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

St. Endellion


A bazaar in connection with the harvest festival at St. Endellion was held on Tuesday week, in the rectory grounds, to provide funds for the completion of the new church which is being built at Port Isaac. The Rev. Prebendary Carter preached at the festival service an appropriate sermon from St. John vi, 5, and the other clergy who were present and took part were the Revs. H. Treffry (rector), W. Rowe (St. Teath), S. Rolleston (St. Minver), E. H. Bree (St. Mary's, Truro), and I. Lock (Port Isaac). After the service a goodly number sat down to tea. The business at the stalls was energetically transacted by Mesdames Trevan, Lock, Williams, Lark, Corkhill, and Miss Hughes, assisted by other ladies.

Summer seems to be here so here's a couple of easy recipes for you ...

Cheese Scones with Beetroot & Apple Jam and Cream Cheese

Ingredients (makes 20 scones):

2lb self raising flour8oz margarine2tsp baking powder6oz strong cheddar2oz either blue cheese(Cornish blue or Stilton)is best or

Red Leicester

'bout ½ pint of milk to make dough You can also add fresh thyme to this

In a bowl add all dry ingredients and rub together till sandy texture, then add milk and make a dough.

Roll out and cut with a cutter brush with milk and leave to prove for 'bout 5 mins then bake for bout 9 mins on 190°c

Beetroot & Apple Jam

2 packs of cooked beetroot (4 in a pack) 1/2 pint of apple juice 2 tbsp of red onion marmalade

Warm up the red onion marmalade and then add beetroot and apple juice. Bring to boil and then simmer and reduce by half. Once reduced put into a blender and blitz.

Use your favourite cream cheese and DON'T FORGET ... ALWAYS JAM FIRST !!!!!!

a quick and easy pudding recipe that'll tickle the tastebuds and only takes 15mins to make

> 1 large bar of your fav chocolate bar 6oz marshmallows 1pint double cream Vanilla extract (optional)

2oz butter 1/2 cup of cold water 2oz caster sugar

Method:

In a thick bottomed pan place the butter and melt over a low heat Meanwhile break up the chocolate bar and add to the pan, then add the marshmallows.

Lightly whisk the cream, sugar and vanilla and put to one side

Whisk the chocolate mix until everything has melted. Then gradually add the water, constantly whisking.

Once the chocolate mix has cooled, mix in the cream and decant into serving bowls and refrigerate for a few hours until set.

Serve with fresh berries and warm summer sunshine and a glass of PIMMS.

HEADLANDS HOTEL, PORT GAVERNE What a disgrace!



What a disgrace to the village is the Headlands Hotel! What was once a prominent well kept building as one entered Port Gaverne is now in ruins and an embarrassment to the village.

Why on earth can't Cornwall Council do something about it? They do have the power to take action if a property is allowed to go into such disrepair as to be "detrimental to the amenities of the area".

The former hotel is the first building that visitors see when they come into Port Gaverne and it stands out like a sore thumb from the cliff path.

I understand that it belongs to a family with links to Port Isaac going back several generations. They are rumoured to be very wealthy but are unhappy that the Planners will not let them do what they want to do with the site. This seems to have been the position for many years. If they had any respect for Port Isaac they would do something about it even if just to



knock it down and tidy up the site pending resolution of their argument with the Planners.

If they won't do anything then the Council should exercise their powers and do it themselves. The Council makes a huge fuss about how big a window should be in a new house or whether it is possible to replace a door on a Listed Fish Cellar but do nothing about the biggest eyesore in the parish.

We hope you've all managed to enjoy our May Bank Holidays. Our volunteer crew and shore crew had the first two of their bank holidays interrupted to respond to requests by the Coastguard to launch.

On Monday 1st May Port Isaac Inshore Lifeboat (ILB) was tasked to reports of a 15 year old boy at Hole Beach, north of Trebarwith with cuts to his leg and arm. Boscastle Coastguard Team and Polzeath Coastguard had both also been paged and all services headed to the scene. On arrival it was clear that land rescue rather than sea would be preferable, due to a high tide and lack of beach as well as a big surf rolling in. The Coastguard sent a team down to the beach to assess the injuries and to aid all four boys to safety.

On Saturday 6th May the crew were paged to a person in the water at Tintagel Island. On arrival at the scene the volunteer lifeboat crew spotted the man on rocks. He had sustained lots of cuts from the climb out of the water. There was a 2 metre swell so a rock landing would have been difficult and dangerous. Crew were able to get a line to the casualty and on their instruction he was asked to jump into the water and taken safely on board the lifeboat. The grateful casualty was taken to Castle Beach where he was handed over to the Boscastle Coastguard Team for assessment.

