Websites of the Month

Online access to books has become quite popular over recent years, and checking back on previous columns, it looks like it was about 10 years ago that I last covered this topic. As that is a long time in the life of the web there have been some changes which I thought would be interesting to explore. But to start with some not so good news. Since that column in 2011 over 770 libraries closed their doors for the final time and the effect of covid-19 has left many libraries at increased risk of closure. The website Public Libraries News (www.publiclibrariesneews.com) is very comprehensive and if you are interested in libraries then it's a go to place for information. If you want to see about campaigning to keep them then https://librarycampaign.com has all the latest

on what's happening. The good news is that we have an excellent library service in Cornwall and with the announcement that we will be on level 1 over the next few weeks at least (fingers crossed) it's possible to visit and exchange books – this is what the current rules allow:

"Many of Cornwall's Libraries will remain open during the lockdown commencing 5 November, by welcoming you at the door with a click and collect service. Order your books online, then go to your nominated library to collect them from the lobby or entrance. You can also return items as well. Regular library activities such as story-time sessions will have to wait until we can fully reopen. They can't go ahead until it is safe. Please keep an eye on our social posts and publicity. "(see https://tinyurl.com/comlib-rules)

For most of the online access you will need your library card number – mine is 14 numbers long so good idea to have it to copy and paste if needed – and for some like the research database you need to be inside the library network and as far as I can see that means being either in the library or logged onto their own wifi. However, most services are available without that.

To find books to borrow – and to see if they are available you go to the Cornwall library website and there are lots of instructions with a range of options https://tinyurl.com/ cornet-how

For ebooks, audiobooks and electronic versions of magazines these are also available to download and read - and all the instructions are here https:// tinyurl.com/ commagsebooks

They are using a system called "Borrowbox" for the ebooks and audiobooks (see screenshot) and you get a nice interface where you can see the available books and can either download or



reserve them. It's an impressive service and the more we use it the more likely we are to keep it.

Alongside our local library there are also amazing free digital books websites from which you can download, and the range is now very large indeed, so here is just a small selection.

My favourite is Project Gutenberg (https://www.gutenberg.org), named after Johannes Gutenberg who invented the printing press https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Johannes Gutenberg . The project has been steadily digitising books and now has over 60 thousand free ebooks that you can download. A quick search for Comwall found some old books – for example, one from 1900 by S Baring-Gould - that is in four parts covering many aspects of Cornish life with really nice illustrations. You can read these books on a computer, smart phone or tablet

St Endellion Parish Council – Contract & Maintenance Supervisor update

Hi, you may remember that I was appointed as Contract & Maintenance Supervisor for St Endellion Parish Council and introduced myself via Trio. As I have now been in the role for over 6 months, not including time I was on furlough, I thought it would be a good idea for an update. This gives an opportunity to see some of what goes on, for the functioning of the Parish, which has usually been overseen by the Parish Councillors on a purely volunteer basis.

Don't worry I'm not about to tell you how many times I've visited the public toilets or how many miles I've walked the parish footpaths and nearly fell down a Holy Well!

But you might be interested to know that: In Port Isaac; cctv has been installed at both the Main and New Road WC areas and car parks. The Pump Shelter opposite St Peter's Church has been refurbished and decorated. Drainage holes along Overcliff footpath have been cleared, to help avoid flooding that usually occurs during heavy rain downpours. A kissing gate erected at the dog walking field, below the Main car park. In Port Gaverne; a new railing to replace a broken one at the top of Tags Pit and placement of a new memorial bench on the Main.

Along with monthly inspections and maintenance of the play area and regular grass cutting throughout the parish; including the road side verges, play area, Main car park and public footpaths. The 3 public toilets in Port Isaac have been cleaned and checked daily since the first lockdown was lifted (sorry I said I wouldn't mention that, but...) and the standard of cleanliness has much improved from last summer. However, there are ongoing issues which arise from wear, tear and carelessness which have been sorted out to ensure the public WCs continue to be in a fit for purpose condition.

Other issues that have arisen and been reported to Cornwall Council or sorted by local contractors include; blocked highway drains, broken road signs, broken stiles and broken way markers along with other footpath problems. Also, animal carcasses on the beaches at Port Isaac and Port Gaverne, including a massive grey seal. I don't know if you saw it, but it was huge!

That's what's been going on, but looking forward there are several projects which will keep me occupied for the coming winter months. Such as arranging replacements for the broken swings in the play area, installation of a water bottle refill station at Little Hill and following up on footpath issues. On top of the daily checks of the public toilets (sorry I mentioned them again!), keeping an eye on the street cleaning and walking my dogs along the public footpaths, just to make sure the paths are in good condition, of course!

Maybe in the next issue I'll write less than Scott Mann!

We're not going to orget Christmas 202

This Christmas is going to be one we will never forget (although maybe we should!). So here goes for a few different Christmas recipes to help us all get through the festive season!

To start Christmas off we will need a drink so we'll start with ...



