St Piran's celebrations in Bodmin

Over 400 children from Bodmin and the surrounding parishes primary schools will be taking part in the celebrations on March 5th. Clarinda, Chris, a fiddler, and I go into the schools and run through the three songs for the Mount Folly -'Bro Goth Agan Tasow', 'Hail to the Homeland' and 'Trelawny'. Each school will also perform a song, poem or play before their pasty in St Petrocs Church. Past Grand Bard of Gorsedh Kernow Merv Davey and his wife Alison also attend the schools beforehand to run through the dance for the Mount Folly.

The procession starts at the top of Fore Street at 11am. It stops briefly at the An Gov stone and then on to Mount Folly. There we have a few speeches, sing the three songs and the dancing. We then go through Priory Park to the Church. It finishes around 1pm. Wet weather, we go straight to the Church.

Bodmin has a St Piran's Committee. This is our twentieth year of celebrations. Our National Patron Saint is remembered all over Cornwall, and in Bodmin we feel that the children especially should be taught about their heritage.

Bodmin expects to welcome Cornishmen and women from all over the country to take part and everyone is welcome to join in and celebrate this special day.



Gool Peran St Piran's Day

St Piran's Day is celebrated as the national day of Cornwall on March 5th every year and is regarded by many Cornish people as the first day of spring. He is one of Cornwall's three patron saints, the other two being St Michael (St Michael's Mount) and St Petroc (Padstow).

St Piran was born in Ireland back in the early sixth century. He went to Rome to study the scriptures and then returned home and was made a Bishop. He seemed to be a healer and apparently performed many miracles including raising dead soldiers slain in battle but even this did not impress the Kings of Ireland who wanted rid. He was flung into the sea with a millstone round his neck. Miraculously he did not drown but floated over the water and was washed up on Perran Beach at Perranporth. Here in the sand dunes he built a small chapel and people flocked from miles around to hear him preach.

Quite by accident St Piran also discovered tin when a black stone on his fire leaked a white liquid. The Cornish Flag, the Flag of St Piran, of a white cross on a black background, represents the white tin flowing from the black rock, or good overcoming evil. Tinners adopted St Piran as their saint.

Little is known of the specific traditions of the day other than lots of alcohol was consumed during Perrantide, the week leading up to St Piran's Day. In fact, "drunk as a Perraner" was used in the 19th century to describe people who had overindulged! It is said that St Piran was fond of a drink and he met his end falling down a well – after living for 200 years.

It was in the early 20th century that the day had a revival as a national day for Cornwall and in 2006 the Cornish MP, Dan Rogerson asked, unsuccessfully, the Government to make the day a public holiday in Cornwall. But holiday or not, it's a day for celebration in Cornwall.

The four elements of the Christian life

I am writing this before the season of Lent begins although Christmas is now long past and we shall soon be turning to look forward to the time of Our Lord's Passion and Resurrection at Easter. During Lent some of us will be reading Rowan Williams' book Being Christian. The former archbishop of Canterbury is now a prebendary of St Endellion which makes the choice particularly appropriate.

In the book bishop Rowan focusses on four elements of the Christian life, Baptism, the Bible, the Eucharist and Prayer. Each of these topics is a fundamental part of every Christian's life, irrespective of the particular church to which they belong. The rite of baptism, which we are told was performed by John the Baptist for Jesus himself, is simultaneously a way into

faith, a means of washing away our old selves but also a way of reaffirming our being in the world; not a means of separation from but of establishing our belonging in. To further this we read the bible – or more likely in church listen to its being read. In doing so we realise that the bible is not a set of instructions but rather the record of a series of encounters with God, some



revealing the best of human nature, some the worst. As Bishop Williams says, "reading the bible is about listening to God in Jesus".

The Eucharist, or Communion, is the central act of Christian worship, whether we engage with it weekly, daily or less frequently. It is not something we can do individually, we have to share in it and to learn that as Christ welcomes us to himself within the sacrament so we also should welcome others to ourselves. This brings us to Bishop Williams' final topic, Prayer. Prayer is not something we do apart from the world, rather it is a part of our worldly life. Above all it is in the repetition of the Lord's Prayer that we can become more attuned to God's will for us.

Chef Lanyon's sweet and fragrant Malaysian Curry

I must be getting old as I seem to be looking forward after work to "Micheal portillos train journeys". His latest adventure is Thailand ! Indonesia and Malaysia which sort of got the juices flowing ...

To make the curry paste you'll need:

- 5 cloves garlic
- 4 long red chillies
- 3 lemongrass stalks, outer leaves removed and finely sliced
- 4 large shallots
- 1tsp ground turmeric
- 2/3 tbsp groundnut oil

Put all ingredients into food processor except oil, blitz then scrap down sides then drizzle oil in to make paste.