Then on Sunday 14th May the lifeboat was tasked to Tintagel Castle beach for a male with a broken ankle. Boscastle Coastguard also responded. The casualty was evacuated to safety and handed over to a waiting ambulance.

Needless to say, his role that day was pivotal in saving lives at sea.

We are an amazing band of brothers within the RNLI, locally and across the entire charity, Mark took so much pride in being a part of this. His focus, was always, to ensure we were well prepared for whatever we had to face whilst at sea. He was as proud of us as we were of him..!

Marks funeral will be held in his home town of Newbury on the 9th June and a memorial service in his new home of Port Isaac will be held on the 1st July. For further information on either celebration please call on 07813 036489.


North Cornwall Book Festival Fundraiser Friday 16 June, 4pm - 8pm Trevilley, Sennen, Penzance TR19 7AH

Organisations and Reports

Parish Council Chair – Cllr Raynor mentioned the football field and how well it's recovered from the quagmire it was after the Shanty Festival.

Cllr Cleave has researched a commemorative coronation coin for the primary school children. Cllr Williams raised a for an alternative dedicated fund v bird food for the feeders at the school. Members preferred coins.

An update on the request for a 30 MPH speed limit in Trewetha after the recent accident. Cornwall Council's response to the accident in Trewetha is that the request for a 30 MPH limit has been logged.

Beth leaving her position as Clerk due to her moving to Kent and the two applicants for the position. There may be a third applicant. To be discussed as an agenda item

Divisional Members Report- Cllr Mould mentioned her concerns over the progress being made with the affordable housing pre-app in relation to some stakeholders. Her concern is that some feel that they haven't been fully engaged in the process. Cllr Williams explained with reference to the reports the OC had commissioned that progress was not at the stage for full stakeholder consultation. However, in the short term that would progress.

She also has big concerns over the housing issues in the parish with 3 - 4 families in need. She is arranging a meeting with a new Housing Officer from Cornwall Council, Sarah Sym. Once the arrangement is agreed she will invite Cllr Raynor or any other interested parties to attend. The intension is to walk the village of Port Isaac to review the current housing stock with the thought in mind to re-jig the allocations. In her opinion the whole system which is under immense pressure should be reviewed.

Cllr Mould asked if the Parish Council were aware that the Civil Enforcement Officer is about to or has left the position and there will only be limited cover as replacement. This situation is not good enough; Cllr Mould has written to Parking Enforcement at Cornwall Council to express her concerns.

Playing Field Development Working Party- Cllr Raynor went through a previously prepared report as Cllr Button not in attendance. Cllr Mould commented that the Community Area Partnership may be able to assist with funding for local projects, such as feasibility studies.

STEND_HWG – Cllr Williams met with the Rev Craig Marshall to talk about the proposed scheme/copied in on all emerging evidence base documents/explained progress to date.

- Zoom meeting Wed 17th CCLT/Dave Slatter to discuss management and advancement of pre app/further planning steps/it's complicated!
- Feasibility Funding app draft is complete: To be agreed with CCLT before submission ASAP.
- Slatter & Wesley studies are near completion/there has been some debate over agreed layouts to accommodate Landscape/Heritage priorities over place making, a total of 8 different drafts have been discussed of which 3 will move on to:
- Stakeholder communications

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- · STEND_HWG meet Mon 22nd April to review & assign comms.
- To be followed by public consultation
 - Their final report will incorporate stakeholder input & recommendations.
- Next stage: PRE-APP/projected end of June

a) Demonstrate how they appropriately respond to the context of the site, local distinctiveness and local landscape character;

b) Take up a similar footprint to the existing dwelling or demonstrate no increase in visual prominence...'

NDP Policy 6B: where the objectives are to maintain the integrity and scale by conformity with the existing roofscape

f) respects and reflects the general window/wall proportions of the conservation area and avoids the inappropriate use of extensive glazing,

panoramic windows, balconies, dormer windows, roof lights, solar panels and aerials Furthermore, members are concerned about the effect on April Cottage, where the proximity of the rear balcony and the increased height and glazing will impact the amenity space of the home owners.

YOUR GARDEN IN JUNE ...

Ornamentals

Give early flowering herbaceous perennials a 'hair cut' - cutting these back as soon as flowering is over will encourage a second, later flush of flowers towards the end of summer. All you need to do is remove the faded flowers, plus a little of the growth beneath, then keep the plant well fed and watered and you should be well rewarded a few weeks later. You'll also find that this helps to keep the plants dense too.