This spiced, sparkling punch brings on big flavours with the lemon, ginger, oranges and seasonal fruits. You can use Prosecco, Cava or any dry sparkling wine, including sparkling Rose, to add the fizz to this Christmas cocktail.

INGREDIENTS:

2¹/₂ cups Apple Cider 34 cup of Brandy ¹/₂ cup of Orange juice 1/4 cup of Lemon juice 1in piece of peeled and thinly sliced Ginger

4 Clementines, thinly sliced 2 Apples, sliced (Pink Lady or your favourite) 750ml Sparkling wine of your choice 2tsp Orange Bitters (if you can get them)

METHOD:

In a large container stir together cider, brandy, orange juice, lemon juice, ginger and bitters. Stir in clementine and apple slices. You can now refridgerate for up to a day.

When you are ready to serve, add sparkling wine. Serve over ice with a few pomegranite seeds (if you have them).



INGREDIENTS:

Ham joint 1navel orange, thickly sliced

1 red onion, thickly sliced 1 pineapple, rind removed, one half cut into thick slices, the other half roughly chopped

1 bottle Ginger Beer ½cup light brown sugar **2tsp Soy sauce**

METHOD: Heat oven to 180°C.

In a roasting tin put sliced oranges, onions and pineapple slices and put a cooking rack on top.

Lightly score ham joint and place on rack. Pour 1/4 bottle of Ginger Beer over the ham, cover with foil and bake for approx 11/2 hours.

Meanwhile, in a blender, puree remaining chopped pineapple and Ginger Beer until smooth. Transfer to a saucepan, stir in the brown sugar and soy sauce and bring to the boil and simmer until syrupy and reduced.

Uncover ham and brush with $\frac{1}{3}$ of the syrupy mixture and bake for a further 15 minutes. Repeat this step two more times, baking for 15 minutes after each brushing.

Then all you need to do is ENJOY!!!



nd from Mrs L know I have done this one before but it is such a quick and easy way to use up any bits of ham (see my husbands recipe above) what is in the freezer for a real winter warmer!

INGREDIENTS:

2 Stock cubes (veg or Chicken or turkey to your taste) - of course you may have some real stock left after Christmas if you are really posh!

I pkt frozen peas (size depends on how many you are feeding)

2 pints water

Handful of fresh mint leaves

Left over ham/gammon from Christmas or ham chunks which most supermarkets sell

METHOD:

Boil the kettle and add 2 stock cubes or those fancy new jelly ones to 1 pint of water in a large saucepan (the other pint of water is saved for later). Bring to the boil and once boiling add the whole bag of peas, and salt and black pepper to taste. Once it comes to the boil let it boil for a further minute.

Add the mint leaves and then blitz with a hand blender. If it too thick for you, add a little of the water until you get the right consistency.

Get out several big bowls and put some chunks of ham in the bottom pour the soup over.

A dollop of creme fraiche (low fat or not) will add even more flavour. Serve with chunks of bread if you want to be cheffy.



On 28th October CJ at The Mote contacted me to say there was a small seal pup on The Platt and maybe in need of assistance. I gathered my marine mammal medic kit and headed down there. He was uplifted and taken to a holding facility run by British Divers Marine Life Rescue (BDMLR) who have a specialist veterinary team on standby. The pup was very underweight but will hopefully make a full recovery.

Our Lost Buildings St Illick's Chapel

There are several formerly important buildings in our parish which no longer survive. One such building is St Illick's Chapel, which was right at the head of Port Gaverne Valley just below Treore and Pendoggett. The first mention of St Illick, as Dilic, is in the 12th century Hartland list of the children of Brychan, which included our own Saint Endelient, and also Saints Menfre (*Minver*), Tedda (*Teath*) and Mabyn, the patrons of our nearby parishes. Possibly the chapel dated from that time. The D had already been lost by the time of the first written record in 1302 where it is mentioned as *ecclesiam Sancta Electe.* There are records of priests appointed to say services in the 14th and early 15th century.

Nicholas Roscarrock's *Lives of the Saints,* written c1620, gave the following details, with a story of Saint Illick miraculously drifting over from Ireland on a harrow or hurdle, rather than being a daughter of the Welsh Brychan –

There was a Sainct called St Ilick or Telick which had a chapple dedicated to her in St Endelient Parrish in the hundreth of Trigg in Cornwall, & hath a Well of her name and had a Feast in former time observed verye solemnlye the Saterdaye next following the Epephany or Twelft day as wee call it. And the inhabitantes there vsed to save by Tradition that shee came Miraculously out of Ireland on a Harrow or Hurdell and that she lived there in the time of St Endelient, which by Ghess we may think to be about the yere 550, and the Path wherin they vsed to walk or pass on to the other is noted at this daye by the inhabitants to be greener then anye other part especiallie after Tillage. There was a Tree over her Well which those that attempted to cutt downe had ever harme, so as they gave over to cutt it. Till one more bold then the rest did cutt it down, whoe hurting himself was noted to dye shortlye after. The like is observed to have hapned to one that cutt downe the walnutt Tree at Glastenburye, and both these accidentes happned in our tyme.

