Saint Piran's Day

Saint Piran's Day is celebrated every year on March 5th as the national day of Cornwall.

> Saint Piran, or Perran, is famed for the discovery of tin and is the patron saint of tin miners. St Piran's Day was originally a "tinners holiday" for the many miners in Cornwall.

The flag of St Piran is now recognised as the Cornish flag. The white cross on a black background is said to depict the Saint's discovery of tin, "the white metal flowing from the black Cornish rocks."





At 11.03 on Sunday 4th December, Port Isaac RNLI was tasked investigate a personal locator beacon being activated in the area around Tregardock beach. Padstow Lifeboat was also tasked along with Boscastle Coastguard Team

Once on scene, Port Isaac RNLI put one crew member on the beach to have a look around whilst the crew also spoke to surfers to see if they had seen anything.

The coastguard found that a walker on the footpath, carrying a personal locator beacon, had accidentally set it off whilst walking. The lifeboats were stood down and returned to station at around 11.50.

This shout was a particularly special one for Lifeboat Operations Manager and helm, Kevin Dingle. His son, Ollie recently turned 17 and joined the crew. This shout was the first they'd done together. Well done to you both!

Whilst most of us were enjoying Christmas leftovers on Boxing Day, RNLI volunteer lifeboat crew were tasked at 16.50 to a lone female on the rocks between Trebarwith Strand and Hole Beach.

Port Isaac Inshore Lifeboat (ILB) Pride of Port Isaac (Goeth Porthusek) responded and arrived on scene in a strong force 4 with 2-3m seas joining Padstow RNLI, Polzeath Coastguard, Boscastle Coastguard and Coastguard rescue helicopter 924.

The casualty had been swimming and taking wildlife photos when they were cut off by the tide. Fortunately they were able to locate an area with a mobile phone signal and called 999 before the signal was lost again.

The scene was now completely dark so Port Isaac crew launched a star burst flare to illuminate the area. The casualty was located in a safe zone on the rocks so the decision was made to wait for the helicopter to winch her off due to lack of light and poor weather conditions.

St Endellion Parish Council Contract & Maintenance Supervisor Report

Since the last edition of *Trio* it's been a bit of a light month for me, although I probably shouldn't admit it! However, there have been a few projects completed and some more things going on behind the scenes in my office ie a laptop, a view up to Tintagel, my canine companions snoozing and copious cups of tea!

The most significant progress is the bus shelter on the verge at the junction of B3314 and the turning to Trelights. There's now a choice of sitting on the bench or perching/standing in the shelter. Although, this isn't quite complete as the side panels need to be extended to prevent the worst of the weather catching the waiting public.

A new memorial bench has been positioned on Port Gaverne Hill. The old bench, which was rotten, has been removed and a recycled plastic one put in it's place, on behalf of a family with connections to the village.

In just va few days the footpaths have gone from sticky mud which is navigable in sturdy shoes to the sloppy slippy kind where only wellies will do. But it hasn't stopped me getting to most of the paths at least once. There's a few minor issues which I can deal with on some of the paths the next time I walk them.

Trewetha Lane has had the vegetation cut back on both sides. I'm hoping that a mechanical sweeper will be along soon to properly tidy up the verges and I've enquired with Cornwall Council Highways Dept to ask if double yellow lines can be reinstated along the length of the road too. They have already agreed to restore the 'Keep Clear' at the front of the Lifeboat Station, this should be done next month, fingers crossed.

The monthly play area inspection was done with only a few things noted. I'm hoping the work on the perimeter fence will be completed by April in time for the independent annual inspection. So far it looks much better and should give it a few more years of service.

One of the ticket machines in the Main car park stopped taking card payments. The engineer asked me to assist him remotely, trying to avoid a trip to the village. We went through the usual stuff, which I had already done prior to reporting the fault. No joy. Since then he's been back twice and is scheduled to visit again by about the time this goes to press. Fortunately the Parish Council have a service contract with the manufacturing company who provided the machines, so there's no extra costs involved. Thankfully there are two other machines and this one was still accepting cash.