If you are planning to do any major planting later in the year in areas that contain quite a few bulbs, it is well worth marking any clumps of bulbs before the foliage dies away completely. Come the autumn, when the leaves of the bulbs are no longer there, you'll be amazed how useful the markers are and they can save you a lot of time as you won't be constantly digging up and replanting bulbs!

Regularly deadhead spring and summer flowering bedding and herbaceous plants - if left to form seed heads, the plant's vigour may be considerably reduced. Faded flowers also make great compost, so won't be wasted.

It should be safe to plant out vegetables that you have raised yourself or bought from a garden centre. Make sure everything is hardened off properly before planting out and keep them well watered. Crops such as tomatoes, peppers and cucumbers all need regular feeding with a liquid high-potash feed at this time of year. Without this, the level of cropping is often dramatically reduced. I use a liquid tomato feed for all 'fruiting' crops.

Continue to sow salad seeds, such as lettuce, rocket, beetroot and radish, either in containers or in open ground. Water them and then cover with a mesh or similar material to keep the birds and cats away.

Websites of the Month

In March I covered the way Artificial Intelligence had become powerful and described how some can compose quite good poems, some can make fake videos and so on. I thought I would continue the theme as this has become a topic of much public discussion and probably a good deal of private discussion as well. As a reminder the chatbot that everyone was talking about was ChatGPT https://chat.openai.com/chat . This is a system that allows you to ask it questions, like how should I write an email to my boss (and give a few details) and it will write you one. People have used this to draft a response to an insurance company that was not being reasonable; they put in the insurance policy details and what had happened, and the resulting email got them the claim agreed.

It is called a large language model, as it has been trained on the huge amount of writing there is available on the internet. The extraordinary thing is that so long as you can get online it will answer your questions anywhere in the world. It is now clever enough to write essays. You can watch a YouTube video of the Oxford University admissions people seeing if ChatGPT would pass the admissions exam https://tinyurl.com/oxford-entrance – it is a long video but gives you an idea of its power. Universities all round the world are grappling with how to deal with student being able to type into this chatbot some ideas about an essay they have to write, and this being produced for them instantly (see Guardian article https:// tinyurl.com/writing-A!.

This has prompted the leading players in the AI field to issue warnings about it's dangerous potential in an open letter calling for a pause in research https://tinyurl.com/recent-A1-letter now signed by nearly 30 thousand.

This is from their letter:

"Contemporary AI systems are now becoming human-competitive at general tasks,^[3] and we must ask ourselves: Should we let machines flood our information channels with propaganda and untruth? Should we automate away all the jobs, including the fulfilling ones? Should we develop nonhuman minds that might eventually outnumber, outsmart, obsolete and replace us? Should we risk loss of control of our civilization? Such decisions must not be delegated to unelected tech leaders. Powerful AI systems should be developed only once we are confident that their effects will be positive and their risks will be manageable. This confidence must be well justified and increase with the magnitude of a system's potential effects. OpenAI's recent statement regarding artificial general intelligence https://tinyurl.com/openai-blog, states that "At some point, it may be important to get independent review before starting to train future systems, and for the most advanced efforts

to agree to limit the rate of growth of compute used for creating new models."


So, this has turned from something that was seemingly a fun toy to play with to something that poses serious challenges to us in all sorts of ways. A team at the University of Cambridge, devoted to existential risk have a good website considering this area https:// tinyurl.com/existential-risk

However risky it is, there is still fun to be had with it. One that I have found particularly useful is Google Lens. Incidentally google have their own version of Chat GPT called Bard https://bard.google.com . So with Google lens https://lens.google you can try to identify anything you have a picture of, for example, a plant. The illustration for this article is a cornflower and I identified it by popping the picture into the google app on my phone and it is all powered by AI.

Alongside Port Isaac and Port Gaverne, Port Quin has long been a fishing cove. There are two 16th century contemporaneous records, but it was no doubt involved much earlier than that. John Leland recorded this after his visit in the second quarter of the 16th Century – **Port Quin**, a fisschar village, lyith two miles lower on the shore [from Port Isaac] and there is the issue of a broke and a pere. A few decades later, in 1585, John Norden visited our parish and described it thus – **Port Quin**; a little hamlet and harbour ner [Port Isaac] much increasinge by fishinge also.



