Frank Couch

Frank Couch was born in 1884 in Port Isaac, North Cornwall, the son of Francis Couch (mariner and fisherman) and Hannah Marina Couch (née Fishley). Hannah was originally from Plymouth, Devon and this is where they were married on August 6th 1874. Frank was the fifth of ten children, the eldest two (as per the 1881 census) were Charles Olonza and Laura Ellen. Two others were Francis and Mary both of whom died as young children.



Frank signed-on the *Titanic* in Southampton on April 6th 1912, as an able-bodied seaman his monthly wages

On Monday September 12th 1887, The School Logbook records "Admitted F Couch"

were £5. He gave no local address but indicated that he had previously served aboard the *Modwera*. Aged just 28. Frank was lost in the sinking. His body was

later recovered by the *MacKay Bennett*.

COUCH, Mr Frank 28 Deck Crew Southampton Able Seaman [253]

It is greatly feared that Mr. Frank Couch, registered in the Titanic as 28, A.B., of Port Isaac, is among the victims of that terrible disaster. On Saturday last there was a ray of hope, the name of Church appearing among the survivors, but a wire arrived and confirmed the name as F. Clinch. Out of the 30 A.B.'s on the ill-fated ship it appears 26 are saved. It is generally thought here that Couch was one of four reported to have died at the oars of the boats, through the terrible exposure. He was a very upright, kindly, and bright young man, always ready to help where needed. He was a member of the local Liberal Club. Much sympathy goes out to his father (Capt. F. Couch, of Canadian Terrace). Capt. Couch is feeling the blow heavily, not long ago having lost his wife, and but a few years ago his eldest son, the captain of the ill-fated schooner Tregea. Young Frank was at home only about two months since. He was for some considerable time a Naval Reserve man.

Frank is mentioned on his parents gravestone in the parish churchyard of St Endellion, a few miles from Port Isaac, Cornwall. The inscription reads:

In Loving Memory of **Marina Couch** who died April 5th 1910 aged 57 years also of Francis husband of the above who died April 14th 1919 aged 65 years Also of their three sons Francis who died June 13th 1880 aged 13 months **Charles Olonza** who was drowned at sea on or about November 18th 1905 aged 29 years Frank who was drowned in the Titanic disaster April 15th 1912 aged 28 years Also of Mary, their daughter died December 6th 1893 aged 2 years



Frank was subsequently buried in the Fairview Cemetery, Halifax Nova Scotia on May 6th 1912.

On April 10th 1912, The RMS Titanic embarked on its maiden voyage, sailing from Southampton to New York. One of the largest and most luxurious passenger liners at the time, the Titanic was considered by many to be unsinkable. However, on April 14th, the ship struck an iceberg and early the next day it sank. Some 1500 people perished.