The pre-planning application for the development of the lower part of the playing field has been submitted to Cornwall Council and there's a notice on the fence of the hard standing, near where the Post Office van parks, with a few details. As far as I'm aware there will be more public consultations, but should you require more info contact Beth, our parish Clerk and I'm sure she can answer any questions you may have. In the last couple of issues of *Trio* I've mentioned the gaps in the hedge from the playing field to the dog walking field will be closed over. This is still going to be done. I admit to putting it off a bit as I know it won't be popular. However, for the playing field to be developed dogs will need to be managed in a much more appropriate way, which is why a Public Space Protection Order is necessary and therefore access to the space where dogs are allowed will be via the gates!

The advice from Cornwall Council's Historic Dept regarding the additional stone for the War Memorial with the omitted names, is to apply for the Listed Building Consent. I've started to fill it in, but to be honest, it made my head hurt, so I'll probably need help from someone who knows more than me about this process.

While the B3267 was closed for the resurfacing I took the opportunity to litter pick it. Over four afternoon sessions I collected 17 black bags of litter. Mostly food and drink wrappers. Although there were some unusual items too, a full 13kg gas bottle, an advertising box from the top of a driving instructors car, and a small plastic frog. The frog came home with me and is now a favourite dog toy! I took the waste to the dump at Bowithick.

I've almost finished going through the old filing cabinets of parish documents that I started before Christmas. It's not been the best time of year to sit in a shed, but a friendly robin has kept me company and I get brought regular cups of tea. It's been quite an



insight into the history of the parish some of the papers go back to the 1970s. There was a sort out of records a few years ago and most of the important ones are stored at the county records office now.

My input with the new Parish Council website has been minimal except to say that I reviewed the content of the policy page which was a fair amount, nineteen documents. Most of the policies were sound, but out of date and needed to be readopted by the Parish Council, which was done at the February meeting.

There hasn't been much going on at the loos over the past few weeks, you'll be pleased to know and what has been going on is positive and mostly from the comfort of my 'office'. The preparation for tender process for the refurbishment of the toilets at Roscarrock Hill is quite involved so myself and Cllr Williams have been working on this. The hope is to get the work started as soon as the summer season's done.

Work will soon be carried out to fit a water refill station at the New Road toilet block. It should be sited on the exterior of the building near the accessible loo. The unit is provided by a Cornish charity 'Our Only World'. One of their missions is to recycle old fishing nets into these refill stations. It's one of the projects that's been on my back burner for a while, so it's good to know that process has been made to get to this point. Originally it was

going to be at the Roscarrock Hill toilets, but this was agreed to be a better place for it. And that's it for toilet talk this month!

Other things that I've been involved with over the past weeks are; reporting some potholes, fly-tipping and blocked highways drains to Cornwall Council. Even though the fly-tipping was strictly speaking in St Kew parish. Half a dozen old tyres dumped in the lay-by near the Treharrock turning on the B3314.

I attended February's Parish Council meeting, as per usual and took the minutes, as Beth was unable to be there. Removal of some stickers from around the village that said GREYJAM. on them. No idea who, what or why, but if you see any let me know, they are easy to erase.

Monitoring the leat in Middle Street including a large pile of what looks like garden waste. I'm sure it'll wash away eventually and not cause a blockage under the road! I continue to litter pick whenever I'm out, including picking up after those who don't pick up after their dogs. But don't get me started on that...!

WEBSITES OF THE MONTH

This month I thought I would do a selection of interactive websites that have developed over the years. What prompted this was the release of ChatGPT, an online 'chatbot' that you can ask any questions you like. It has shown itself to be a big improvement on previous attempts to have a conversational application that is hard to tell from a very clever person. You can log on to ChatGPT at https://chat.openai.com/chat. It seems to have the uncanny ability to understand what you want to know and gives good answers to many questions. Through this we learn more about how our minds work.