There were two old fish cellars in Port Quin – Venice and Carolina (Caroline), the latter being just across the stream in St Minver Parish. In this restricted valley setting, both probably utilised the footprints of earlier buildings from that Tudor era. Of the Venice Cellar, now owned by the National Trust, only fragments remain. The Carolina Cellar has now been principally turned into holiday cottages. The Tithe Map c1840 shows the extent of the two cellars right at the end of their industrial lives.

Venice Cellar: This comprised two separate buildings, a rectangular cellar, with a separate arm alongside that probably had sail lofts above. As so much has been lost, it is difficult to gauge their original size, but an estimate of the rectangular cellar would have been around 22m (72ft) by 15m (50ft) with the separate arm some 26m (85ft) by 6.5m (21ft). These are smaller than the early 19th century rectangular cellars in Port Gaverne, which are about 37m (123ft) by 27m (88ft). This cellar is also of a more robust design, being constructed of local stone, rather than the Cornish cob and slate of those in Port Gaverne. The brick holes for the pressing bars are on the inside of the building only so it could process far fewer fish. The cellars in Port Gaverne could process about 400 hogsheads of pilchards each, whereas the two buildings of the Venice Seine could process less than half that. They are likely older than those at Port

Gaverne, perhaps representing an earlier phase in the design of cellar buildings. The 1881 Ordnance Survey map shows the Venice seine exactly as in 1839, but the 1907 map shows what we see now, with just a quarter of the rectangular cellar left, and the back wall of half of the separate arm. No doubt the seaward part of the rectangular part was washed away in a storm, and the separate arm fell into ruins. The remainder of this cellar arm is now a National Trust holiday property, confusingly named Carolina. What is left of the rectangular cellar is now parking for the holiday properties. The larger building, now split into two cottages known as Guys Cottage and Quin Cottage, has a date stone on the front wall 'M Guy 1828'. The buildings are clearly older than 1828, and this probably relates to substantial work carried out at that time. These parts that remain are all listed buildings.



Carolina Cellar: This is of a similar design to the Port Gaverne cellars. It is also the same length, but slightly narrower to fit between the stream and the south-western hillside. Its capacity would have been around 280 hogsheads. The original north-eastern arm now consists of just the exterior wall, which forms the sole part of the Carolina Cellar that is listed.

The heyday of their use as Pilchard Cellars would have been in the late 18th and early 19th century when vast shoals of Pilchards regularly turned up along the Cornish coast in summer. Trevan records a joint venture between the Venice, Industry and Union seine companies in the 1834 season, but that caught a mere 20 hogsheads. In 1837, one of the Port Isaac seines managed to enclose a shoal which amounted to 12 or 13 hogsheads, which was likely the last gasp of this once important activity here. In the Tithe Apportionments from 1840, the Venice Cellar was owned by Mark Guy from Roscarrock, and occupied by the Venice Seine Company. The Carolina Cellar was described as 'fish cellars and dwelling house' and owned by Samuel Symons of Gonvena in Wadebridge. There was no seine company in residence, with the dwelling house being occupied by John Knight, a 60 year old agricultural labourer.

The Royal Cornwall Gazette and West Briton and Cornwall Advertiser newspapers from the 1830s saw many advertisements for the sale of our cellars, complete with all the boats and associated equipment plus large quantities of salt, a testimony to a dying industry. Both of the Port Quin cellars were auctioned together on 22nd April 1828 at Port Quin. That must have been when Samuel Symons acquired the Carolina Cellar. He owned several



other properties at Port Quin including Doyden Castle, the folly he had built. The Venice Cellar was again auctioned on 8th May 1849, together with all the boats and equipment of the seine company as well as 1,000 bushels of salt. Having been little used over the previous two decades, one does wonder what state they would have been in by the time of the auction.

St Endellion Parish Council Contract & Maintenance Supervisor Report

Along with fun memories of the Shanty Festival I've got flashbacks to the state of the football field after that weekend! The field was temporarily roped off and signs put around asking people to stay off the grass ... what grass?! But not too much of a problem, The Shanty Girls & Martyn quickly put together a plan to get the field sorted. They employed Phil Burnard and myself to rake up the layer of straw that was liberally spread around the worse affected areas ... there was a lot! They then got a lovely guy and his tractor to rake and roll the field. The ground between the goal posts was filled where it had eroded from use and reseeded with grass and now the posts are back in place and the field is better than ever. The whole field has recovered amazingly well and was out of action for just under three weeks.

The monthly play area inspection was carried out with nothing much to report. There's always a few minor issues and the monitoring of the overall area is ongoing.

