

## Rose Hill from the Pentus in the 1930s – Yvonne Cleave remembers some of the families

Mr & Mrs Sampson Honey.

Granfer Strout – very smart old man who always wore a white peaked cap.

Mr & Mrs Fletcher Sweet lived at Mount Pleasant with their two children, Harry and Edith. Edith went on to bring up her family in the house and she still lives there today.

Next door lived Uncle Charlie Mitchell and his sister Roberta Mitchell.

Mr & Mrs Mrs Jim Sweet. They had two daughters, Nesta and Jean. *Mount Pleasant*  
Mr Sweet was killed in a motorbike accident.

Mr & Mrs Frank Lobb. They had three sons, Francis who emigrated to Australia and who later died, Harold and Vernon who married a Devon girl and went to live there.

Mr & Mrs Lobb – a very private family. The daughter was the post mistress and two sons were army officers.

Vine Cottage – Mr & Mrs Matenia, a very private family, lived here. Mrs Matenia came from the Thomas family. They had no children.

Oatens Cottage – home of Pink Brown and his wife Sue. They had no children of their own but the house was always filled with other people's, much to Aunt Sue's delight. (Today the cottage has been renamed Spaven Mor)

Mr & Mrs Couch – a large family of two sons, three daughter. One son, a clever boy, died quite young.

Granfer Tabb – an old sea dog. He always dressed in traditional gear. The neighbours always looked after him.

Mr & Mrs Leverton. Mr Leverton was a fisherman. They had four daughters, Anne, Diana, Bernice and Yvonne.

Jessamine Cottage - This was once a private school run by Miss Neal. Home of John Neal and his wife Violet. They had no children and kept a lot of beehives in their garden – lovely honey if you were lucky enough to get a pot.

Ramblers – Mr & Mrs Jordan Honey lived here. Father was a fisherman. They had three daughters but two sadly died. The eldest, Stella, had red hair and was very pretty.
