Geldenhuis, Dolphin Street "When he built *The Sibbys*, Thomas Remick didn't want strangers living next door, so when the adjoining house at the top of Dolphin Street came up for sale it was bought by his son Thomas and wife Ethel from the Steer family for £100.

It was possibly two cottages at the time but became converted into one house. Ethel gave the house the name *Geldenhuis* after the mine in South Africa where her husband was working as a carpenter. They moved into *The Sibbys* after the death of the older Remicks and

Geldenhuis was sold.
Today it back in the family, owned by cousins of the Townsends (Remicks)."
