had us beat And bang went the lights in Middle Street. On the tenth day of Christmas, I nearly went insane


When Mark Prout's blew up once again. On the eleventh day of Christmas, the weather really bad

Our new lights would not have been possible without the support of the *Doc* Martin Fund and some very generous donations from local businessess and home owners and, possibly most importantly, our small band of volunteers who

We are still learning what things work and what doesn't, but with our initial investments into new LED lights(mains and battery operated), our main commitments are to public safely and being eco-friendly. The switch to LED generally shows a 90% reduction in electricity consumption.

Although there are no labour costs as all of the manufacturing, maintenance and installation is done by our band of volunteers, there are significant costs involved with materials and repairs, hence we will be trying to organise fundraising events

through the year. So watch this space. As a group we are already putting fogether ideas for later this year ... yes,

it's only eleven months until we light up again!
