
"It's traditional, it's Cornish and it's brought the community together"

The first mention of gig rowing in Port Isaac came about after an RNLI meeting back in 1990. One of the crew spoke about what he'd seen at Padstow and Cadgwith, where there were established rowing clubs. Another crew member knew about Newquay Rowing Club. It was decided to check out this sport. The Newquay and Padstow clubs invited those who were interested to have a go rowing, singing and drinking the odd pint.

This inspired more interest in the village from a diverse selection of people, some who wanted to row from Port Isaac and others who wanted to contribute something towards this new community venture. Before very long a constitution was drawn up and a committee was formed. A grant and interest-free loan were successfully applied for from North Cornwall District Council. This got things started but didn't cover the cost of a gig, trailer, oars and boat cover, so the club set to work to raise what was needed ... and they did this in just six months as well as paying back their loan in five years.

The draw will be made by Tamsin Mitchell and Ted Gundry of Radio Cornwall. The total sum required to buy a gig and the associated equipment will be £13,288 (including VAT), and the committee should soon be able to announce how much grant will be available from the Sports Council. The name of Port Isaac's gig has been chosen by ballot, and by a significant majority vote, the gig will be named 'CORSAIR'. Port Isaac Rowing Club has been formed in response to revived interest in long dormant gig racing at Port Isaac. Gig racing there ceased around 1900, but prior to that there were three gigs at one time or another, named Tom Sawyer, Jane and Corsair.

Port Isaac Rowing Club already has a growing list of members - for which there are two categories - under 16 years and 16 years and over. Mers' and Ladies' crews have already been formed, and some training has been carried out with kind help of other clubs.

A number of fund-raising

and social events have been arranged, and a good start has been made towards raising the £13,000 needed to buy and equip a gig.

MORE than £4,000 has been raised by a group of enthusiastic gig racers in North Cornwall.

The target for members of Port Isaac Rowing Club is £13,200, the cost of a new boat and equipment.

A decision to make a grant and loan to the club has been announced by the Sports Council. But the amounts will not be known until January 3.

Club spokeswoman Jan Rowe said: "More than £4,200 has already been raised and promises of more have been received."

The whole community was involved including the Primary School, where they ran a competition to produce a design to be used on club clothing, T-shirts and sweatshirts.


Some of the men from the village started singing in the local pubs, namely The St Kew Inn and The Golden Lion, to help raise money. Some of these chaps went on to become the Fisherman's Friends and their story is another chapter of Port Isaac's history.

... and Port Isaac's gig was built from Cornish elm grown in the Allen Valley, just four and a half miles from the village ...

A boat builder from Padstow, Peter Reveley, aka Dasher, was commissioned to build the gig. His family had built boats in Padstow for as long as memory existed, using Cornish elm and traditional techniques. The elm for Corsair is reputed to have grown in the Allen Valley, not far from the village of St Teath, about four and a half miles from Port Isaac. He had already built *Dasher* for Padstow Rowing Club and *Cape Cornwall* for the rowing club of the same name, based in Sennen.

A name had to be chosen for Port Isaac's first gig and a competition was held. Members of the public could pay for the privilege to name the boat. A short list of names was compiled from research on gigs that had existed at some time in the village - *Tom Sawyer, Jane* and *Corsair*.

Corsair was the clear leader, voted for by over half the village



Corsair was officially launched in Port Isaac on Easter Sunday 1991 by George Moth. George had a career as a Naval architect and had been a strong supporter of the rowing club, from it's inception. He was the obvious choice for the honour being one of the oldest residents of the village at the time and having been the landlord of the The Lawns, as well as his long and dedicated support of the RNLI, for which he was awarded a gold medal and was the current branch treasurer.

There were hundreds of spectators on the beach and cliff tops around the village as *Corsair* took to the water.

Other clubs were invited to attend and races were held ... apparently Port Isaac didn't fair too well on this occasion. The crews were still novices, at least that's one excuse that's been used! It was a good day nonetheless.
