

In Memory of Sarah Holmes

It is with great sadness to tell all who knew her, that Sarah sadly passed away recently after a long battle with Cancer.

Most of you will remember 'Bask', her father, who lived with his wife Betty at Chimneys in Port Gaverne. (now Leat House). Surgeon Capt Frank William Baskerville was a great character and played a huge part in the Port Isaac RNLI.

Sarah was happily married to Don, an Antique restorer and lived in Pilchards Cottage, a National Trust property also in Port Gaverne. Sarah & Don lived quietly there with constant four-legged Jack Russell's for company.

Apart from Don working with an assistant on his furniture restoring, they also owned an antique shop in Kensington London, where they travelled to every Thursday and returned every Monday, or if Sarah had her way late Sunday night.

She loved North Cornwall and got to be very involved with Riding for the Disabled near Camelford. She particularly loved the ponies and went on to attending pony sales and markets and filming (undercover) ill treatment of the ponies and foals and subsequently reporting to necessary organisations. On occasions, she would buy those poor creatures, taking them to a friend who had fields and shelter. They went on to have a happy life, thanks to Sarah.

When Don died suddenly, Sarah eventually moved to the edge of Bodmin Moor and with her good friends continued to save the ponies on Bodmin Moor who were unwell. She continued doing this marvellous work (all voluntarily), until her health failed her, much to her annoyance.

Sarah, leaves a sister Anne, who lives in West Sussex and close relatives of Don's, especially his daughter Rachel who she adored.

At 10:40 on 10th October, Port Isaac RNLI were tasked to a 45ft sailing vessel off Pengirt Cove near Pentire Headland. The vessel had dropped anchor but it was now stuck. They were in 3.6m of water with breaking waves. The owner of the vessel said he could cut anchor but was worried about drifting onto rocks. Falmouth Coastguard also requested Polzeath Coastguard and for Padstow Lifeboat to launch.

Port Isaac inshore lifeboat (ILB) *Pride of Port Isaac (Goeth Porthusek)* was on scene by 10:57. One of the volunteer crew boarded the vessel to determine the details. By now Polzeath Coastguard were on scene with eyes on the yacht and lifeboat.

It was agreed that the vessel would need a tow to safety and that the larger all weather lifeboat from Padstow was best suited to the task. The two lifeboats liaised over the radio and Padstow were on scene by 11:14. A tow with the all weather boat was established and the Port Isaac crew member returned to the D class.

Polzeath Coastguard were stood down and Port Isaac ILB returned to the station. Padstow lifeboat towed the yacht to an area of safety where they were able to check and start their engine away from rocks.

Thanks to all who responded.

websites of the month

I have recently been looking through old videos and photographs of the *Climate Friendly Parish Project* and the *Friends of the Main* group that I was part of back in the day and at some point, I am hoping to get these on to the *Port Isaac Heritage* website, of which more in a future column. This website is full of wonderful information about our local area, and this prompted me to write a column this month mainly about the website, but also about storytelling as a way of preserving our heritage.

A good place to start is with Storylines, it is based in Cornwall and was launched in 2014. They work with other groups to compile people's stories. Storylines have worked in collaboration with numerous organisations and communities, enabling their work to benefit a wide range of people of all ages. At the heart of everything they do are stories. Their website contains lots of useful information on how they do this (<u>https://www.storylines.org.uk/resources/</u>), as well as links to projects nearby. One that caught my eye is in Bude which features a lot about climate change, and the section on storytelling includes, for example, how beachcombers have a history of collecting from the foreshore so it is not wasted. Something we can well learn from today (<u>https://www.budeclimate.org/our-budeour-stories</u>)

You can see that the Port Isaac Heritage website <u>https://</u> <u>www.portisaacheritage.co.uk/</u> is part of a wider movement to record the history and experiences of local communities and it does a wonderful job. The site is organised into six areas, with, in addition, a home page and a contacts page.

