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
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A BIT OF HALLOWEEN SPOOKINESS






Michael Law from Northampton shares his Port Isaac holiday memories ...

During the the Second World War my Father, Reginald Law was stationed for a time with the Royal Navy in St Merryn. In 1946 my parents came to Port Isaac for our first family holiday. I, with my brothers and sister, stayed at Tregaverne Farm with Mr & Mrs Button. We continued to holiday on the farm until September 1960 when Mrs Button decided to retire from having guests. However, our family holidays were always in Port Isaac until we all married.

Our parents continued to holiday in the village for many years staying in various holiday accommodation notably The Lawns Hotel run by George Moth and in later years staying with Daisy Hicks Self catering holidays.

In 1982 they finally managed to find a rental property, 5 Church Hill, and moved from Northampton to spend their last years in Port Isaac which was their ultimate dream to do. They joined in the local communities activities including the Golden Circle.

My mother, Lily Law, sadly passed in April 1985 after a car accident. My father passed away in May 1988 after short illness and they are both buried in the cemetery at St Endellion Church.

I, with my wife Philippa, continue to holiday in the Port Isaac area - which I have since the age of six months in 1946. I am writing this, aged 75, staying in Port Gaverne on holiday 30/10/2021 to 13/11/2021.

Autumn in Cornwall is a time of amazing colours. The trees are in some ways at their best with golds and silver. I think we have some of the best days around this time, partly because of the contrast with some wet and windy ones, but when we have clear days with sunshine and such clear days it is delightful. It is also the season for mushrooms and other fungi and according to Kew Gardens we have a bumper crop this year (https://tinyurl.com/fungi-kew). They say in this article that:

"Members of the public have been sending in unusual samples from their gardens to experts at Kew Gardens and the Royal Horticultural Society after a glut of fungi this year, and scientists say such booms will become more common as Britain's climate changes to become warmer and wetter.

Lee Davies, Kew's fungarium curator, said: "This year has been particularly busy for people seeing fungi and sending them in to us.

"If climate change means warmer and wetter summers, we are going to get fantastic years for weird and wonderful fungi fruiting in people's gardens like this one."

We have a huge range of fungi in Cornwall and there is a website for them which has some brilliant photographs. It is called the Cornwall Fungus Recording Group https://www.cornwallfungusrg.com. Their aims are as to record and document the distribution of fungi in Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly, to promote the conservation of fungi associated habitats and to encourage a greater awareness and understanding of fungal conservation issues in the wider community. They say that membership is free, all you need to do is bring along your enthusiasm and interest. On the website there is a newsletter you can download and details of how to join up.

If you wanted to go into this in more detail the British Mycological Society Website is the go to place https://www.britmycolsoc.org.uk. This has an abundance of information. Next year is its 125th anniversary so over that timespan it has collected an immense amount of data and expertise. There is a section on educational materials for parents and teachers and for children, and as they say, fungi are a vital part of our global ecosystem.

I thought I would conclude this last column for 2021 with a mention of COP26. It has brought to everyone's attention like never before what is happening to the way our climate system that makes it increasingly unstable. In Cornwall there is a group that produce documentaries about this and they are well worth a look. They are called Cornwall Climate Care and have a great website https://www.cornwallclimate.org. Their most recent film was about COP26 and is quite short and is on Youtube https://tinyurl.com/Cornwallclimate-cop26. They also have a great section for teachers with materials for different age groups that are lessons to go with the films they have made. The two so far are "Under the Surface" and "Plenty more Fish?" - both about the connection Cornwall has with the sea. They are very well worth watching and both factual and inspiring.

starry, starry night interesting Night Sky Object of the first quarter

When observing from Port Isaac the best positions are as follows

Looking North, East and West the best position is the cliff path between Fore Street and St. Endellion Car Park, position yourself around half way along the path. Looking to the east the constellations, Moon, Planets and Sun rising, looking to the North the objects we call circumpolar meaning never set will be viewed, example the Plough or Ursa Major and Polaris The Pole Star. Looking to the West the constellations, Moon, Planets and the Sun will be seen to set.