The Curry:

1kg chicken thigh meat 2tbsp ground nut oil 2 onions finely sliced Sea salt & ground black pepper 2tbsp light soy sauce 4 kaffir lime leaves 1 cinnamon stick 3 star anise

40ml coconut milk 100ml chicken stock 1tsp palm or light brown sugar 2 tbsp fish sauce 400g fine green beans Handful of fresh coriander

for the Coconut rice: 300g jasmine rice 200ml coconut milk 5cm peeled ginger Pinch of sea salt 200ml water

Rinse rice in cold water drain and tip into thick bottomed pan, add rest of ingredients plus water bring to boil then reduce to simmer for 10 mins. Remove from heat leave covered and stand for 5 to 10 mins. Fluff rice with a fork and serve hot.

And this is what you do:

Heat oil add paste and fry till fragrant. Add onions for 5 mins.

Season chicken add to paste along with lime leaves, cinnamon, star anise, coconut milk, stock, sugar, soy and fish sauce and bring to the boil. Then reduce to simmer for 30 to 40 mins or until chicken is tender. To finish, skim off excess fat and throw in green beans and cook for extra 5 to 6 minutes.

Finally scatter with torn coriander leaves.



Still got a little bit of room left for something sweet? Try Mrs L's Banana Cake

I've now had enough of being good after Christmas, but not yet feeling bad enough to go mad! This cake uses up left over bananas and having fruit in it must surely contribute to your five a day??

3 large ripe bananas mashed (riper the better but if they are black inside they are past it) 225g (8oz) caster sugar 225g (8oz) soft cooking margarine (or butter if you're rich) 4 large eggs beaten 225g (8oz) self raising flour 1tbs ground rice (stops the bananas making it sloppy)

lcing

2 tsp lemon juice 2 tbs hot water Icing sugar

ANSOM

Put all of the ingredients into a food processor and pulse until blended - this cake doesn't rise much so get everything combined.

Pour into a 22cm square lined tin and cook at 190° for 35-45 minutes Depending on how hot your oven gets. A metal skewer inserted into the middle will come out clean when cooked

Whilst the cake cools still in the tin, mix the water and lemon juice in a bowl and add icing sugar a tablespoon at a time until you get a nice thick but still runny icing. Pour over the cake and move it around to spread. Cut into nine squares if you can get to it before the rest of your family have cut bits off and nicked it!

Planning Applications

Members considered these planning applications and made the following responses to Cornwall Council:

- PA19/03215/PREAPP, Kittiwake Cottage, 7-9 Middle Street, Port Isaac preapplication advice to convert current 1-bedroom holiday let into office space and staff changing facilities for the restaurant next door. Members supported the application.
- 2. PA19/11215, Beulah, Trelights conversion of Existing Garage to form a Study Bedroom and Alteration to an existing window. Members supported the application.
- 3. PA19/11260, Gwel Arvor, Tintagel Terrace, Port Isaac re-submission of Reserved

Matters application PA18/09791 following Outline Approval PA17/09691 dated 12th December 2017 for access, appearance, landscaping, layout and scale. Members objected on the grounds the proposal is contrary to our emerging NDP, Policy 6H (C) which states new development will be supported if design: respects and reflects the dominant window/wall proportions evident within the street.

The proposal introduces balconies onto the street scene, which is not appropriate in the setting and would cause cumulative noise disturbance for the neighbours given the permission for multiple balconies on the rear elevation.

Should the officer be minded to permit Members request the retention of cedar cladding for the reason it would grey and be less intrusive than stained wood of an unspecified colour. If permitted, we also advise chimney flues are black, not stainless steel, minimising impact as per the AONB officer comment.

 PA20/00284, Yn-Dewetha, Port Gaverne – conversion of existing roof space to residential use. Install new windows and doors. Construct new porch. New cladding.

Members commented: The use of coloured composite cladding in Port Gaverne is contrary to our emerging NDP policy 6Q (h) which states proposal should: 'Respecting and reflecting the existing dominant material palette in the character area when considering new development and understanding a material's practical requirements when maintaining or repairing structures.' If the officer is minded to permit we request the applicant consider the use of cedar cladding, which would fade and is more suited to the material palette of Port Gaverne.

5. *PA20/00629, Glendale, Trewetha* – proposed demolition of existing dwelling and construction of replacement dwelling.

Members commented: Members are in favour of the new building, but not the car port and urge the applicant and neighbours to come to a reasonable agreement

- 1. PA19/09694, 92 Fore Street, Port Isaac single storey extension of porch area between the kitchen and bathroom; removal of porch glazing and installation of flat roof with skylight; removal and re-use of existing kitchen sash window.
- 2. PA19/09773, 34 Dolphin Street, Port Isaac renovation works including rerendering front elevation and internal repair.
- 3. PA19/06645, 36 New Road, Port Isaac demolition of existing dwelling and replacement with new dwelling.
- 4. PA19/09377, Land N of Port Gaverne Hotel, Portgaverne detached dwelling. The site is outside the NDP development boundary.
- PA19/10181, Cedar Bungalow, Trewetha demolition and replacement of existing garage with home office and remodelling of existing dwelling with associated works.
- 6. PA19/10403, Cairnsmore, Port Gaverne works to trees covered by a Tree Preservation Order, namely fell the 20 metres high mature monteray pine.
- 7. I am very pleased to be the first person to be employed in this new role, and hope it will give me the opportunity to give something back to the community in which I live.