I asked it to write a short poem about Cornwall and this is what it did

Another website that gives an indication of how our minds work has optical illusions, one's where you can click to show how weird the illusion is https://www.magicmgmt.com/gary/oi/index.html. I asked ChatGPT to explain about optical illusions and it said:

The Moral machine <u>https://www.moralmachine.net</u> is an online platform that presents you with ethical dilemmas, the most recent involving autonomous vehicles, such as deciding who to prioritize in the event of an unavoidable accident. The classic trolley problems where you have to decide

whether to pull a lever or not to change the direction of a runaway train is also on there, together with many others. Again, it provides some insights into how we take decisions under difficult circumstances.

Project implicit is all about the associations we have that sometimes can be a problem, for example when we have prejudices of one sort or another. Project implicit <u>https://implicit.harvard.edu/implicit/</u> <u>takeatest.html</u> explores our implicit biases and has shown that implicit biases exist across a wide range of topics. Recognizing that we all have implicit biases can help us be more aware of how these biases may be affecting our attitudes and behaviour. You can try it out for yourself and see what you think.

The final one I thought worth a look is a reasonably benign version of "Deep Fake" applications that allow you to change videos. A YouTube video shows this in action for Abraham Lincoln <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=kbuWGjukg_U</u> The website I suggest is Animate images <u>https://www.cutout.pro/</u> where you can upload a selfie and get it to sing happy birthday for example. You might, of course, find this easier just to make a video of yourself, but if you upload an old picture of yourself, you might have a nice surprise when it comes to life.

Springtime Supper Warmers with Kim & Chris

Well spring must be on the way cos it's March !!! But as we all know March don't always bring spring weather so here is a bit of a supper warmer (if needed)

LEEK & BACON GRATIN

1lb new potatoes ,halved 2 leeks, chopped 16 rashers smoked streaky bacon, roughly chopped 300 ml single cream 4 cloves garlic, crushed 1lb grated cheddar cheese Olive oil Salt & pepper

Method

Preheat oven 190°/ gas mark 5

Boil the potatoes in salted water until cooked

Meanwhile gently pan fry leeks and bacon in olive oil over medium heat. When bacon starts to crisp up take off heat.

Once potatoes are cooked drain them and put into oven proof dish and add leek mix, cream, cheese and garlic.

Stir the mix & cook in the oven for bout 25 mins ,take out when top is lovely and crispy.

Cheap ,easy and ANSOM!

NEW YORK MEATBALL SARNIE

This beauty takes 15minutes ONLY !!!

300g minced beef1 red onion, finely diced4 cloves garlic ,grated8 slices of bread (I love bloomer but chose your fav)

4 tsp dried oregano 6 oz grated cheddar 800 g passata Olive oil S & P

Method

In a bowl mix minced beef, onion,half garlic and half oregano and season. Form into 16 compact meatballs and pan fry over a med heat in splash olive oil until darkly coloured

Meanwhile toast the bread slices on both sides in a pan with a splash of oil, then sprinkle on the cheese on one side of each slice of toast and melt under the grill producing a sauce proof barrier

When the meatballs are cooked add the passata along with the remaining garlic, oregano and more s & p (keep the meatballs in the pan) and simmer for 3-4 minutes to reduce sauce a little .

Make the sarnie (cheese facing inwards) and enjoy a taste of New York in your own bit of Cornish paradise .

Kim's smoked mackerel fish cake and Dijon sauce

4 medium potatoes, peeled and quartered 200g smoked mackerel , skinned 4 tbsp plain flour, plus 1tbsp 3 beaten eggs Panko breadcrumbs 4oz butter 200ml milk 6tsp Dijon mustard Spinach Olive or veg oil Salt & pepper

Method

Cook the quartered potatoes in salted water till cooked just enough to pierce with a fork, then drain and mash.

Once mash cools down a tad, shred smoked mackerel and combine with potato

Season well and form to patties. To help keep their shape refridgerate for 30mins

Put flour in one bowl, beaten egg in another and breadcrumbs in a third bowl, dust fish cakes in flour. egg then breadcrumbs

Pan fry fish cakes in olive oil over med heat, making sure to evenly brown all sides or deep fry in veg oil.