To view the Southern are of the sky the best positions are either the top of Roscarrock Hill where you will have a good 360 degree dark view or the main car park on entering Port Isaac. You can view south from the Platt over the RNLI building but light pollution may hinder you.

You may have your own preferences and my have a great view from you own location.

Orion An Interesting object to observe through the next 3 months.

Orion can be seen due south in the early evening in December moving towards the West through the night and as the month winter / spring months move on. Each month it will appear more westerly in the early evening until we lose it in the late spring months.

Orion is the standout constellation of the winter / spring months is Orion. It contains many of bright stars, and if you have a telescope you might even be able to see the Orion Nebula in full detail. You don't need a telescope just to spot the Orion Nebula, though, as its one of the brightest Nebulae, and can be seen below Orion's famous belt, the nebula is an area of stellar birth where stars are being born right now. Our Sun would have been born in a gas cloud very similar to this.. The belt is part of the reason why Orion is so easy to spot in the night sky, but it also contains a two bright stars that can tell you a little bit about the life cycle of stars.

The first is the main star of Orion Rigel which is bottom left which is a blue supergiant star in the early part of its life 860 light years away. In the top right hand side of Orion is Betelgeuse which is a red supergiant star approaching the end of its life and will someday soon explode is a supernova, if this happens in our lifetime the star will be visible in daylight.

The, first meteor shower you can see this month is called the Geminids. The Geminids are known as the king of meteor showers - and take place in mid-December every year. You can see up to 120 meteors per hour on a clear night at this shower's peak, although it hasn't always been that way! The Geminids first appeared in 1862, and they were a rather weak shower at the time, with 10-20 meteors an hour.

All meteor showers that we know of are caused by the Earth's orbit passing through the debris trailed behind a comet.

The Redwing is also a member of the thrush family, but much smaller in size. A winter visitor from Scandinavia, it can often be spotted in flocks with Fieldfare. It gets its name from the red patches under the wings.

Although your resident blackbird is a normal garden visitor, during the winter it could be a Scandinavian one and you can easily tell the difference as the male birds beak is much darker than our common blackbird which is bright yellow.

The Fieldfare is a member of the thrush family. It is a winter visitor, flying here to escape the colder weather in Northern Europe and feeds profusely on winter berries in hedgerows and woodlands. When our weather is particularly cold you can attract them into your garden by using some old apples impaled onto branches.



Did you know ...

The wheelbarrow is believed to have been invented by the Chinese general Chuko Liang (AD 181-234). His wheelbarrow had two wheels and required two men to propel and steer it. The wooden wheelbarrows were used to transport supplies and collect injured soldiers. The earliest evidence of a single wheeled wheelbarrow is found in a stained glass window in Chartres Cathedral in France and dates from 1220. The wheel is positioned near the front to provide enough leverage to move heavy loads.

Jobs to do in December

Continue to rake up leaves in borders as they could be harbouring slugs and other pests

St Endellion Parish Council Contract & Maintenance Supervisor Report

This month as well as looking after the regular business I've been able to devote more time to projects that haven't had much attention recently, such as researching into vehicle charging points in the Main car park, the refurbishment to Roscarrock Hill toilets, the water refill station and the names omitted from the War Memorial.

The new contactless payment system at the Main car park toilet block, crashed within its second week, taking the whole system down. This coincided with the technician who fitted it being on holiday. Unfortunately for him I called, text and left messages on a daily basis! The result was an electrician based in Trebarwith came and sorted out the problems. To be fair the company have offered to pay compensation for the loss of service.

The play area inspection was carried out with nothing much required. The safety matting under the swings has finally been replaced, topped up with soil and seeded with grass.

If you're a regular user of the play area you'll notice that the fence mounted litter bins have been removed. The reason is the Parish Council pay for the emptying and the cost is over £100 in the winter and £315.00 during the summer, per week. One of the larger green bins will be repositioned to make it more accessible.

