped veg you like, I can recommend Broccoli, Mange Tout, Mushrooms, Courgettes and Peas - any or all of these can be added with the tomatoes

Method

Fry the onion in a non stick deep pan which has a lid, with a tbsp of olive oil if you want to. Add the garlic and fry for a little longer. Add the chorizo if using and fry for a few minutes. Add the tin of chopped tomatoes and the passata and as much basil as you like, I like loads. Give it a good stir, bring to the boil, turn down the heat and simmer for ten minutes (if adding vegetables 15 minutes). Serve with pasta and grated cheese. Tasty and it won't break the bank.

Contract & Maintenance Supervisor

We are pleased to welcome Ms Clare Jon to the St Endellion Parish Council (PC). Clare has been appointed to the post of Contract and Maintenance Supervisor and her brief is to check and ensure that all the PC's amenities are safe and working efficiently.

Planning Applications

Members considered these planning applications and made the following responses to Cornwall Council:

- 1. PA19/07055, Pennti Ros, Lower Trefreock, Port Isaac sustainable live to work extension, to an existing garden room. OBJECT. Members consider the scale of the building would not be absorbed into the landscape in this elevated position and would appear as a very large single dwelling in the open countryside. Neither are members in agreement that the proposal constitutes a Live Work proposal. Members recommend refusal due to the harm to the AONB which has the highest level of protection due to the mass, scale. The extensive glazing would cause light spillage, contrary to the AONB management plan which seeks to preserve dark skies.
- 2. PA19/09679, 91 Fore Street, Port Isaac proposed extensions and alterations to house and garage. Cllr. Williams was given permission to explain the plans and then left the meeting whilst this was discussed. Members are generally in support but would like to see a reduction in the amount of glazing. If permission is granted, then Members would like a condition imposed for the glazing to be non-reflective. The views of the Historic Service should be sought regarding this application, which is in the Conservation Area.
- PA19/09773, 34 Dolphin Street, Port Isaac renovation works including rerendering front elevation and internal repair. SUPPORT, but Members are disappointed that there are no plans to remove the asbestos roof.
- 4. PA19/09694, 92 Fore Street, Port Isaac single storey extension of porch area between the kitchen and bathroom; removal of porch glazing and installation of flat roof with skylight; removal and re-use of existing kitchen sash window. SUPPORT but Members are emphatic that they do not agree that this proposal constitutes works to the front elevation of the building. The front elevation is in a highly visible location within the Conservation Area and as such should not be regarded as rear elevation with associated Permitted Development Rights (The Design and Access Statement refers).
- 5. PA19/09755, Slipway Hotel, 1 Church Hill, Port Isaac Listed Building Consent for re-roofing. **SUPPORT**.
- PA19/10181, Cedar Bungalow, Trewetha demolition and replacement of existing garage with home office and remodelling of existing dwelling with associated works. SUPPORT.
- PA19/10403, Cairnsmore, Port Gaverne works to trees covered by a Tree
 Preservation Order, namely fell the 20 metres high mature monteray pine. The
 Tree Officer had visited the site and recommended replacement with a Scots
 Pine. SUPPORT.
- 8. PA19/10272, 90 Fore Street, Port Isaac first floor extension out over an existing ground floor extension. Cllr. Williams said there had been objections to a perceived loss of light to neighbouring properties. Members RESOLVED to make "No Comment" to the application. Cllr. Williams supported the application.

Scott Mann's update from Parliament

There is great optimism and a sense of purpose in Parliament which I have not felt in many months and Westminster feels like a good place to work again. Towards the end of the last session, the Government felt paralysed by Brexit delay

House to get work done on

and it was difficult for members across the House to get work done on behalf of their constituents. I am both glad and relieved that the new Conservative majority Government is on schedule to meet our election pledge of leaving the EU with a deal by January 31st. With this great weight lifted we can all go about the most important business Members of Parliament undertake; working on behalf of our constituents to bring positive change to our communities.

After returning to Parliament in the New Year I have been busy reconnecting with many of the companies and groups that I've been working with to achieve outcomes for North Cornwall. Infrastructure and transport links were a big issue for us at the General Election, and I have sought an update from Great Western Railways concerning their new timetable. They've informed me that the key change for Cornwall is that all the London trains now run without stopping between Taunton and Reading, saving around 11 minutes on the overall journey time. We also now have half-hourly, instead of hourly, trains between Plymouth and Penzance. The trains are also better thanks to improved rolling stock on Cornish lines with more four carriage trains in service, replacing the two-car trains which many local people don't like.

Like many North Cornwall residents, I was disappointed to learn that Stratton MIU has been temporarily closed overnight for the second time in recent years. I immediately wrote to Phil Confue, Chief Executive of Cornwall Partnership NHS Foundation Trust, to ask for clarifications regarding this temporary closure and raise my concerns about Stratton staff being used as a backup for the main hospital in Treliske. I also met with local members of Cornwall Council to discuss this matter further, and I will relay their feedback to the Secretary of State for Health as soon as possible.

Websites of the month

Some new developments in technology are my theme for this month as virtual reality and augmented reality have really taken off and over Xmas I had the chance to have a go with a proper VR headset and I have to say it is an amazing experience. It really does feel like you are in a different world. But the history of this sort of experience goes back a long way. The earliest sort of 3D was the stereoscope and the first one was invented by Sir Charles Wheatsone, https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Charles Wheatstone who also, amongst many other things, invented the English concertina and is named after the Wheatstone Bridge, a key innovation in electrical measurement and telegraphy. This led on to 3D films, the earliest of which was shown nearly 100 years ago https://www.thevintagenews.com/2019/03/20/first-edfilm/

But it was the development of fast computers and the internet that finally achieved virtual and augmented reality. Augmented reality is adding digital content to a picture you are taking with your phone camera. A good example of this is the Snapchat app https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Snapchat that allows you to add things to your selfie - different ears, eyes, hats etc. A more spooky app allows you to change the age of your face https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/FaceApp amongst other things, and verges onto the field of 'deep fakes' where videos can seem to show someone saying or doing something they never did. All this depends on the rapid development of machine learning and articifical intelligence - a field I witnessed at a very early stage of its development at the Experimental Psychology lab I worked in over 50 years ago. It has come a long way since then!

So then we come to virtual reality or VR https://enwikipedia.org/wiki/Virtual reality (see image). I first tried this out with Google Cardboard and my phone https://www.whatvr.co/guides/google-cardboard/. This gives you much the same 'immersive' feeling much more expensive kit and there are versions of VR that don't need a headset at all, but its not quite the same; you can try this with https://www.with.in/get-the-app which has versions for no headset, cardboard type headset or the top of the range headsets. If you want to try the full experience without buying a headset, you can go to Cornwall a place where, according to their website you try it out, a bit like going to the cinema. It is down in Penzance https://www.virtualrealitycornwall.co.uk/pages/book.



One of the amazing aspects of the VR world is that you can be in the same virtual place but be thousands of miles away. I have done this with family who are in Australia, and have had some good games of tennis (always losing I'm afraid). In my department at the University they have been using VR for some years to investigate how it can be used to help people overcome trauma and phobias, and you can read about it here https://www.exeter.ac.uk/mooddisorders/research/biobehavioural/

I can't finish this column without some mention of climate change.
