HOW TRIO IS PRINTED

A pupil at Port Isaac School asked me how this newsletter is printed:

"Throughout each month I put all the pieces of paper with people's news items, etc., in a folder and on 'deadline day' I type all the items out in narrow 'Trio' columns. I first assemble the advertisements on blank pages with Trio margins marked on them, then I cut out the news items and fit them around. Everything is then pasted firmly in position with 'Cow' gum. Each page is scanned on the Blackthorn Press stencil scanner, used normally for posters, brochures, etc., and 470 copies of each sheet, duplicated both sides, are run off - with care being taken to get the right pages on the back of each other! The piles of pages are stapled together by hand and most of the copies are distributed to our three newsagents. Others are sent off in individually-addressed envelopes to postal subscribers and a small number are kept at 18 New Road. The duplicating is charged for at normal rates but not the typewriting, paste-up, etc. otherwise Trio could cost about 20p per copy!" Robin Penna.

For the record

The newsletter seems to be attracting a lot of attention. We had a very good write-up in the Cornish Guardian on May 20th., and the Cornwall Rural Communities Council have awarded us a grant to pay for the cost of prodacing one issue, they also vrote a very complimentary Letter and asked us if they could use our paper as an example of how to produce a community newsletter. Many people have sent subscriptions so that they can receive 'Trio' by post, and re have opened a savings bank account in order to keep a fund to ensure the continued production of the paper, and so that from the interest we receive we can offer a small discount to regular advertisers.

STENCILS

When each page has been laid out and all the typing stuck down in place, a 'scanner' is used to make stencils for duplicating. Using a scanner makes it possible to have drawings and lettering as well as just typing.

DUPLICATING

Each page is first duplicated on one side (350 + copies) and left to dry a while before the other side is duplicated. Then the name 'Trio' is printed in in a different colour each month to distinguish each issue from the others. August 1982