This months other bin issues are regarding what amounts to fly-tipping, rubbish being left in inappropriate places. This includes putting large amounts of unwanted old household items into bins in the Main car park. The contents included the name and address of the Port Isaac resident! Enough to fill four bins. Another occasion a big bag of rubbish rammed into the bin, again with a Port Isaac residents address. Please just put it out for your regular collection or take it to the dump. Details are on the Cornwall Council website.

After checking the bollards at the top of Church Hill, I looked into how to get them replaced. It transpires that the Parish Council paid for them and Cornwall Highways installed them, free of charge. So, I began the process of repeating this and at some point Cornwall Highways agreed to provide and install the bollards for free! However, when it comes to repainting the red/white hazard lines there will be a cost in getting the red paint colour as it was a special mix apparently!

One of the things that's been rumbling on in the background concerns the wooden rail that ran the length of The Terrace. In reply to a recent enquiry asking for any progress on dates I was informed that it would be done before the end of this financial year.

I've walked a few of the footpaths regularly used around Port Isaac including the new-ish path at the top of Pine Awn, to check out the fallen tree in the valley at the bottom of the woods that lead to Roscarrock. A sycamore had completely taken the bridge out. The tree and bridge have been removed and a temporary crossing has been created. There will be a bridge again at some point.

There were two more trees across the footpath in Port Gaverne valley too, which have been removed.

I've reported problems to various agencies in the hope that something will be done. In Trelights there has clearly been a lack of street cleaning. This is supposed to be on a six weekly rota. And entails a road-sweeper and crew clearing the sides of the roads from leaves and rubbish, the gullies around the drains and the pavements. I took some photos and sent them to Cornwall Council. The sweeper was in Trelights two days later. There will be a follow up visit to check the area by Cornwall Council too.

In Trewetha Lane there's a portion of a Blackhorn tree hanging onto some cables. This was pointed out to me by a member of the public. I walk down there almost every day, but am usually looking down for litter or dog poo, so completely missed this! I informed Western Power Distribution who called me a couple of days later to tell me the cables were BT. I contacted Open Reach and was told a technician would take a look.

At the bottom of Postman's Walk there's some exposed yellow plastic tape. It's been like it for awhile, a builder working close by told me that the tape could indicate the power cables could be near and possibly become exposed. I contacted Western Power Distribution and was told a technician would be urgently looking into it.



Other housekeeping around the parish has included; cleaning off several areas of graffiti and removing stickers, dealing with some minor anti-social behaviour at the play area. Taking minutes at a meeting, for the newly formed, Playing Field Development Working Party, and letting John Bray's know that one of their property's seagull bags has appeared about 75 metres from the address written on it.

Results on previous requests to Cornwall Council have come to fruition; the highways drains outside Port Isaac Fishermen Ltd. have been cleared properly. This should mean that the drains function and won't need to be shovelled out by those who work in the fish cellars.

The overgrown banks in New Road car park have finally been cut. It took a lot of nagging, but better late than not at all.

There's a couple more toilet things too. The toilets at Port Gaverne are now closed for the winter. So the water and electricity meters have been read in order to finalise this year's lease with the National Trust. The only other issue was a coin machine at New Road loos was asking for 19p, instead of 20p I fixed that.

I can report that the out of order ticket machine in the Main car park is now working after nearly 3 months!

There's been a few other problems at the Main car park, with the machines which I've been able to sort out too. One solution was that late 20th century cure; turn it off and on again. Thus saving another expensive call out fee and another machine out of action. A tariff sign in the car park became detached on one of the windy days. I retrieved it before it

At the November Parish Council meeting it was resolved to take responsibility for the memorial.

Doctor Christmas ... a real doctor!

Find something Christmassy Dee said...

With five days to go to the *Trio* deadline, I was still not sure what the history article was going to be about. Then Dee made it worse by saying I should find something Christmassy this month. Well, here goes ...