The section about *Trio* is remarkable in its own right. It has a complete record of all *Trio's* published since it all started 40 years ago in 1982 and has recently been updated to include the September 2022 edition. *Trio* covers Port Isaac, Port Gaverne and Trelights and you can find a particular edition if you put the month and year in the search box or indeed, any person or event can be found by searching on that name.

Then comes the section on oral histories. This is a collection of 147 video recordings of people's memories of their lives in and around Port Isaac. As the website says: *"Some of our older residents have been filmed in order to share their memories of Port Isaac as it was in their day. Sadly, some are no longer with us, but they have left behind an important legacy for future generations."* And they are a wonderful collection. Stories tell us so much more than statistics and these personal accounts bring to life how things were in days gone by. There are stories of fishing, school life, wartime, wildlife, the church, cooking and much, much more. You can't watch these videos without being moved by them - some are sad, some are full of humour, all are about engagement with life.

The exhibitions section boasts 1379 archives, so I don't suggest you try and look at everything all at one go. It is divided into 20 themes and each one has the

contents easily accessible through a picture illustrating the topic, together with text explaining the picture. As an example, the Trevan exhibition includes a theme about wrecks. There is a downloadable pdf that has a picture of the wreck of the Ebenezer at Port Isaac, and John Trevan's memoirs about them. Port Isaac at play has 215 entries including a photo of 1920's Port Isaac choir, and pictures of the



Carnival from 1900 up to quite recent times. There are many delightful pictures of the May Ball and Carnivals over the years. Pictures and stories about the Golden Circle bring back good memories too. There is even an exhibition about *Trio* as a social history, together with its poster announcing the exhibition. Everything on the website is fully searchable.

Finally, the shop section contains a variety of books that can be purchased on local history and also local recipes and their associated stories, all fundraising for the project so please do look.

FULL COUNCIL MEETING - MONDAY 10th OCTOBER 2022

Please note the following redaction and amendment to the Parish Council minutes and Parish Council Trio report ref – 12th September 2022 149/2022 b Cornwall Council Report. The final paragraph referring to land ownership and names has been redacted and amended.

Parish Council Chair – Cllr Raynor recapped the extraordinary meeting for Port Isaac Community Primary School addressing the maintenance needs for the refurbishment of the toilet facilities, décor in all areas and for the agenda point discussing the Parish Council support of safeguarding and security projects.

Playing Fields Working Group - T Harris & Sons have carried out the trenching work and the site was visually sound. Soil samples were taken and results are pending. Cllr Button passed his thanks to Cllr Williams for liaising on the trenching works in his absence.

The Ecology report from J Sproull noted considerations to be made in preserving and enhancing the outlying areas of the proposed site.

CAD will proceed with an outlining planning draft by month end and submission to Cornwall Council Planning Department is likely by year end.

Cllr Williams raised the issue of a lack of qualitive data and detailing for the business plan. Cllr Button confirmed that outline planning would be secured first to ensure the project was deliverable, before looking at detailing the project and business plans to increase funding potential.

STEND_HWG – Cllr Williams confirmed that the Affordable Housing Team had looked at the survey analysis and the next step was to run a campaign for members of the Parish in need of housing to register with Homechoice Cornwall. Timing on this would be vital as a review of the Homechoice Cornwall website highlights that any inactive applicants with be removed after 1 year.

Cllr Williams confirmed a date has yet to be set for meeting with Stephen Morgan of Cornwall Council Estate's Management, Sarah Roberts & Imogen Day of CC's Affordable Housing Team.

Wadebridge & Padstow Community Network Panel Meeting - Cllr Penny stated that St Minver Parish Council raised the issue with the lack of policing in the area, Cllr Penny seconded this for St Endellion Parish and they received the advice to liaise with the area appointed Safety Officer for support.

Cllr Penny also confirmed that the Friends of Wadebridge Leisure Centre had made a presentation at the meeting. Cllr Williams highlighted this as an item missed in the previous meeting and that the Friends of Wadebridge Leisure Centre had written to the Parish Council (emails / letters previously circulated to members) asking for financial support towards the centres rising energy costs.