Nicholas Roscarrock was born at Roscarrock Farm in the late 1540s to Richard and Isabel Roscarrock, who were the most important family in our parish during Elizabethan times. Richard was Sheriff of Cornwall in 1550 and 1561. Nicholas was a Roman Catholic, and was imprisoned for his faith many times, including almost 6 years in the Tower of London between 1580-6 where he was tortured as 'a dangerous papist'. Another Catholic prisoner there at the



same time was Lord William Howard a son of the Duke of Norfolk. Persecution of Catholics eased when James 1 ascended the throne in 1603, and in 1607 Nicholas had joined Lord William at his Castle of Naworth near Carlisle, where he was to spend the remaining 26 years of his life studying his passion, the saints, and writing the *Lives of the Saints*.

There is an illustration of the chapel in a watercolour drawing by John Watts Trevan in his 1835 *Summary Memoirs of the Parish of Endellion*. It shows a small chapel alongside a house within St Illick's Tenement, which he describes as

"Once the property of the Cheneys, as here the family chapel was situated, which the annexed drawing will represent as it formerly stood but it has been taken down about thirty years since. A burying ground was also attached thereto but was carried out for manure at the same time when great numbers of human bones were thrown out, but afterwards carried to the churchyard of St. Endellion and there buried. St. Illick is a pretty little tenement composed of five or six well sheltered, fertile meadows. It is now the property of Earl Fortescue but on lease to Mr. F. B. Hambly and tenanted by Mr. T. Bishop. The house here is occupied by a labourer, Henry Martins. Number to family - 10."

Trevan has noted his illustration 'About 1800 JT', which is in line with his comment that it was taken down 30 years ago. Roscarrock refers to the chapel in the past tense, and it may well have fallen out of use after the Reformation under Henry VIII, which was completed in 1537. In Sir John Maclean's 1873 *Parochial and Family History of the Deanery of Trigg Minor* he has this to say about St Illick

'This Chapel we take to be that now called St. Illick, situate in the beautiful sequestered and woody glen which stretches up from Port Gavern. Here is a small tenement containing 9 acres 2 roods 11 perches, and at the bottom of the valley is a dilapidated cottage with some ancient walls and wrought granite, certainly not brought there for the erection of a mere cottage. The beams and joints supporting the floor of the chamber are of solid oak, with champhered edges and otherwise ornamented. A little garden surrounds

the cottage, in which ancient coins have been found in considerable numbers. On the eastern side are ridges, which would seem to indicate that the ground had been cultivated as a garden in terraces.'

Roscarrock, Trevan and Maclean all lived locally so would have been writing from experience. Taken together, my inference is that by Trevan's time the chapel had fallen out of use much earlier than 30 years previously, and his illustration of the property he already knew was probably fairly accurate, but the chapel alongside a mere conjecture. Sir John Maclean's comments, most likely from personal inspection, suggest, not unreasonably, that the chapel's materials were incorporated in the building of the house here, possibly a century or more before Trevan.

The first large scale Parish map was drawn only a few years after Trevan, in 1839, for the Tithe Apportionment. This shows the house at St Illick in pink, representing a domestic property. There was an attached building (*as*

in Trevan's illustration) in grey, representing a non-domestic building. Possibly this was used for keeping animals. In the 1841 census return the house was occupied by 60 year old agricultural labourer, Henry Masters, with his wife Bettsy (40) and daughters Elizabeth (20), Maryann (9), and Rebeckah (4) and son William (7). They had moved to Port Isaac by 1851, when it was occupied by 31 year old John Thomas and his wife Ann



(30). It was unoccupied in 1861 and 1871. The house is not shown on the 1881 Ordnance Survey large scale map, so was likely demolished by then.

If you wish to walk to the head of Port Gaverne valley to visit this area, having crossed the stream and immediately stepped over the stile, the chapel would have stood right in front of you. About 25 years ago, when it was much less overgrown, I looked in amongst the nettles around the area where the house and chapel would have stood, and found many broken slates on the ground, no doubt remnants of their demolition.

Nicholas Roscarrock mentions there was also 'a well of her name'. There are no springs in the immediate area which might represent her well. The tithe map has field number 874, on Trewethert land, which is called St Illick's Well. This is right where St Illickswell Gug (*the first deep valley north of Port Gaverne*) is marked on the current Ordnance Survey map, some half a mile north of St Illick. There are several springs marked on the cliffs here that may represent her well. There was also a feast on the Saturday after Epiphany or Twelfth Night, which is Saturday January 9th 2021. If on that day you still have some food left after the holiday binge, raise a glass, scoff a pasty, and think of that colleen from the Emerald Isle who floated into Port Gaverne on her harrow 1500 years ago.

Scott Mann writes