Make the sauce by melting butter, adding flour (roux) then slowly whisking in the milk. As the sauce comes together season and add mustard

To serve pour sauce into a shallow bowl place spinach on top then put fish cake on top

we have a new Vicar ... Welcome to Reverend Craig Marshall

We are all going to get to know Revd Craig over the next few months, but in the meantime, here is a bit about him:

"One of four siblings, Craig spent his childhood in Kingswood, Bristol up until the age of sixteen. After that he attended the United World College of the Atlantic, an international sixth form situated on the coast of South Wales. It was here that his love of the sea was forged. At the age of seventeen, Craig became captain and coxswain of the college RNLI lifeboat until 1981. His interest and support of the RNLI has remained ever since. After being awarded his degree from Southampton University in 1987, Craig taught in London for three years. During this time Craig married Jane and together they had four children; Charles, Sophie, Henry and George, all now in their twenties.

In 1999, following a twelve-year teaching career which finally saw Craig as a headteacher in Wiltshire, the family left for St John's College, Nottingham where Craig studied for a Masters degree in Theology. On completing the course, Craig, Jane and their children moved to Taunton where Craig began his clergy life as a curate. Jane was a constant support to Craig in his ministry until her death in 2021. Churches."



Craig's ordained life has largely been as sthe incumbent of multi-parish benefices including ministry in the dioceses of Bath and Wells, Winchester and most recently in the Lower Wharfedale Benefice, North Yorkshire in the Diocese of Leeds.

FULL COUNCIL MEETING FEBRUARY 13th 2023

Divisional Members Report- Cllr Mould commented on the nice bus shelter at Trelights and nice to go to the school in Port Isaac which looked smart and seemed happy. The new Community Partnerships areas have been agreed with 12 instead of 19. Govt. will provide funding and it is hoped this will be a more efficient network. Devolution: the process of Govt. tends to progress work very slowly; this system may well improve this. The County Council budget should be agreed tomorrow (14/2/23).

Further discussion regarding planning application PA22/08533 Cllr Mould felt their agent hadn't fully understood the argument from Cornwall Council to refuse the application. The farm business must show there's enough work to be able to support justifying a further dwelling. She felt that if the Parish Council wanted to show support at Committee someone should be prepared to attend. The farm being in an ANOB is another issue and she wanted to be sure the Members were on the same page.

Playing Field Development Working Party- Cllr Button confirmed the Outline Planning Application has been submitted to Cornwall Council. The next step is for the Working Party to have a meeting to discuss the strategy going forward. Public consultation, advertisement in Trio etc. A feasibility study and a viability study to ensure the facilities meet public agreement, but will also be deliverable and workable, along with checking possible funding streams.

With PA23/00539 Playing Field Trewetha Lane Port Isaac, being on the agenda it prevents the Parish Council discussing the matter. However, Cllr Kirkman enquired at what point would it be good to have input from residents of Trelights. Cllr Button felt that any input at any time would be helpful, but more so once there's a better understanding from the Working Party as to what the facilities could entail. Cllr Kirkman offered to mail drop the properties in Trelights if this was required.

Cllr Mould asked if there is support from within Port Isaac. This was thought to be positive. However, should the pre app not be supported how would the Parish Council proceed. Cllr Button is prepared to represent the Members at Planning Committee should that be necessary. Cllr Williams thought the only issue might me the siting of the building. There should be enough interest to show support, the play area needs development, and the school is a vital stakeholder.

Cllr Williams suggested that Cornwall Air Ambulance should be consulted and agreed to contact Mark Evans on behalf of the Parish Council.

STEND_HWG – Cllr Williams followed up from emails previously sent to members re: funding for the next stage of the proposal.

Cllr Button enquired as to any other sites and to the level of financial commitment for the Parish Council should they agree to this stage of funding, going forward. Cllr Williams confirmed that Glebe Farm owned by Cornwall Council is the only available site and the funding commitment would be a segment of the £20.000 she has requested reserved over a two year period.