Port Isaac has records of many doctors over the years, from John Watts Trevan's uncle Frederick in the 1830s to our present team in Hillson's Close. Perhaps I might write about some of them in another Trio, but after Dee's comment I knew just the one to fit the bill. I only came across this doctor last year when I received an enquiry from Derek Holland asking about a former doctor here between the wars, who went under the name Benjamin Young Harper Christmas. Yes, we did have a Port Isaac doctor called Christmas, and he called his house 'Yuletide'. He was born in London on 12th December 1894 and was one of 20 students to begin their studies at Middlesex Hospital in October 1913, where he qualified in August 1919. The first record of his medical career is in Essex, where the 1922 Kelly's Directory shows him as part of a practice called Turner and Christmas with Dr Albert Turner, which had surgeries in Kelvedon and Tiptree. He must have come here the following year, as the 1923 Medical Directory lists him at Port Isaac with the telephone number Port Isaac 5 and his address was given as Homeleigh, Port Isaac. I am not sure where that was, but Dane Cottage in Trewetha was formerly two cottages, one called Holmleigh, which may have been where he lived.

At that time, we already had another doctor here called Doctor William Roy Jackson. He was much older than Dr Christmas, being born in London in 1868, and qualified at the University of Edinburgh in 1893. In 1906 he was the doctor in Liskeard, but the 1914 Kelly's Directory lists him as living at The Ramblers, Port Isaac, which is the house now called Harewood, right next door to the Village Hall. In the 1911 census, this was the address of Port Isaac's Doctor Richard Julyan George (after whom Doctor's Meadow/Doctor George's Field are named), so it is likely Dr Jackson took over the whole practice from him. His entry in Kelly's shows Dr Jackson was 'M.A., M.D., B.M.Edin. surgeon, & medical officer & public vaccinator No. 1 district, Bodmin union, Admiralty surgeon & agent & local hon sec Royal Lifeboat Association', perhaps typical for a 'Jack of all trades' village doctor. The 1925 Medical Directory records Dr Christmas as in a partnership of 'Jackson and Christmas'. Whilst Dr Christmas' entry lists just his qualifications, Dr Jackson's entry gives the same long list as in that Kelly's directory, suggesting Dr Christmas was very much the junior partner. Few here now are likely to remember Doctor Christmas, but Bryan Nicholls told me that his grandfather was a patient of Doctor Christmas, and he had his surgery on the Terrace.

In the 1930 Medical Directory, Doctor Christmas had clearly taken on all the surgery duties as his entry lists him as 'M.C.R.S. Eng., L.R.C.P. Lond. 1919; (Middlx.); Admiralty Surg. & Agent; Med. Off. & Pub. Vacc. No. 1 Dist. Bodmin Union; Surg. Police & P.O.; Mem. B.M.A.; Local Hon. Sec. Roy. Nat. Lifeboat Inst.' In that directory Doctor Jackson had moved to Windsor and by the outbreak of war he had retired, living at Weston-Super-Mare.

Doctor Christmas married his first wife, Maude Bennett, in April 1918 whilst he was still a student in London. They had three children, Peter born in 1920, Daphne born in 1921, and Raymond born in 1924. Their first few years in Port Isaac were tinged with great sadness, as the little girl Daphne died when she was only $2\frac{1}{2}$ in January 1924 and Peter was killed after falling over the cliffs at Moon's Grave in September 1926. Both are buried at St Endellion Church in a now overgrown grave in the northwest corner of the old churchyard.

It appears that they may have separated as Maude died in London in early 1935. A few months later, Doctor Christmas married his second wife Mary Coode Stevens, a nurse. The 1935 Medical Directory records him as living in "Yuletide" Port Isaac, but only shows his qualifications with no other duties. The previous year a Doctor Fox (*Hugh Watson Fox*) had purchased The Rock and began practicing in Port Isaac, so perhaps Dr Christmas was no longer working here. Dr Fox was only in Port Isaac for three years as he sold The Rock to Doctor Sproull in 1937.