All of the car park ticket machines have behaved over the past few weeks. But the chap who empties them was away on holiday, so I did it. One of the things that I'm not good with is keys. I might've mentioned this before. Anyway, I struggled a lot, but finally managed to complete the task. I felt the need to lie down in a dark room to recover myself afterwards! I hope he doesn't have another holiday for a while!

Last year(!) the Parish Council changed the tariffs in the Main car park. This sounds easy but involves three separate companies! The one that services the machines, the enforcement company and the phone app. This company is JustPark. The change over was scheduled for midnight on a day in early April. Fast forward to September and it came to my attention that JustPark hadn't changed the charges on their app. I contacted them, pointed out the omission and suggested that compensation would be in order. Fast forward to March this year and they agreed to pay £3000. Finally a year later the Parish Council received the payment!

In last months *Trio* I commented on the amount of rain we'd had, follow that with warm and sunny weather and all the plants grow, including weeds. The ground works company had struggled with the wet conditions which means that they are so far behind with the regular program of work to ensure the footpaths are walkable.


So...recently I was gifted a second hand, battery operated strimmer, I took it upon myself to try and cut back some of the more irritating plants. Those that have potential to cause rashes etc. Armed with my new(-ish) toy I walked Trewetha to Church Hill, cutting back the nettles, hogweed and alexanders. It took three sessions, as the batteries die after about 20 - 25 minutes, I've got two. The result is that the path is walkable, although it might still be a bit overgrown in parts with the likes of pink campion and grass, but the majority of the nasties is much reduced. I've also tackled Postman's Walk too. This means that the contractors can concentrate on the other paths that are overdue, including from Trewetha to Port Gaverne.

I was disappointed that having asked them specifically to cut the banks in front of the houses in New Road at the beinning of May, they weren't done. However, they've been cut now but they left all the cuttings. Grrr...

While walking in Port Gaverne valley I had to climb through a tree, sort of. The next time I went that way I took my trusty saw and removed it. I've walked most of the paths a couple of times over the past weeks, it's lovely to see the season develop through the wild flowers, although spring seems to have been a little slow this year.

Also in last month's *Trio* I said that I was hoping to get to clear the leaves and other debris in Meadowstile, Margaret's Lane and Doctor's Meadow. I confess that I only managed to get to do Doctor's Meadow. I thought this was the easiest one, but even that created six black bags of sweepings. The other opes are still on my to do list. By the time I get to them Doctor's Meadow will probably need doing again! I've cut back the overgrown stretch of path between New Road and Tintagel Terrace, adjacent to the Co-Op. This also means that the ground works guys won't need to do it for a while.

On one of the recent sunny days a resident of New Road called me concerned about the amount of goo oozing from a telegraph pole at the junction of Hartland and New Road. It was so bad that people and dogs had spread it across the pavement and onto the road. I looked online to see what I could do immediately to try to clear the mess and soak up the excess gunk. Which I did having sprayed it with WD40 and washed it down with soapy water. Thanks Annie Price for the use of your outside tap. I left the bottom of the post wrapped in an old sheet and a section of wire garden fence to try to prevent anyone getting close to the post and contacted the National Grid who sent someone out within a few days. The work carried out means that any excess preservative should now seep into the contained gravel area created at the base of the pole and not onto the pavement.



This month I attended the Full Parish Council meeting and took the Minutes.

The bus shelter extensions arrived on the second promised delivery date. However, they won't be installed 'til mid-June as Phil B's on holiday.

The new path near the water refill station at new Road toilets is finished and the charity Our Only World, who provided the facility has been informed of its completion. They would like to organise an official opening, inviting Parish Councillors and personnel from Biffa who will bring along some water bottles to give away.

While still at New Road; I received a call on a Sunday from the tenants in the shop that one of the coin machines was jammed. Half an hour later all done; that includes walking to the toilet block armed with a few essential tools, clearing the jam and chatting to the folks in the shop.

Other incidents at toilets over the past few weeks include the door at the Gents receiving such a hard kick that it split the end plank cleanly from the rest of the door, but not hard enough to damage anything else. It was hammered back into place and just for good measure a couple of braces screwed across the joint. Unfortunately, one of the braces was interfering with the locking mechanism, so I went back the next day, borrowed an electric screwdriver from the Chapel Cafe and altered it.

The pledged donation of £1,000 from the National Trust, for Port Gaverne toilets, has been received. I was advised that the contribution could be allocated for last year, this year or split between the two. But whichever way its assigned any help with the running costs is great.



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
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
