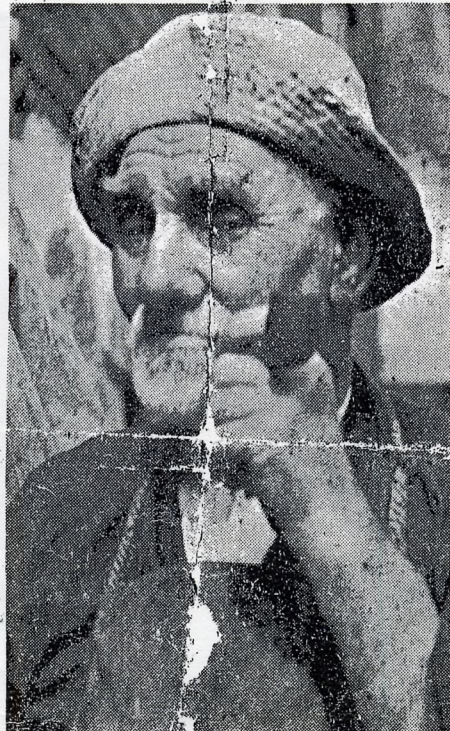


PORT ISAAC'S GRAND OLD MEN.