At the outbreak of war a few years later, Dr and Mrs Christmas were both living in Cannington, Somerset with 15 year old Raymond. Doctor Christmas died in Cannington in May 1965, leaving his estate valued at £44,621 (about £900,000 today) to Mary. She passed away in June 1974 at a nursing home in Bridgwater, and they are both buried in St George's Churchyard, Wembdon, Bridgwater. Raymond died in Manchester in 2006.

If anyone has further information on Doctor Christmas, Port Isaac Heritage would love to hear it, so it can be placed on record.

I hope that's 'Christmassy' enough Dee!

Planning Applications

Members considered these planning applications and made the following responses to Cornwall Council:

- i. PA21/09869, Glendale Trelights erection of a new 1-bedroom dwelling on the land adjacent to Glendale Cottage and provision of 1 no. car parking space to Glendale Cottage. Members supported the application but requested conditions:
 - Slates to be nailed not clipped/recognising the proposal sits in the historic heart of Trelights/ conformity with local vernacular
 - Boundary planting to be retained and enhanced with native evergreen species/prevention of overlooking
 - Restriction of exterior up lighting to downlight units/ retention of dark skies in this elevated. position as per AONB Management Plan
 - Suspension of permitted development rights/retention of site proportions.
 - · A principle residency condition is needed.
- ii. PA21/09246, Land S of 2 Overcliff Port Isaac proposed holiday accommodation unit. **OBJECT**. The applicant presents no evidence to justify determination of the proposal as anything other than a Class 3 dwelling, therefore subject to a Principle Residency Condition under NDP Policy 2, applied to all new dwellings within the settlement boundary (Appeal Ref: APP/D0840/W/16/3160559; JR/ CO/2241/2016).

Members note a total of 7 public objections and determined the site unsuitable for infill due its proposed location and scale which would have an overbearing and unneighbourly effect on the surrounding properties. The design is not visually well integrated with its surroundings and is not a continuum of build form infill anticipates, sitting apart and breaking the skyline for users of the SW Coastal Path. Loss of light to number 63 Fore St is a statement of fact, loss of amenity is palpable for the garden of 59 Fore St, which would be enclosed along with the other gardens of the terrace. In summary members find the proposal contrary to NDP Policy 1: Location and scale for new housing development.

The proposal sits in the former garden of number 63, an open aspect for all the surrounding residential properties and occupies an uncomfortable proportion of the site failing to provide appropriate dwelling amenity space contrary to NDP Policy 6, Design Principles.

The D&A describes the first floor dormers as 'picture windows' which are on a scale contrary to the NDP which urges applicants to respect conformity with both ridge heights/window openings and avoids the use of inappropriate extensive glazing. The proposal fails to comply both with the AONB management plan (which requires the preservation of the night sky from light spillage particularly from public aspects), and NDP Policy 6E (a), (f), Character Area Coastal Headland.

- iii. PA21/10058, Land NW of Park Villa Road from Long Cross to The Barton Trelights reserved matters following outline approval PA20/05111 dated 18.11.2020 for live/work unit including demolition of barn/stable on site. Cllr. Dawe left the meeting whilst this was discussed. Members supported the application but requested conditions:
 - Slates to be nailed not clipped/conformity with local vernacular.



- Restriction of exterior up lighting to downlight units / retention of dark skies in this elevated position as per AONB Management Plan
- iv. PA21/09675, Sea Glass Port Gaverne Variation of Condition 2 (approved plans) of Application No. PA20/03092 dated 2nd June 2020 (Roof extension over garage to first and second floor to include rear flat roof dormer and two traditional pitched dormers to front. Construction of new access steps to rear terrace). Members supported the application.
- PA21/10132, Waituna 31 Trewetha Lane Port Isaac – formation of a vehicular access and associated works. Members supported the application.

Other Planning Matters - information only.

 i. Social Housing – Cllr. Williams had sought expression of interest from residents with a view to forming a Community Land Trust. It was resolved to apply for the PC to join the national Community Land Trust.

