

PORT ISAAC

A social was held in the Wesley Schoolroom on Wednesday week, organised by Mrs. P. Short. A large number of young people were present, and there were several items of music and games. Mr. Jack Provis accompanied at the piano. The proceeds were on behalf of church funds.

A work party to sew and knit for H.M. Forces was formed in Port Isaac on October 11th, 1939, with the local branches of the Women's Institute and W.V.S. as nuclei. A jumble sale, cake and pound stall was held on October 18th to provide funds to buy material. The sum of £12 was raised, and since then their weekly meetings have been held on Wednesday afternoons in the Church Room, when there are attendances between thirty and forty members. The following is a list of garments made and despatched to the sub depot at Wadebridge, whence they are sent to the Deep Sea Mission, mine sweepers, etc., and wherever they are most required: 63 pairs socks, 18 helmets, 25 pairs mittens, 19 pairs cuffs, 16 scarves, two body belts, one pair gloves, seven pairs operation stockings, 32 pairs bed-socks. Nineteen garments for convalescents were sent to the hospital supply depot at Truro, and several shirts have been made for Polish refugees with material supplied from Truro. The funds are now exhausted, and the treasurer (Mrs. W. Sproull) would be most grateful for any contributions so that this fine work may continue.



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The workers of the committee and members of the Port Isaac sewing party raised £6 16s. 9d. by a jumble sale and tea on Tuesday week. This money will provide more materials for the ladies' weekly meetings.