Scott Mann's update from Parliament

Many of you may have read the news stories about little Freddie Jackson, the three year old who needed a special bed which will adapt to his needs while he grows. I was really proud to see how the community came together to support the family, particularly the people of Launceston who raised over £4,000. Many of the issues Freddy's faced with his bed came from the fact that he was born in Derriford, yet his more recent care comes under the Cornwall NHS. The NHS regions do not correspond to constituency boundaries, and many of my constituents use hospitals in Devon as they are geographically closer. Moving forward, I believe we must do better to encourage links in an effort to address these issues.

I raised the issue of Freddy's bed with the Secretary of State in Westminster, and have a further follow up meeting with the Health Minister coming soon. This situation could be resolved very quickly by the Cornwall health organisations if they would meet the cost of maintenance of the bed. It should be done immediately and without the need to involve ministers. However, after telling the Secretary of State about Freddy's case he is keen to get involved. I would urge the health organisations in Cornwall to sort this out now so Freddy and his family can have the best bed available to him. I won't let this issue drop until it is fully resolved.

In Bude many residents were upset to find out that the 6 & 6A Bude to Exeter bus service is being looked at by the operator. I have been clear that I want local people to be able to access connecting and direct transport services to NHS sites and mainline rail stations. I have already meet with Stagecoach, responded formally to the consultation on behalf of Bude & Stratton. I would also like to encourage readers in the area to respond to the consultation via the Stagecoach website.

The 2020 budget will take place on March 11th. I have been asked to feedback my financial priorities for North Cornwall over the next twelve months. The Camelford bypass will be one of the key points for me, as I believe we need this project approved this year. Nigel Blackler and Cornwall Council have done a fantastic job so far, and after visiting the public consultation meetings last month I'm really excited to get spades in the ground.

Finally, I was able to brief the Housing & Communities Minister on the Bodmin 2030 programme last week. I showed Robert Jennrick the 2030 document, and told him more about the ambitions which Bodmin has for the next ten years. Bodmin's vision for a central role in Cornwall's future is one I share and I look forward to supporting it during this Parliament.

Websites of the month

The film *Bait*, 2019 has received huge critical acclaim since its release (www.baitfilm.co.uk). Shot on a 16mm black and white film it tells the story of life in a Cornish fishing village.This got me thinking about what you can find online about Cornish life on film. (*Note: This was shown at PICC (Port Isaac Community Cinema - see page 3) to a sell-out audience and is being shown again at 2pm on Thursday March 12th and then again in the summer*)

Port Isaac, of course, has its own repository of local history, the excellent PISCES project (www.portisaacheritage.co.uk). Many readers will know all about it but there is so much of interest it is well worth visiting again, if you haven't looked for a bit. There are 25 themes to choose from including people, singing and music and the RNLI. There are also oral history videos where people talk about their memories of times past, and lots more.

Over the years people have visited Cornwall for holidays and documentaries and there is quite a collection of old movies online now. A 1930's one has some film of Tintagel Castle, and also of the Bridge at Wadebridge. The rest is of Fowey and the area around it and shows some very nice boating scenes (https://tinyurl.com/Tintagel-Wadebridge).

Pathe News has much material of interest about Cornwall, but one short movie of Port Isaac from 1938 (https://tinyurl.com/Port-Isaac-1938) makes good viewing. The voice-over starts off by quoting the Charles Kingsley poem "The Three Fishers" (https://en.wikipedia.org.wiki/Three Fishers) saying

"For men must work and women must weep, And there's little to earn, and many to keep, Though the harbour bar be moaning"

and that Charles Kingsley was inspired to write his poem about life and tragedy among the fisher people after a visit to Port Isaac. The film shows the 'fine new breakwater' and says Port Isaac used to be a 'hotbed of smuggling'.

The picture that Charles Kingsley's poem paints is rather grim and also historically incomplete – and there are some interesting websites about the role of women in the history of the Cornish fishing industry. *The Cornish Good Seafood Guide* has some great photos and stories about the way the pilchards were collected and processed – very hard work indeed and largely the responsibility of women (https://tinyurl.com/history-cornish-fishing-women). This is echoed in these other two sites that give some accounts of women running businesses as early as 1677 in Newlyn:

"We know of some self-employed female fish curers such as Elizabeth Noye of Mousehole (a Keigwin) whose 1677 inventory included 16 bucklers, 14 pressing poles and 21 pressing stones. Lydia Tonkin was her Newlyn equivalent in the late 1690s-1700s. There was also a large number of women employed to work in the fish cellars from Newlyn and Mousehole fishing families."

Gaverne and Port Isaac all have similar stories (https://tinyurl.com/ Malcolm-Lee-history).

Another good film starts off with Truro, where there are some lovely scenes, and has some excellent old film of Port Isaac. A screenshot from it (right) shows the Platt with some fine looking cars lined up (https:// tinyurl.com/Truro-Port-Isaac).