Members decided not to consider the suggested method of funding support at this stage, but that they would welcome a representative's attendance at the next Parish Council meeting to discuss how the Parish Council might offer funding support in an alternative way.

"I must say that most of the Mexican food out here as a main ingredient is quite bland but the things that lifts them are the accompanying bits.

My favourite is the pineapple salsa which is served with any grilled white fish fillet. This salsa really takes a plain piece of fish to a place way above its station."

We are all feeling the pinch at the moment so I have been messing around with what's in my freezer and cupboards that I can cook in my slow cooker in the hope to have a meal ready for when we get home from work after a long day at work. I just hope it gives you inspiration to be a bit adventurous with a couple of things to create a warming meal. I do this one the night before and reheat thoroughly when we get home.


600g chicken thighs 1 big onion Couple of slices of smoked bacon (doesn't matter if the edges are a bit dry) 2 oxo cubes Left over white wine (and yes I know that's an oxymoron so open another bottle!) Chorizo - I found a packet of frozen cubed in my freezer put a small handful in Tub of double cream

I fried the onion and bacon in my slow cooker pan. I have the one with the metal base so you can cook things in it at the beginning, add the chicken just for a short while, add the wine, oxo cubes, and chorizo, cook on high heat for one hour, let it cool and put in the fridge to keep overnight. The next day add the cream and bring to gentle simmer and heat ready for everyone to come home to eat it. Delicious with rice or mash and green beans.

The chorizo gives this a lovely gentle spiced warmth. Which warms you up \ldots lovely

St Endellion Parish Council Contract & Maintenance Supervisor Report

We've changed the clocks from British Summer Time and are looking towards starting preparations for Christmas. Although, Shiela, the lovely Corserv cleaning operative had already bought and wrapped all of her gifts, by mid-August! Now, that's organised!

When walking the footpaths over the past few weeks I've picked a lot of field mushroom, so many that I've frozen some and will use them for cooking in sauces etc. I'm not an expert on fungi and am always cautious to only pick ones I'm sure are OK. Doing this and walking my dogs is a perk of the work, but don't worry I don't clock foraging as part of my working day! This month I've walked most of the busier paths, including Port Isaac valley to Trewetha, Trewetha to Port Gaverne, Port Gaverne valley. Lobber, down to Pine Awn, then back up to Washing Pool Lane. To Lower Trefreock, to check out the new stile then on to Roscarrcock Farm. I've checked issues on a couple of other paths and raised them with Cornwall Council's Countryside Access Team. Besides these I regularly walk the Main at Port Gaverne and have put up a way marker at beginning of the Port Gaverne valley walk.

In the play area the small hut and slide and the larger multi-play unit have both received some much needed wood treatment. The wood stain was virtually sucked away from the brushes! The applications will help preserve the wood and they both look much better for it. Now that these have been done I'm thinking other pieces could benefit from some attention too.

The quotes sought for replacement galvanised or powder coated railings or the perimeter were more than the Councillors had suspected. It was suggested that the existing fence could be reconditioned. It hasn't had any work done on it for a long time. Apart from some of the uprights being reattached when they come off. And on a closer inspection isn't in a terrible state. So, I've added it to the list of work.

Quotes have been obtained for the lowering of pavements in order for some homeowners to park off road. Terry Harris & Sons will be carrying out the work, however, there's still some red tape to get through before any work can begin. Licences for individual driveways need to be arranged with Cornwall Council.

The behind the scenes organising for two bus shelters is ongoing. As soon as I have any more info I'll let you know. Groundwork has to be carried out to create bases, paths and areas for people to wait. The shelters need to be ordered and some lighting for the Trelights one sourced.

I'm waiting for some designs for the additional plaque for the War Memorial. Once they've been received I'd like to think they will be available for anyone to take a look at before advice is sought from Cornwall Council's Historic Dept. Following that, Listed Building Consent has to be applied for.