Planning Applications Approved by CC – information only.

 PA21/07962, Lowarth House 52 New Road Port Isaac - relocate stairs to decking and infill old stair position and replacement of timber balustrade with glass.

Miscellaneous Items

- i. Cornwall Council County Cllr. Mould reported the Chair of CC wants each Parish to sow a small area of land with red, blue and white seeds to commemorate the Queen's Jubilee in 2022. CC would like local residents to plant something in these colours in their own gardens.
- ii. Social Housing Cllr. Williams had sought expression of interest from residents with a view to forming a Community Land Trust. It was resolved to apply for the PC to join the national Community Land Trust.
- iii. Trelights Salt Box Members were advised there is no alternative suitable site. The Clerk to contact Highways and ask for the grit bin to be removed.

The Parish Council has returned to Face-to-Face meetings and members of the public are invited to attend, however, numbers will be limited and anyone wishing to meet with Members should Contact the Clerk by Noon on 13th December 2021.

This month's recipe gives the old smells and flavours of those traditional days when mums (and dads in our house) used to spend days soaking fruit in enough booze to keep anybody happy and also grabbing the family around the kitchen table to stir the mix and make a Christmas wish. This cake gives you the end result but without all the work.

INGREDIENTS:

1lb marzipan

2lb dried mixed fruit 4oz unsalted butter 6oz caster sugar 2tsp baking powder 3tsp mixed spice Either a bottle of stout, favourite dark beer, pale ale or even lager for a slightly sweeter flavour (if you don't want alcohol then orange juice works just as well) 4oz self raising flour 4oz plain flour 2 whole eggs.

8oz royal icing(shop bought) 3tbs apricot jam or marmalade

AND THIS IS WHAT YOU DO ...

In a thick bottomed pan melt butter and sugar, then add fruit, baking powder and mixed spice and your liquid of choice and bring to a gentle simmer and cook for 3 to 4 minutes. Remove from heat and allow to cool for 5 to 10 minute.

Crack in the eggs and both flours and mix well with a wooden spoon, making sure you beat in all the flour from the sides of the pan.

Meanwhile butter and flour a 8inch cake tin and then pour in the cake mix and bake in a preheated oven (17°0 c) for 35 to 45 minutes.

Test by piercing with a knife until it comes out dry. Leave to cool before removing from the tin. Gently melt the jam and then paint over the cake

Roll out the marzipan and cover the cake while the jam is still warm.

Cover the whole cake with the royal icing and decorate with your Christmassy cake decorations. Store in an airtight container.

SUGGESTED INGREDIENTS: Olive oil & butter Left over roast potatoes Smoked Bacon, 2 slices chopped Mushrooms chopped Left over stuffing chopped up Left over Brussel sprouts Ham Any left over veg you like Mozzarella cheese grated You could include turkey but sometimes it's nice to save

that for sandwiches later

and Mrs L brings to the Christmas feast ... Boxing Day Hash Brunch

I know that left over roast potatoes are an oxymoron, but this recipe is worth cooking extras for (and of course hiding). This recipe is not about saving calories but about saving the planet from any food waste (that is your excuse).

Get out your biggest frying pan and collect anything from your fridge that you like. Melt the butter with a little olive oil, how much is up to you but don't go mad as it will be too greasy. Chop the potatoes into bite size pieces and add to the pan. Chop the bacon and mushrooms and add to the pan along with the stuffing and brussels all chopped to bite size pieces. Do not add huge quantities of anything as it will be too much but carry on adding things which you like, left over carrots or roasted beetroot would be nice. Then when it is all hot fry an egg for each person in a separate pan.

Strong cheddar cheese grated When the eggs are almost ready add the grated cheeses (cheddar for flavour, mozzarella for texture) to the main pan. Dish up onto the plates and top each portion with a fried egg, delicious and good for your hangover.

> My lovely husband thinks that to save pans you could make divots in the mixture in the main pan and add the eggs and put it in the oven to finish off and cook the eggs.

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
