



Ronald Gifford was the second son of Mr. & Mrs. E.A.Gifford of Westcott Guest House, Trewetha Lane, Port Isaac. His early life was spent at Pendoggett and he went to school at St Kew, but later the family moved to Port Isaac. On leaving school, he went to work with his father at Treharrock farm and so, in 1939, at the beginning of the Second World War, as an agricultural worker, he was in a reserved occupation and therefore was not "called up". However, in due course, all his friends joined the forces and so he decided to enlist.



1919-1943


Ronald joined the Cold Stream Guards. He fought in the North African Campaign and then on to the invasion of Sicily and from there to Italy where, sadly, he was killed in action in the Allied push to Monte Casino. His grave is in the Monte Casino war cemetery.

JOIN US ON A MOVING DAY OUT TO THE HILL TOP ABBEY OF MONTE CASSINO , THE BIRTHPLACE OF THE ORDER OF THE BENEDICTINE MONKS AND THE BURIAL PLACE OF ST. BENEDICT HIMSELF. THIS ABBEY HAS MUCH RELIGIOUS IMPORTANCE DESTROYED SEVERAL TIMES IN ITS TURBULENT HISTORY, THE ABBEY HAS BEEN COMPLETELY REBUILT TO ITS FORMER SPLENDOUR, AFTER THE MOST RECENT DESTRUCTION IN 1944 WHEN IT WAS THE SITE OF ONE OF THE BLOODIEST BATTLES OF THE SECOND WORLD WAR. AFTER A TOUR OF THE ABBEY YOU WILL STOP AT SOME OF THE WAR CEMETERIES INCLUDING THE COMMONWEALTH CEMETERY TO PAY RESPECT TO THOSE WHO LOST THEIR LIVES.