At the end of September I attended a 'workshop' laid on by Cornwall Council's Highways Dept and Cormac/Corserv. It's a complicated arrangement whereby Cormac/Corserv are a subsidiary of Cornwall Council and operate as a separate business, I think! The purpose was to try to provide information regarding these two entities and how each operates. There were quite a few people from other Parish and Town Councils in north Cornwall. A number of them had specific queries regarding their respective parishes to put forward between the presentations by the various personnel. It was quite informative; giving insights into how their budgets are spend, what positive environmental measures are being implemented, such as becoming carbon neutral by 2030. How to access more information from the Cornwall Council website and overall designed to encourage better communications. I probably shouldn't say this but the Barney's pasty for lunch (provided), was a highlight of the day! No pasties at the Full Council Meeting on 10th October, but I was still there!

Other meeting this month have been with the parking enforcement company to hand over cash from a ticket machine when they were unable to arrange anyone to come from their office, which is on the other side of Truro. Those guys are quite something, big and burly, but I'd like to think with a heart of gold!

An engineer came to fix the ticket machines in the Main car park due to a break in mobile signal once EE had repaired it. He also showed me some little processes I can follow to help get the machines back on line in the future should there be a break in the electricity supply. This won't necessarily save the Parish Council money, as there is a service contract for this sort of work, but it'll save the engineer having to visit Port Isaac.

Also, at the Main car park the meteorological station had stopped transmitting data. I received a call from a tech chap in Portsmouth asking if I would be able to help. I did my best but as the important box of tricks is in the loft space and I'm not very good up ladders, I was of limited assistance! Fortunately, Simon from Maggie's Kiosk was there and he climbed right inside the attic to do stuff as instructed over the phone. However, there must be more than an issue with the internet connection, so the system is still off line at the time of writing.



I heard about a Peregrine Falcon that had been trapped inside the old Central Garage (New Road) it was successfully caught and released. But it highlighted the neglected condition of the building.

Anyone who parks there should take a look at the state of the canopy. I believe that our Clerk has written to the owners to point out the condition of the site and it's been drawn to the attention of Cornwall Council's Dangerous Structures Dept. The side door fell out recently. Smashing glass and wood onto the forecourt, thankfully no cars were damaged. It's not part of my job, so acting as a member of the public, I cleared the glass and moved the rest of the door. Later I believe Mark Meacher put the door back in the doorway and covered the hole, where the glass had been. However, the building is still accessible and dangerous to enter, so my advice is, don't!

That's about it for this month, apart from the inevitable public toilet problems! A couple of jammed coin machines at Roscarrock Hill. The Ladies was accepting 20p coins but not releasing the door. That info reached me quite quickly! It was sorted with the traditional switching the system off and on, my favourite! The lock on the accessible toilet is still not repaired, although it might be by the time this is published, fingers crossed. Sheila has had to deal with some horrendous things in a couple of the cubicle recently. Beyond what anyone should have to, so I would like to thank her for taking it all in her stride and sorting them out.

Goldfinches signify good fortune, positivity and harmony. These birds will only visit bird feeders and gardens with nutritious, high quality seeds. If they frequent your garden, it's a good indication that you offer safety, security and positive energy!

In the early 18th century, the word goldfinch was used as slang for a very wealthy person.

Jobs to do in the garden in November

Protect tender plants from frost with fleece or plant jackets.

Prune roses.

Continue to plant up winter pots as they draw the eye from empty borders and plant out winter bedding plants.

Plant tulip bulbs.

Lift dahlia tubers after the first frosts, clean them from surplus soil and store in dry compost in a cool frost free place.

Move containers of alpine plants under cover to shelter from winter rain.

Protect plants that are borderline hardy, such as agapanthus, with a thick mulch of straw or garden compost.

Tidy up strawberry beds, cutting back old foliage and removing any weeds.

Continue to mow the lawn in mild spells but raise the height of blades and give an autumn feed.

Patio areas can become slippery with slimy algal growth - regular cleaning with Jeyes Fluid or Armillatox can help with this problem.