Cllr Williams further explained either St Endellion parish setup its own Land Trust or the project would be managed and run under the umbrella of Cornwall Community Land Trust (CCLT). The estimated to get the scheme to full planning would be in the region of £80,000 to £120,000.

Cllr Mould advised it may be better to set up a local Land Trust as there will be more control on who gets to live in the housing and offered the opportunity of a self-build scheme.

Cllr Williams suggested that a positive pre-app it would draw more people to the project who would be prepared to volunteer their time and expertise. Heritage and Landscape surveys should help with a positive outcome despite the sensitivity of the site, which will be taken into consideration. The pre-app should be submitted in March with a decision in approximately May/June.

All stakeholders will be consulted including the support of St Endellion Festival Endelienta, the Parochial Church Council, businesses, and the community. NDP policies support, affordable housing with the live work units, and commercial development on the site.

Planning Applications –

PA22/10739 Tregenna Trelights Port Isaac Cornwall PL29 3TF Conversion and extension of existing self-contained building ('Woodland Lodge') to ancillary annex/ staff accommodation to Tregenna **OBJECT** Many trees on the site have been lost due to the current works, we consider the application is incomplete without the implementation of the Tree Officers' recommendations. Our objection arises from increased use of ancillary buildings in the Parish, converted to independent use as holiday lets, where we already have intensified tourist accommodation. Conditional permission was granted in support of its host, The Longcross Hotel, now converted into a private home.

[•]PA12/05882: However, it would be necessary as the proposed building are in the open countryside and no functional and financial need has been provided by the applicant for an unfettered dwelling in the open countryside, to condition the permission for holiday use only (Officer Report)

Condition: The development hereby permitted shall be used as holiday accommodation only and shall not be occupied as a person's sole or main place of residence.'

We are aware The Framework has been updated, but in consideration of planning applications pertaining to annexe accommodation we follow Cornwall Council's guidance notes, (4th Version May 2020) for consistency.

Members consider the proposed extension to the annexe accommodation is too large, and with the addition of a third bedroom and kitchen, no longer ancillary to the main dwelling but comprising a separate dwelling, albeit within the garden of the main dwelling.

We are not convinced, should the proposal be permitted, a usage condition is sufficient to prevent what is effectively a separate dwelling, remaining tied to the main dwelling in perpetuity.

Mow the lawn on dry days (if needed), but not too short.

Tidy up borders, removing established and newly germinating weeds

Feed ericaceous shrubs, such as rhododendrons, azaleas and camellias with an ericaceous fertiliser.

St Andrews Nursing Home and Sister Brown

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Over the last few years, I had several enquiries about 'St Andrews Nursing Home' on The Terrace, with references to a 'Nurse Brown'. These have come from people born there and wanting to check it out. I knew there was a St Andrews Hotel at the end of The Terrace (now The Beach House), as Carole and I stayed there once, but this was not the place.

Our 1939 National Register, dated 9th October 1939, shows Nurse Brown living at 12 The Terrace, 'St Andrews', which is now called 'The Anchorage'. She is recorded as 'Frances L Brown, Nursing Sister (Guys) R. R. C. Retired'.

Nurse Brown was Frances Louise Brown and was born in 1885 in St Andrews, Fife, Scotland, which is undoubtedly how that house name came to Port Isaac. In the 1891 census 5 year old Frances was with her parents William (a master baker) and Mary Brown and her three sisters, Katherine (7), Hannah (4) and Charlotte (3), plus a 16 year old servant, all living at 116 South Street, St Andrews. In the 1901 census, she was still at 116 South Street with the family, plus two more younger sisters, Agnes and Roberta, and two younger brothers, Gavin and James. In the 1911 census, she was a 24 year old Hospital Nurse at Guys Hospital, Southwark, one of 236 nurses living in at the hospital.