 Shorter daylight hours mean that wild birds have less time to forage. Make sure your feeders are topped up regularly - once you start feeding the birds, they will come to rely on you, so make sure you're consistent!



November is a good month to plant a new native hedge, which can be bought as bare-rooted plants in garden centres.

Prepare the soil well before planting by adding garden compost or well-rotted manure. Native hedges produce fruit and flowers that suit our wildlife, so they attract much more insect life, which is vital to breeding birds.

Varieties of native hedging include hawthorn, blackthorn, dogwood, dog rose and hazel.

Did you know? Our native hawthorn is the most appealing hedge of all to insects and can attract up to 149 species.



Remember

At this Remembrance time, here are the stories of six of our own wartime casualties who died in seas throughout the world whilst serving our country to protect democracy from tyranny.

Trevor Marsh Atkinson:

Trevor was born in Croydon on 12th March 1924 to Richard (Dickie) and Bessie Atkinson. The family were living in Epsom when war broke out, but moved to Port Gaverne during the war, living at The Moorings with Trevor's younger sister June, later June Pengelly. Dickie was a builder and remained at Port Gaverne until Bessie died in 1972, when he moved a few miles to Middle Amble. Trevor had



joined the Merchant Navy as an apprentice and in August 1944 he was on the SS Berwickshire carrying 6,000 tons of general cargo and a deck cargo of 70 tons of high octane motor spirit. They were part of Convoy DN-68 sailing from Liverpool to Tanatave (now Toamasina) in Madagascar via Durban, South Africa. In the early hours of 20th August, the vessel was 400 miles east of Durban when she was spotted by the German submarine U-861 commanded by Jurgen Oesten. At 00:28 the ship was torpedoed and sunk with the loss of 8 crew, although 94 were picked up and taken to Durban. Apprentice Trevor Marsh Atkinson was one of those lost.

Samuel Phillips Keat:

Samuel was born in Port Isaac in 1906 to Samuel Phillips, a mariner on the coastal trade, and Mary Anna Keat. In his early years Samuel travelled with his parents on schooners sailing around the UK. He became a carpenter, working for Harry Hills



in his Roscarrock Hill workshop, and did carpentry all round Cornwall especially on church towers. In 1937, Samuel married Isobel Jago Tilley and in 1938 they had a son, Gordon Keat. When war broke out he enlisted in the Royal Navy and served on the armed trawler HMS Wilna as ship's carpenter. On 8th August 1940, the ship was attacked, and three crewmen were killed, including Carpenter Samuel Phillips Keat. He is interred in St Endellion Churchyard.

Richard James Lobb:

Richard James Lobb, always known as Jim, was born on 1st October 1892 to Francis Ede and Mary Annie Lobb. He joined the Royal Navy on 8th March 1911, where he was a Carpenter's Crew. After time in HMS Indus and HMS Donegal, on 20th January 1914 he joined HMS Highflyer where he became a Leading Carpenter's Crew.



Highflyer left Plymouth on 4th August 1914 as part of 9th Cruiser Squadron patrolling the Central Atlantic between Africa and South America. Highflyer transferred to Cape Verde station, where she was tasked with finding the German armed merchant raider, the SS Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse. Formerly a transatlantic liner she was now armed with just six 4 inch guns, as opposed to the Highflyer with eleven rapid firing 6 inch guns and eight 12 pounder guns. On 26th August 1914, the Highflyer found her coaling off Rio de Oro in northwest Africa, now in Western Sahara. In the ensuing unequal battle, the Kaiser Wilhelm der Groose was sank. Highflyer's loss was three people injured and one person killed. That one person was Leading Carpenter's Crew Richard James Lobb, Port Isaac's first World War One casualty and only the third naval casualty of that war. He was buried at sea about 100 miles southwest of Rio de Oro

Valentine Charles Mitchell:

He was born on 18th September 1891 to Valentine and Margaret Mitchell in Port Isaac. Valentine joined the Royal Navy and in 1911 was serving on HMS Illustrious, a pre-dreadnought battleship built in 1895. In 1915 she was laid up and Valentine was transferred as a leading seaman to SS Hansley. She was referred to as an armed merchant vessel, although with just a stern gun for protection, her armaments were very light. She was involved in taking war supplies from Tyneside to the newly founded city of Murmansk inside the Arctic Circle in Russia. The hardships of the Second World War Arctic convoys with naval warship protection are well known, but in the First World War there were no convoys, so every ship was on its own with just that single stern gun manned by experienced naval personnel for protection. On 9th April 1917, SS Hansley was almost at the end of her voyage in Kola Bay approaching Murmansk when she was torpedoed by the German Submarine U-75 and sunk. The whole crew, together with Valentine and a second naval man, Arthur Price, were lost in those bitter arctic waters where survival would be measured in minutes. With no known grave, Leading Seaman Valentine Charles Mitchell and Able Seaman Arthur Price are both commemorated on the Plymouth Naval Memorial on Plymouth Hoe.

Them

Thomas Oaten:

Thomas Oaten, known as Tommie, was born in 1872 to Thomas, an agricultural/ general labourer, and Catherine Oaten. Tommie went to the new Port Isaac school, no doubt shortly after it opened in April 1877. In April 1881, the headmaster recorded that Thomas Oaten has been away for 4 whole weeks. In those days, education had to be paid for weekly, and coming from a labouring family those fees would take a significant part of their income. When no money was earned that week, no doubt Tommie did not go to school. In 1891 Tommie was one of four Port Isaac seaman forming the crew of the vessel Rival in Sheerness where he was an able seaman. In 1901 he was recorded as a general labourer. He came from a large family, and in the 1911 Census his mother recorded that in their 40 year marriage 12 of her children were born alive, but only 6 survived, a staggering statistic to modern eyes but for a poor family of labourers was perhaps not exceptional. Tommie undoubtedly completed the 1911 census form for his father, who was illiterate and signed the form with a cross. When the war came, Tommie entered the Royal Navy, where in 1915 he was a Leading Seaman on HM Trawler Liberty serving in the Gallipoli Campaign in the Dardanelles. On 14th September 1915 Leading Seaman Thomas Oaten died and is buried in East Mudros Military Cemetery on the island of Limnos in Greece. Only a month earlier, on 14th August, Tommie's wife had given birth to a son, but whether he was aware he was a father before he died, we can never know. That son, Thomas Raymond Oaten, was also killed at sea on 10th January 1941 when he was serving as an air mechanic on the Aircraft Carrier HMS Illustrious in the Mediterranean.

William Johnson Townsend:

William was born in 1892 at Newcastle-upon-Tyne and married Kate May Remick from Port Isaac. They are the parents of Mark Townsend. William, Kate, and young Mark were living in Port Isaac as war broke out, where he working as a hotel chef. When his brother-in-law, Tom Remick, was killed on HMS Exeter in the Battle of the River Plate in December 1939, William tried to join the army. Being then 47, he was deemed too old for the army, so went into the Merchant Navy. In January 1940 he was appointed Chief Steward on the MV Scottish Minstrel, a 7,000 ton tanker, sailing out of Falmouth bound for the USA. The vessel was capable of carrying 9,200 tons of Fuel Oil at a



speed of 10 knots. On 16th July 1940 she was returning across the Atlantic as part of convoy HX-55 when she was hit by one torpedo from German U-boat U-861 captained by Jurgen Oesten. This was the same U-boat and captain that sank the SS Berwickshire on 20th August 1944, killing Trevor Atkinson. The Scottish Minstrel was 130 miles off the northwest coast of Ireland when she was hit, and she sank the next day. The Master and 31 crew were picked up by HMS Gardenia, but 9 crew members were unaccounted for, including Chief Steward William Johnson Townsend. He is commemorated on the Tower Hill Memorial, in Trinity Square Gardens by the Tower of London.

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
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