The 1939 Register suggests she had retired as a nurse by the outbreak of World War Two, but the 1946 Register of Nurses shows she was admitted to that register on 27th October 1944 at London under Section 18 of the Nurses Act 1943, with her qualifications recorded as 'Cert. 1913, Guys Hosp., London.'. Her address was given as 'St Andrews, The Terrace, Port Isaac, North Cornwall'. A check of the British Newspaper Archive had the following announcements of births at St Andrews Nursing Home, with several also thanking Sister Brown for her care; February 28th 1945 (Roger Graham Parsons), November 16th 1945 (Patricia Strongman), January 12th 1947 (Spiller, a son: 'thanks to Sister Brown and doctors'), January 30th 1947 (Hoskin, a daughter), April 23rd 1947 (Andrew Peter Lloyd: 'thanks to the doctor and Sister Brown'), July 119th 1947 (Pauline Frances Beare: 'thanks to Sister Brown and doctor'), September 16th 1948 (Bonita Jeanette Wilson), and 26th November 1948 (Keast, a daughter). These would suggest St Andrews Nursing Home was active from at least early 1945 through to late 1948.

The National Register for this part of The Terrace is shown alongside, with Nurse Brown at number 12 'St Andrews'. The 'Officially Closed' blacked-out entries are

simply for those who were born after 1920. As with censuses, data cannot be released in respect of people less than 100 years old. Older residents may note some familiar names. Tom and Lil Barker were at number 7 'Westward Ho', and also staying with them was Rose V Penna. She was Robin Penna's mother, always known as Daidie, and the two closed entries beneath her are almost certainly the entries for a 5 year old Robin and his 10 year old brother Dick. In her wartime diaries. Daidie's entry for 7th October 1939 mentions that she had spent the previous week assisting in the compilation of the National Register. The enumerator's signature on the register seems to be that of her landlord Tom Barker, a retired tax collector and rate collector. At number 8 'Garfield House' is Miss Nalder. She ran a private school there, and Robin Penna, Henry Symons, and Dugald Sproull were amongst those taught by her at the school. Marian Shrimpton is at number 9 'Penroche' with her daughter-in-law Joan, and the blacked out entry is probably a grandchild. Marian was born in Simla, India and her husband Robert had been a secretary to the Viceroy of India. She was the mother of Francis Oscar Shrimpton, who is on our war

memorial, having been killed during the battle for Singapore in 1942. She was still living in Penroche when she died in 1955.

Those initials 'R. R. C.' after Nurse Brown's name on the 1939 National Register stand for Royal Red Cross, a military decoration for exceptional service in military nursing. This was created in 1883 with the first recipient being Florence



Nightingale. Sister Brown's remarkable story was given in her obituary in the Cornish Guardian for 22nd December 1949, which is also alongside this article.

Cornish Guardian - Thursday 22 December 1949

HEROINE OF FIRST WORLD WAR Appreciation of Sister Brown, of Port Isaac

The death of Sister Brown, of St. Andrew's Nursing Home, Port Isaac, brought sorrow to many people. She died on Tuesday, December 13 in the East Cornwall Hospital, Bodmin. after a sudden attack of pneumonia. Her patients came from a wide area and remember with gratitude the kind and efficient service she gave them. She nursed many babies during their first days and never lost her interest in them as they grew up. What very few people knew, however, was that she was a heroine of the first world war, and received the Royal Red Cross, the highest decoration awarded in the nursing profession. for her bravery when taken prisoner by the Germans in 1915.

When she returned to England she immediately volunteered again for foreign service and nursed in France till the end of the war. She was then made matron of the English hospital at St. Omer, where she remained until 1930. Sister Brown had a unique place in the life of the community and Port Isaac area people will remember her with affection.

On Monday a memorial service to Sister Brown was conducted by the vicar, Rev. W. Atterbury Thomas.

Sister Brown died of pneumonia on 13th December 1949 in the East Cornwall Hospital. A sale of her effects took place in early 1950, so the nursing home must have closed its doors on her death. She is buried with her parents at St Andrews Eastern Cemetery in St Andrews, Fife.

If anyone has more information on St Andrews Nursing Home or Sister Brown, please let us know so it can be recorded.
